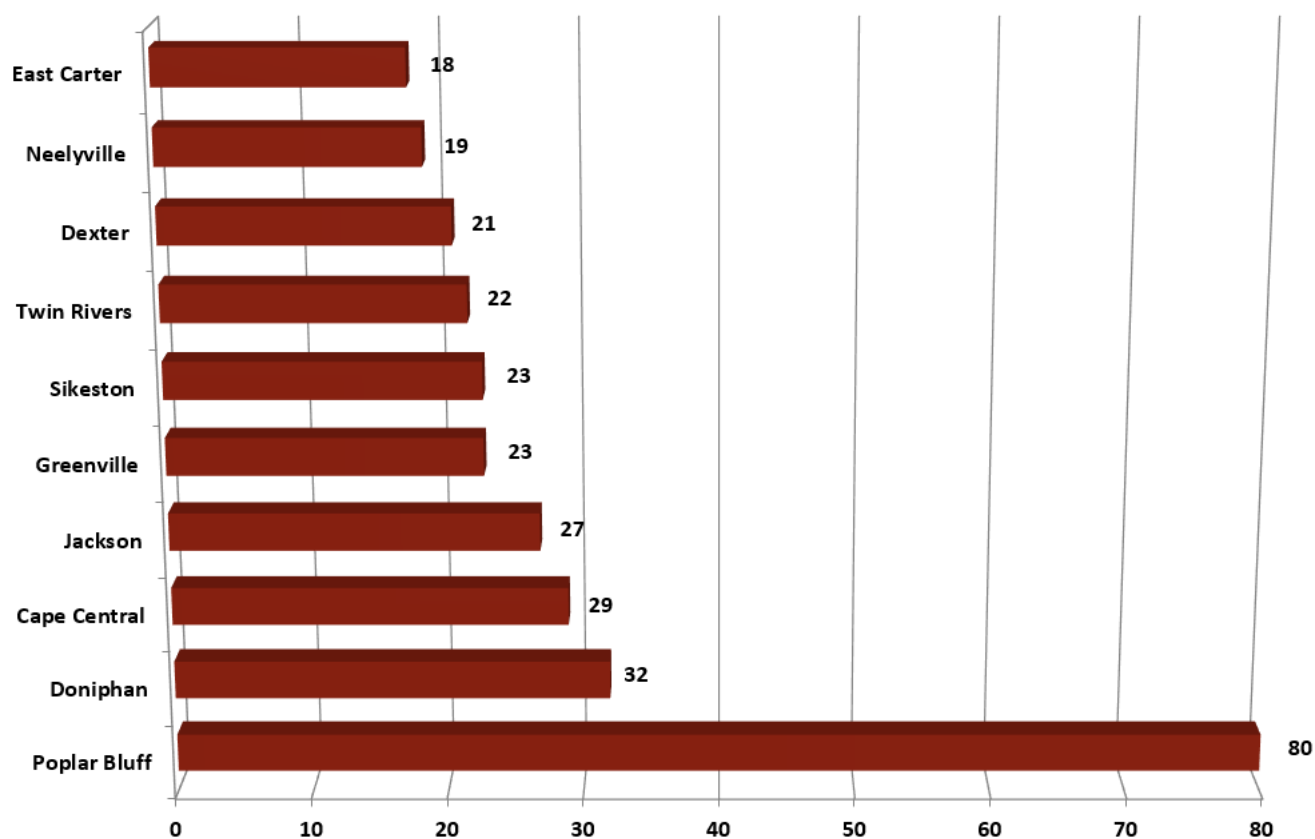

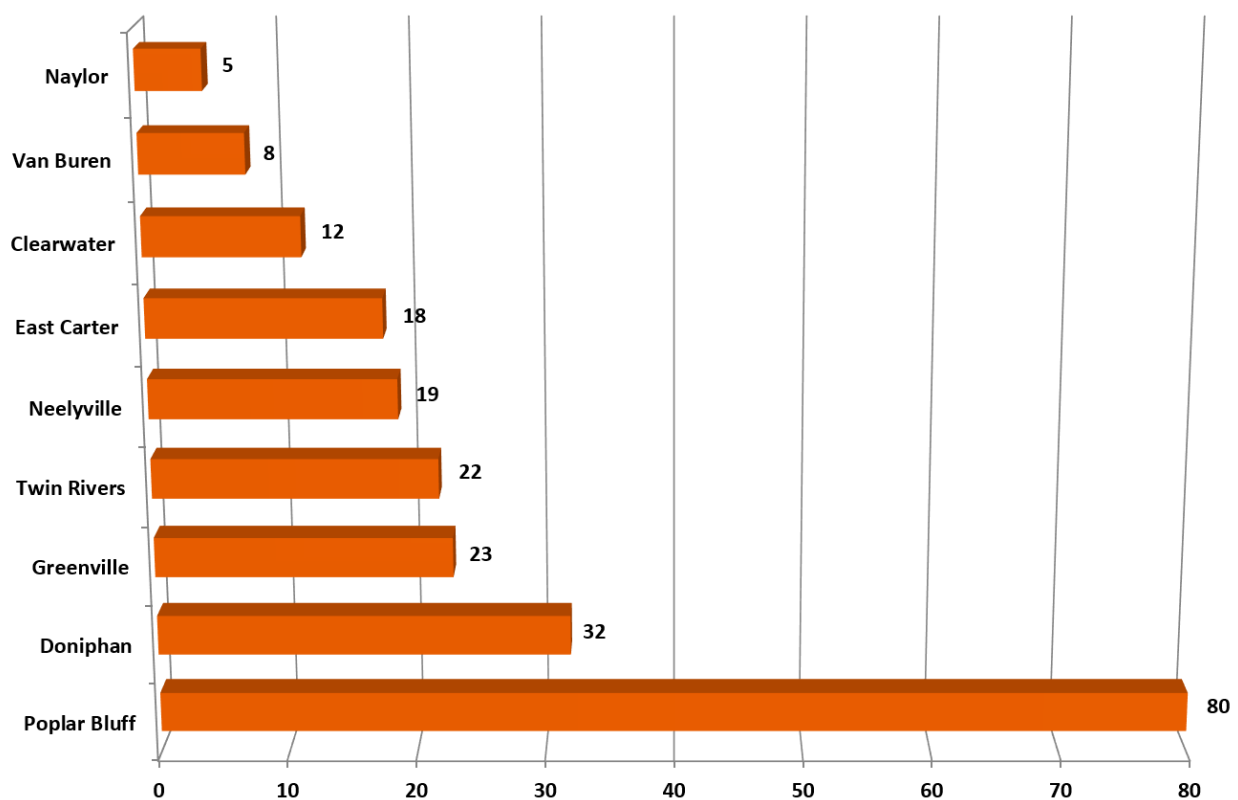
Enrollment by Headcount

Enrollment by Headcount

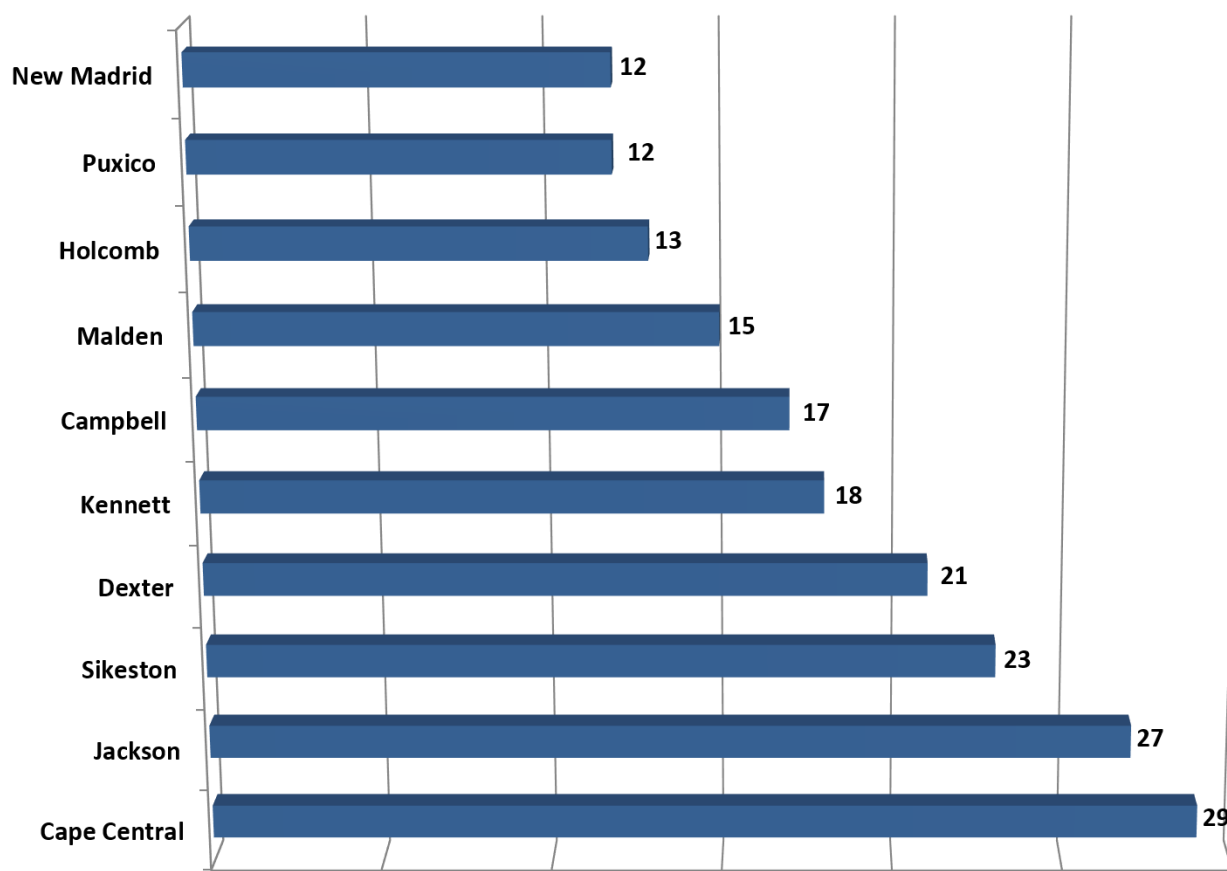

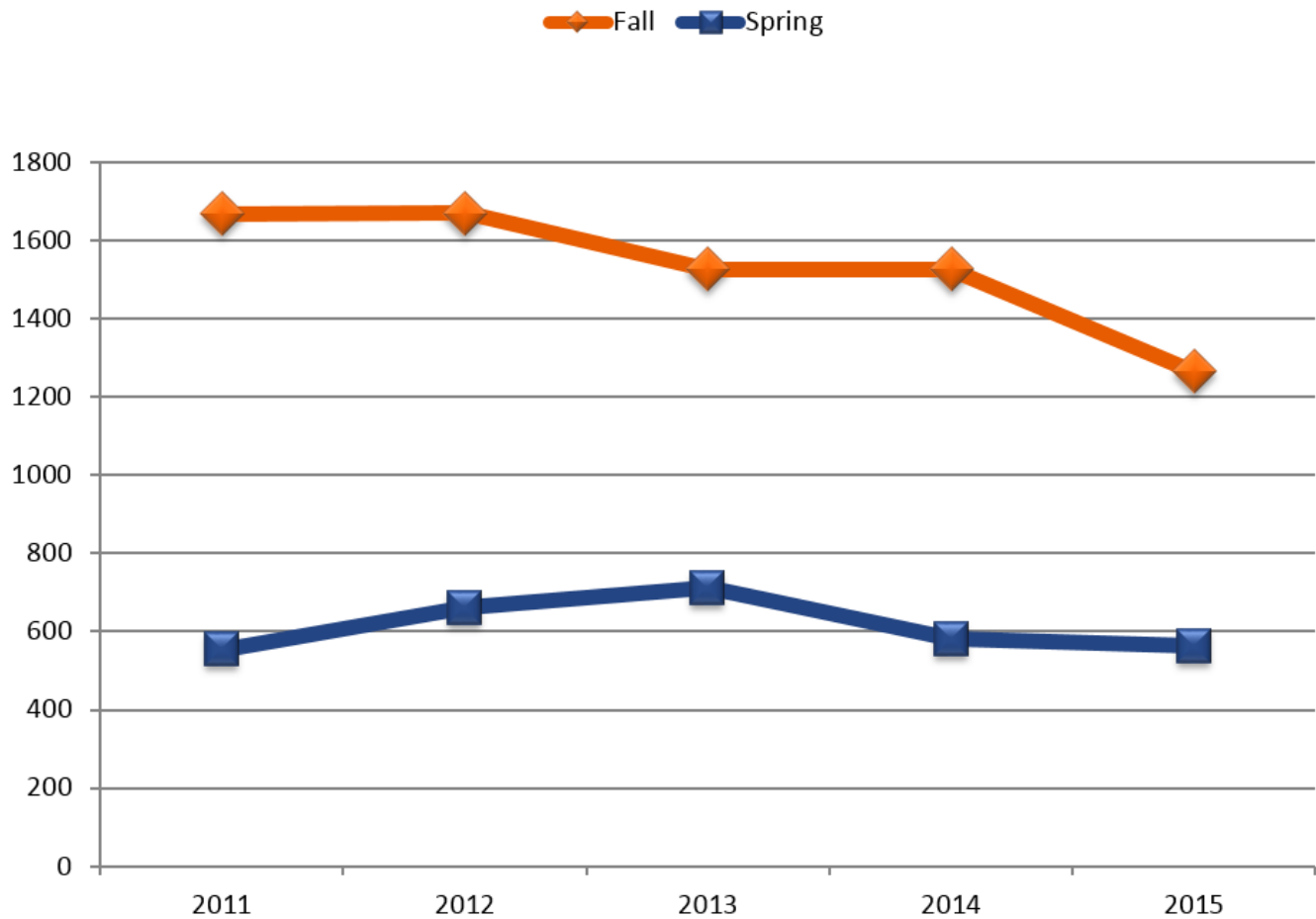

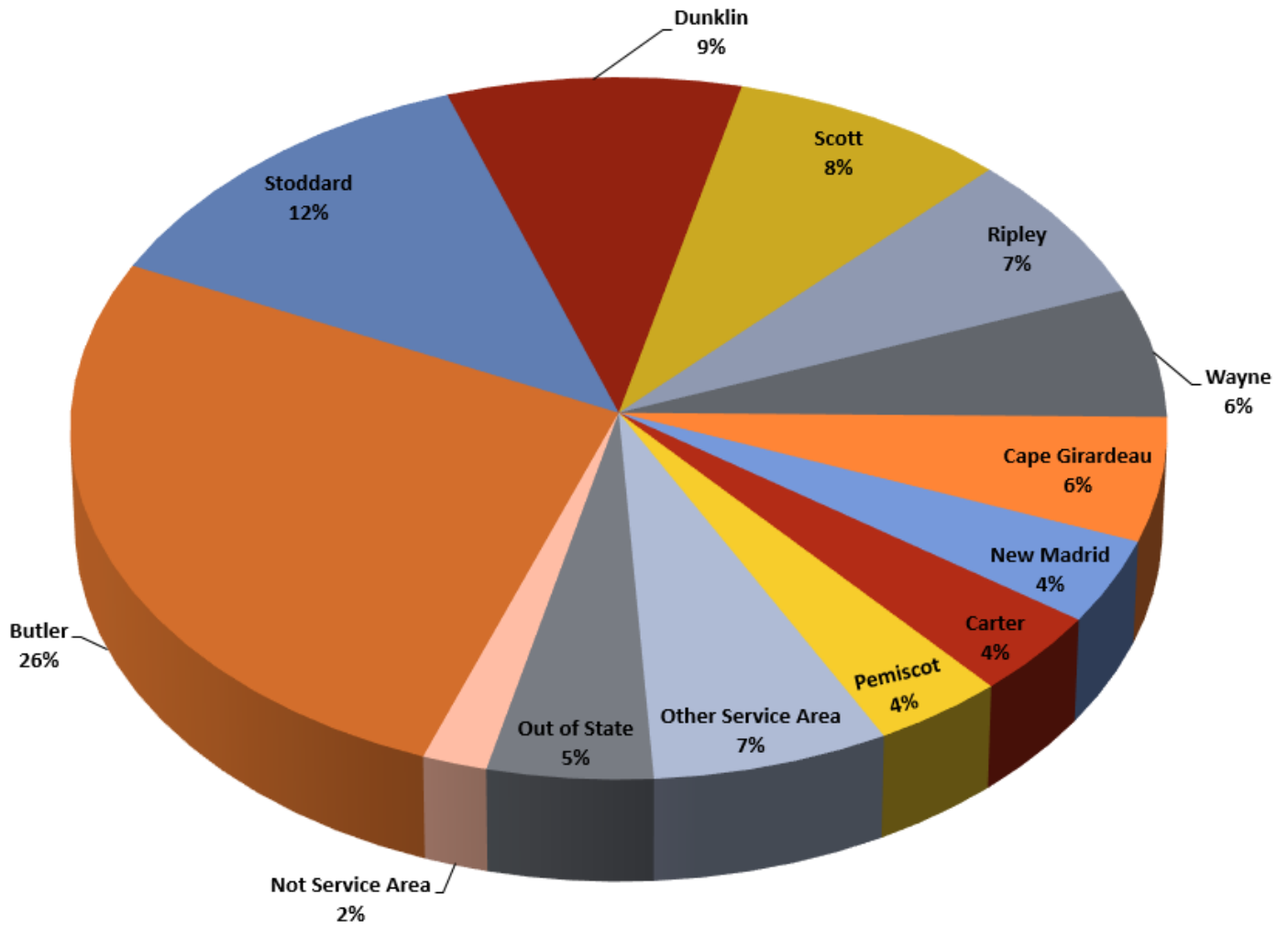
NUMBER OF NEW STUDENTS BY TERM

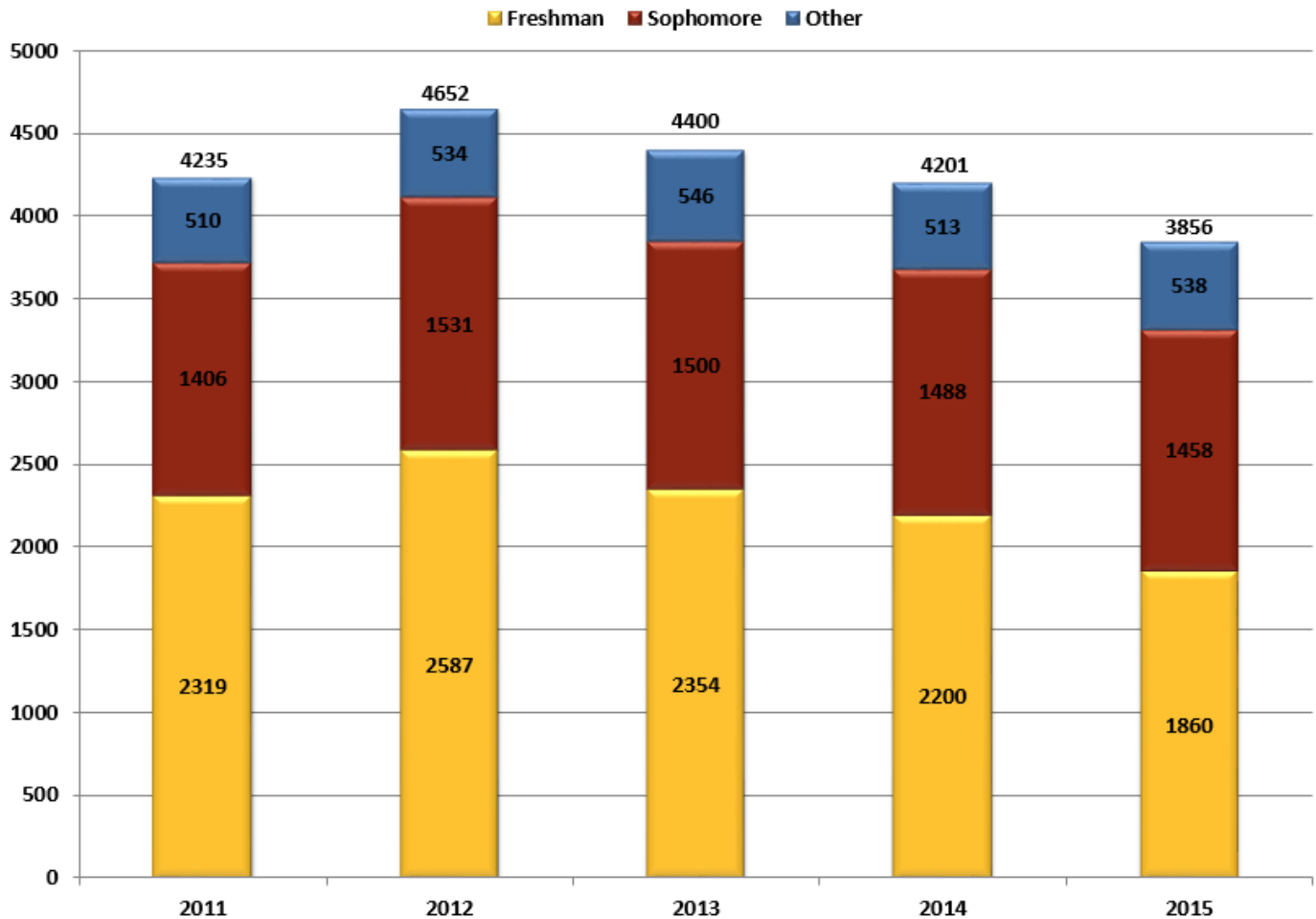

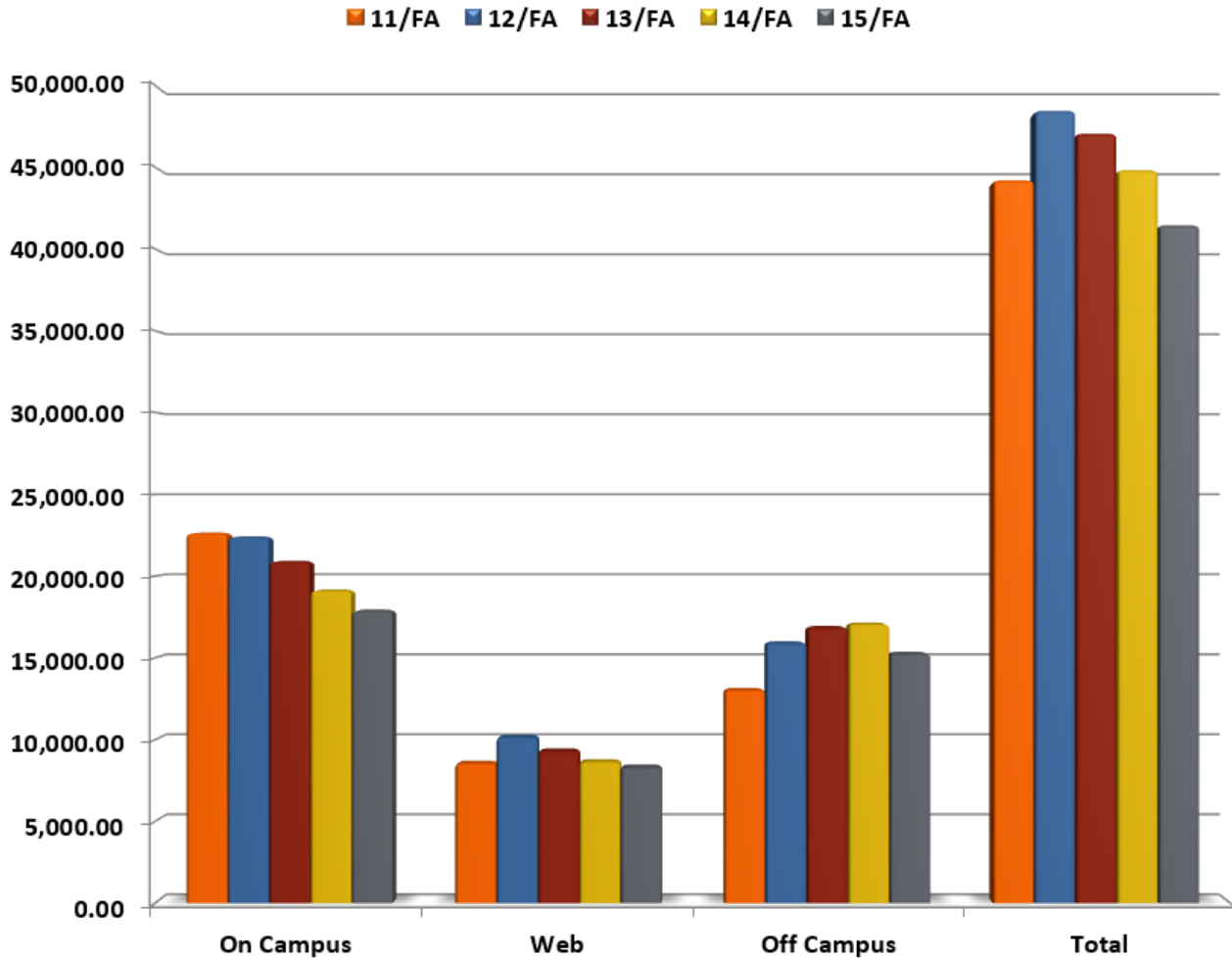

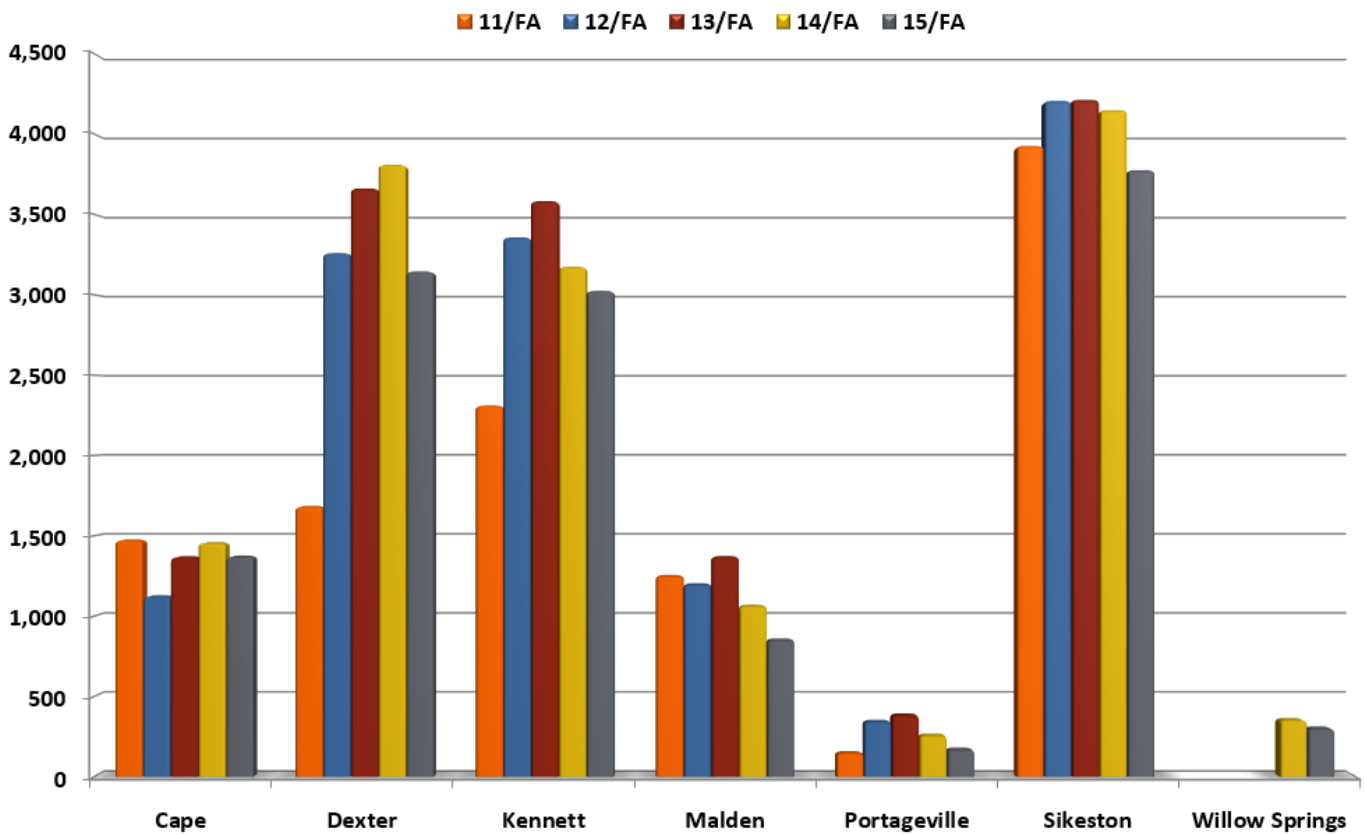
TOTAL CREDIT HOURS

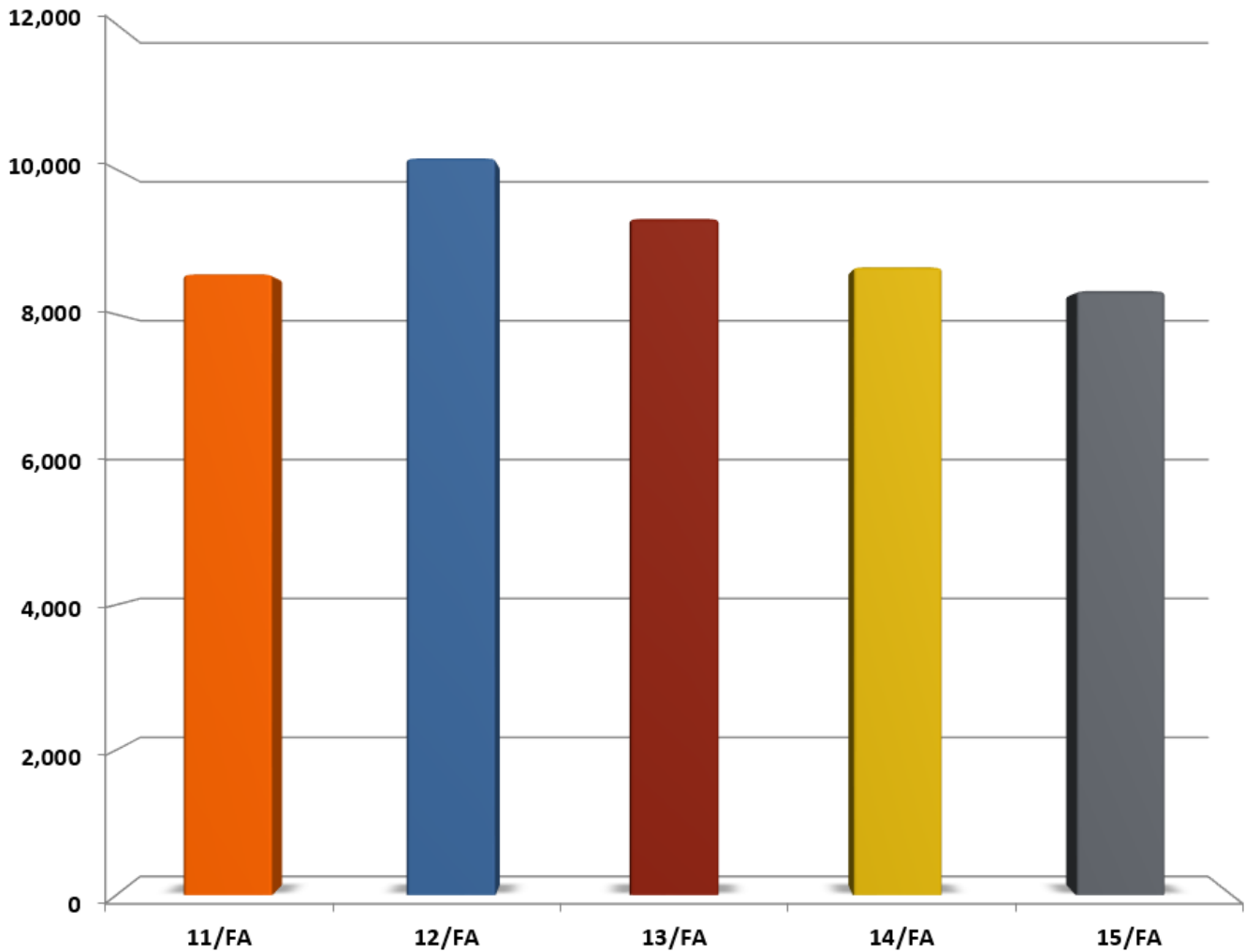

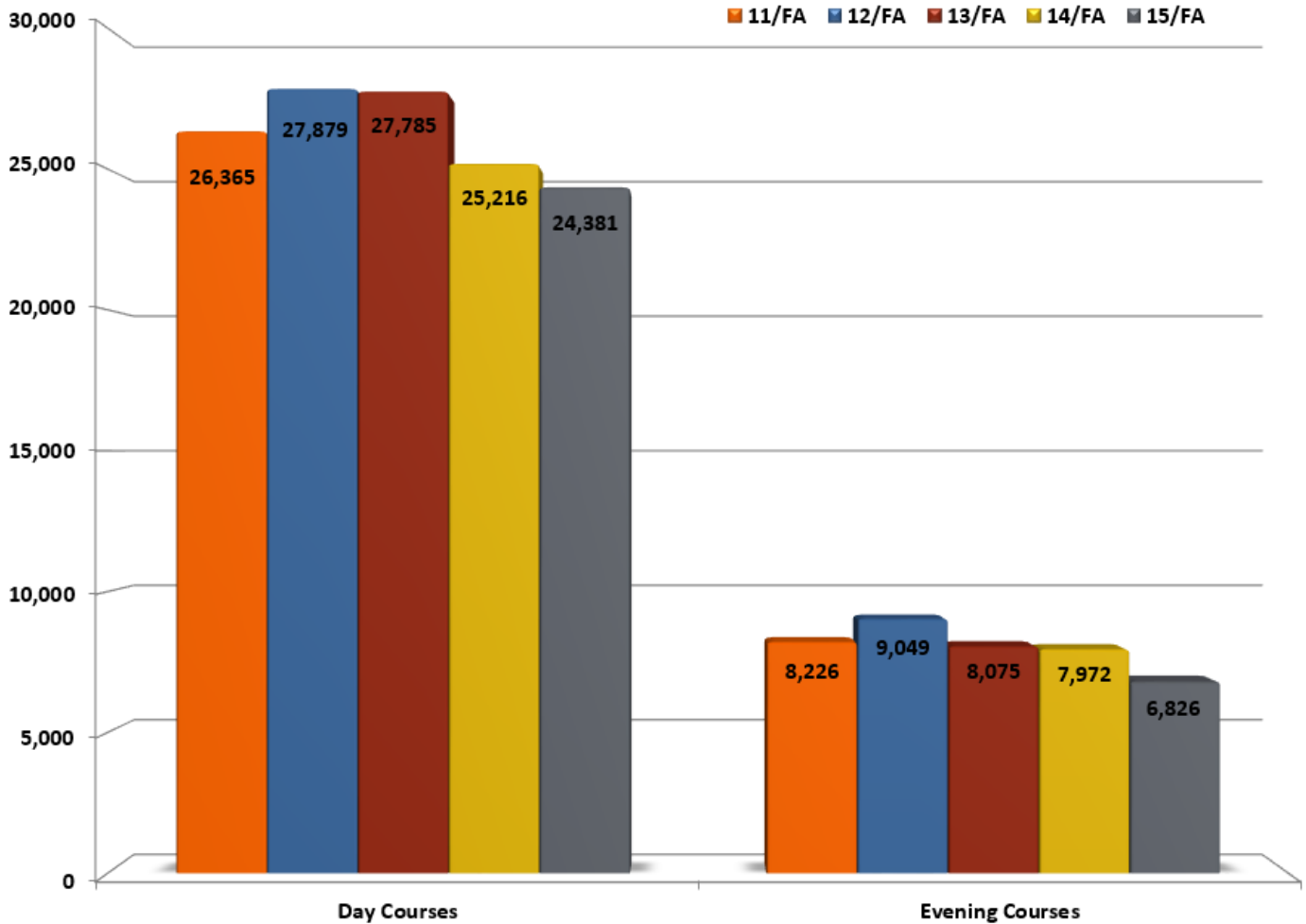

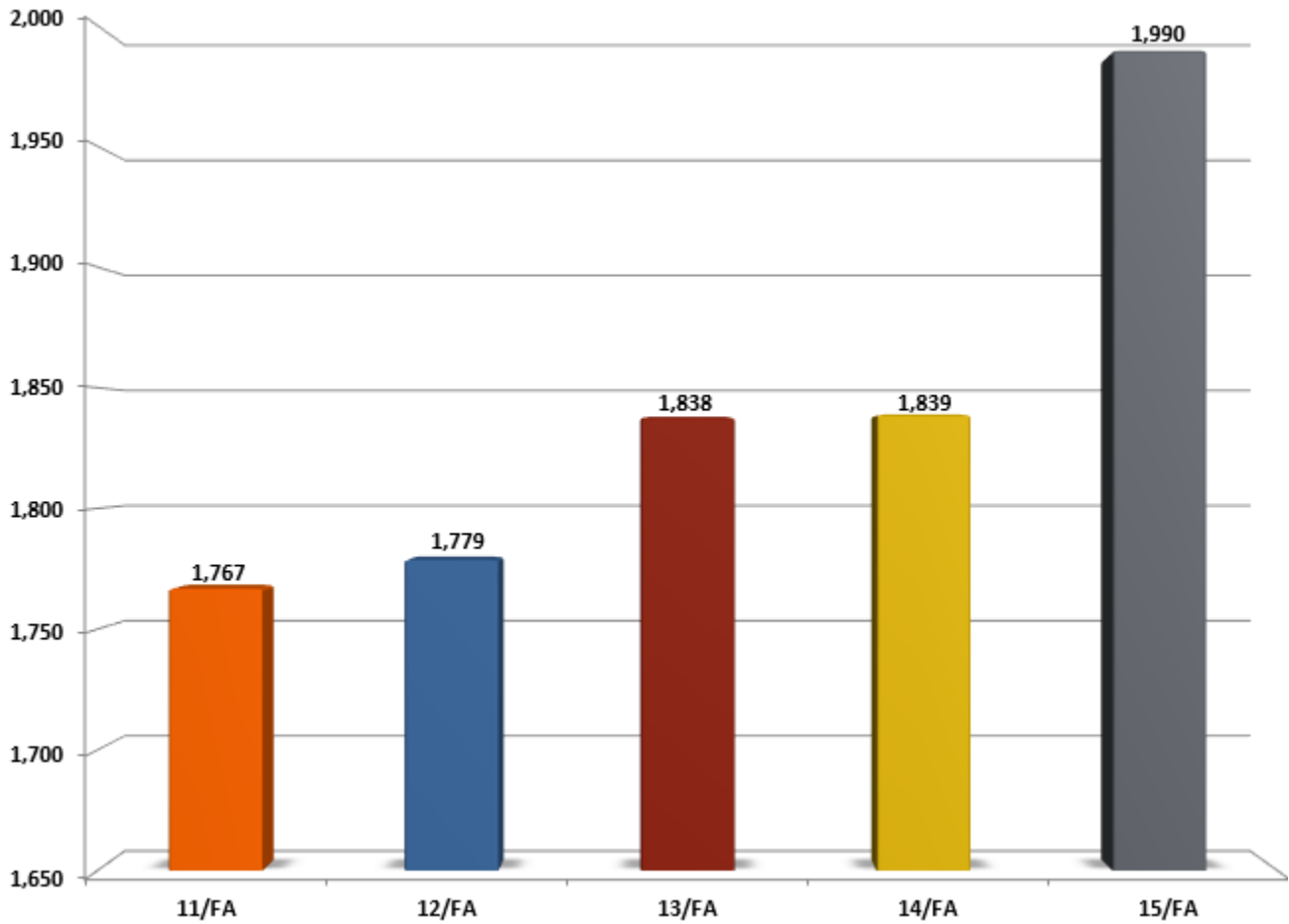
CREDIT HOURS FOR FALL SESSIONS

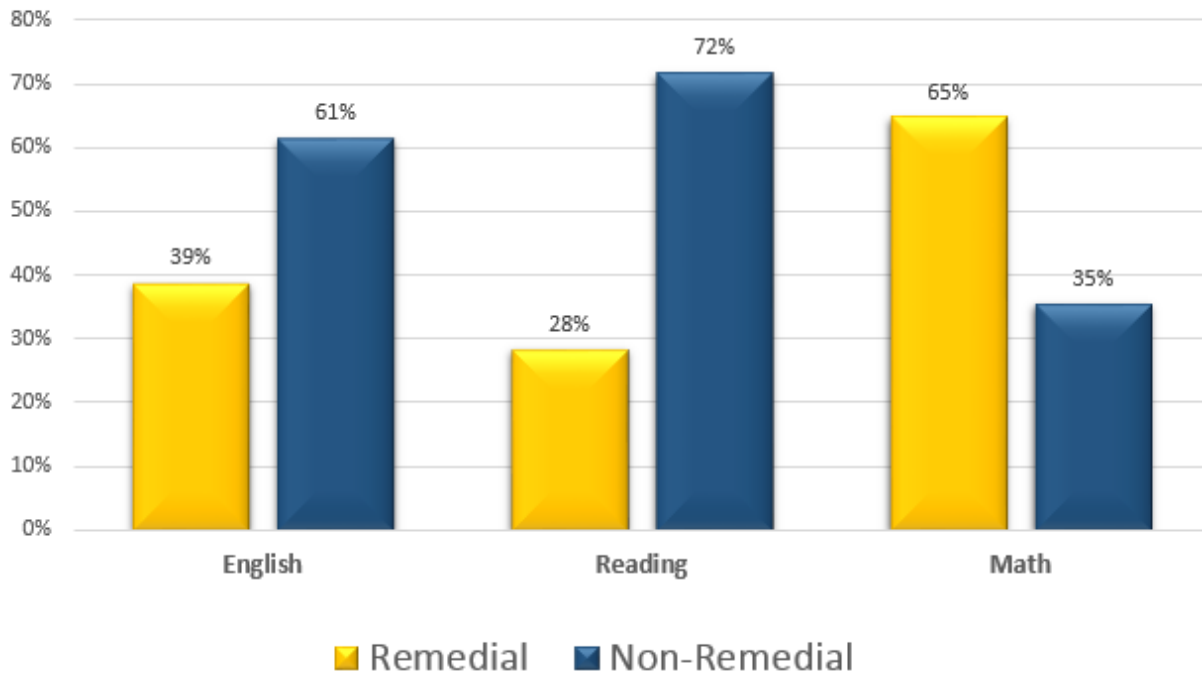

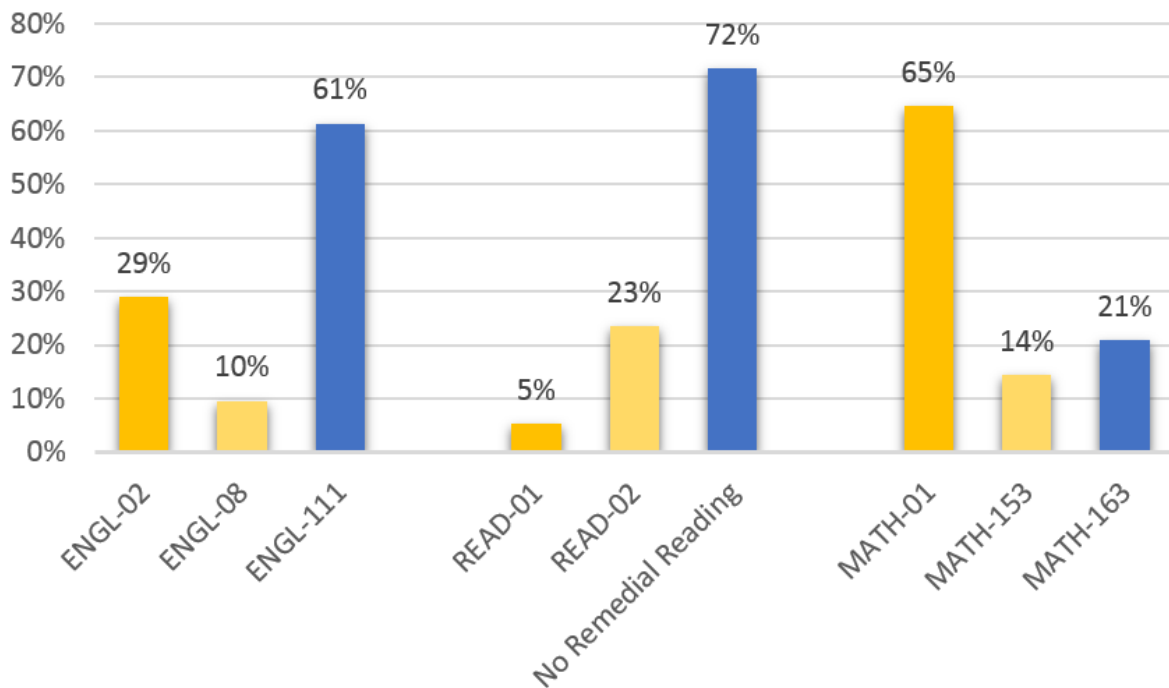
PLACEMENT SCORES

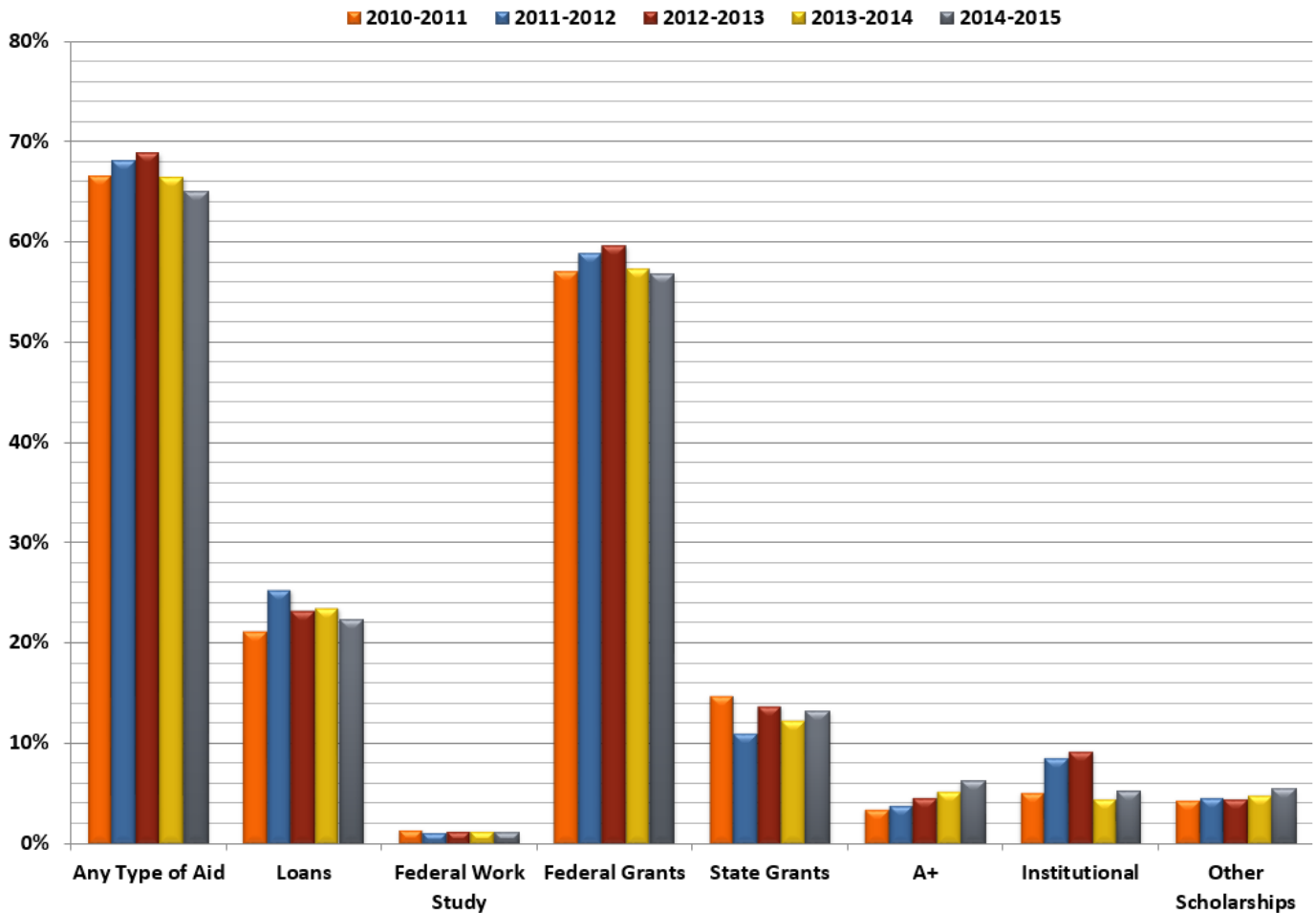

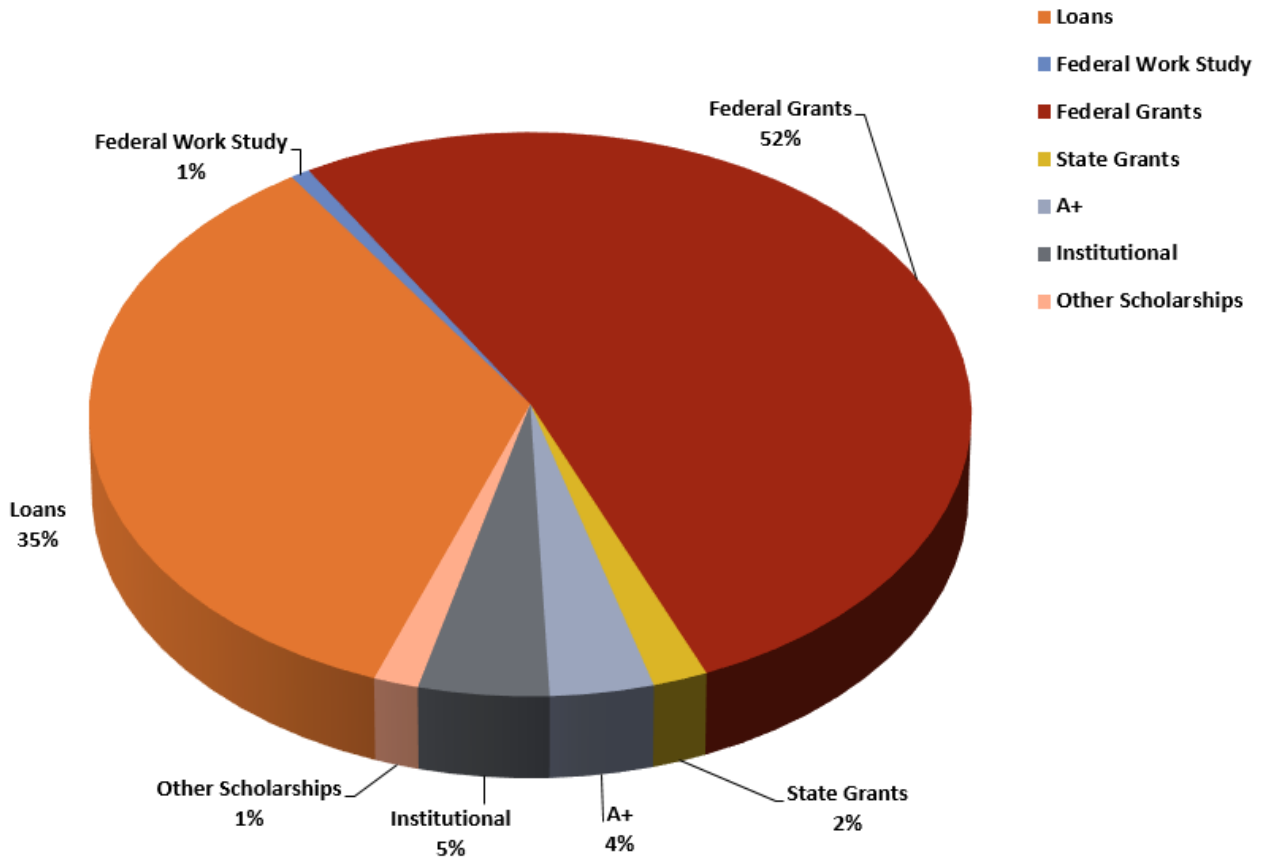
PERCENTAGE OF ALL STUDENTS RECEIVING AID

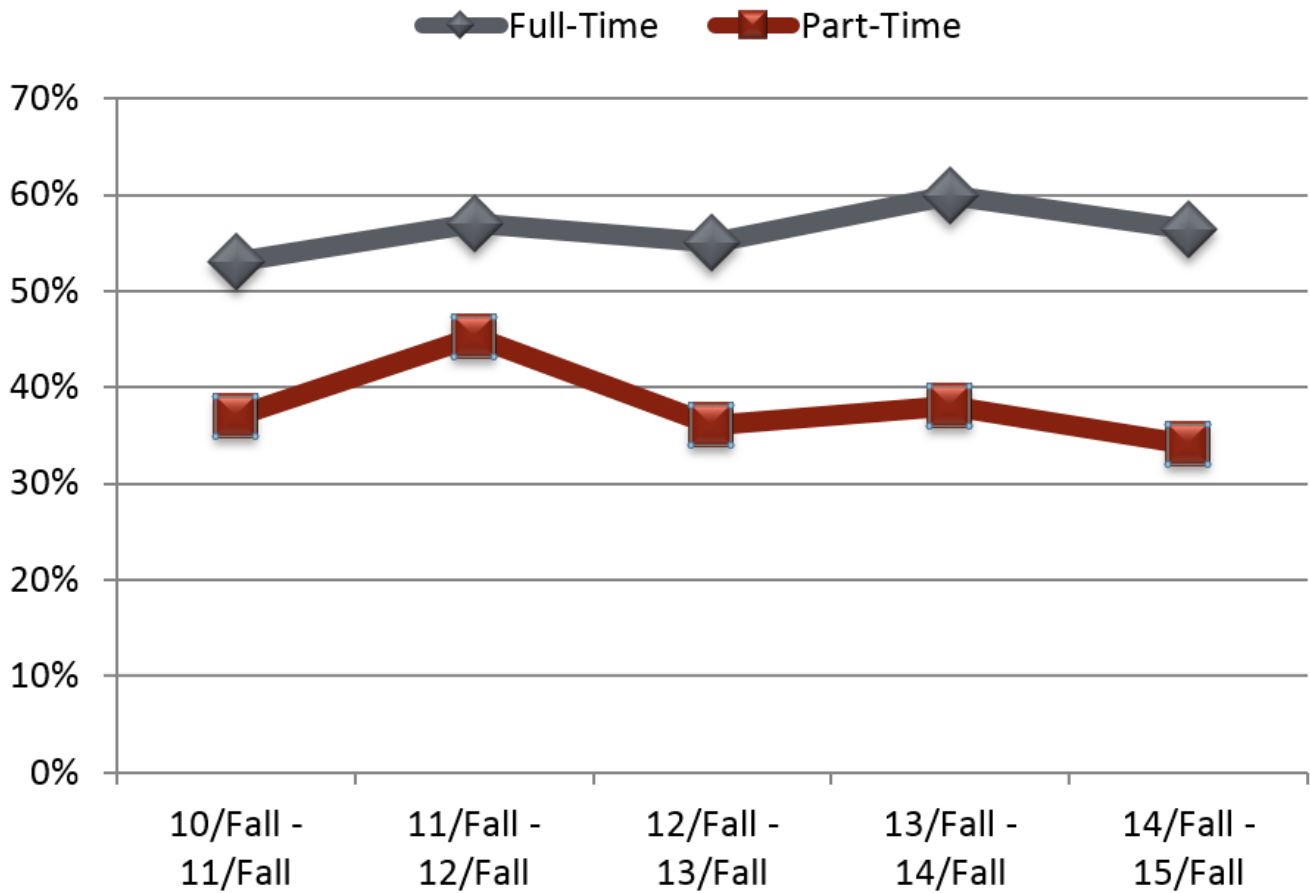
FINANCIAL AID AWARDED

FIRST –TIME STUDENT COHORT*



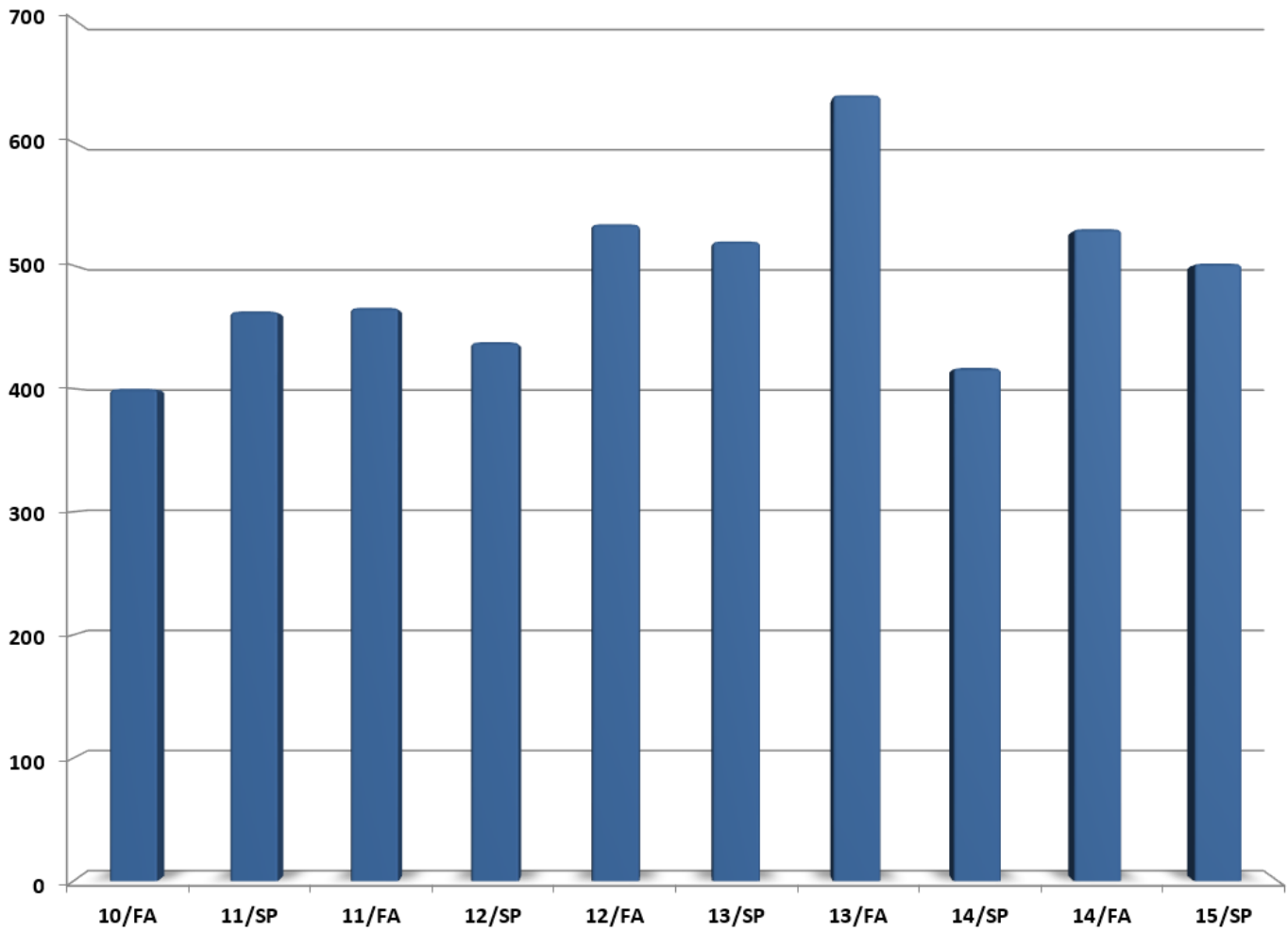

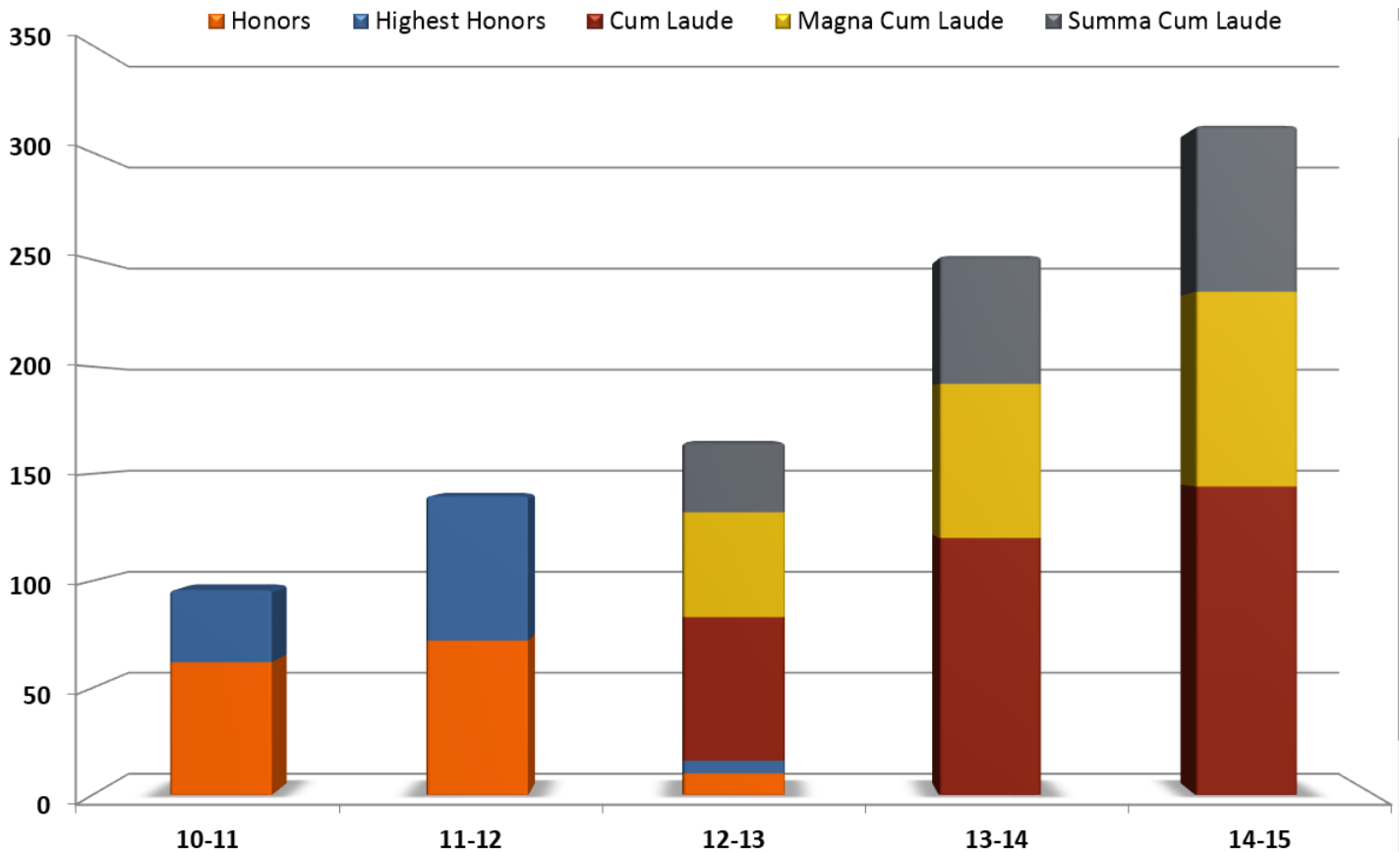

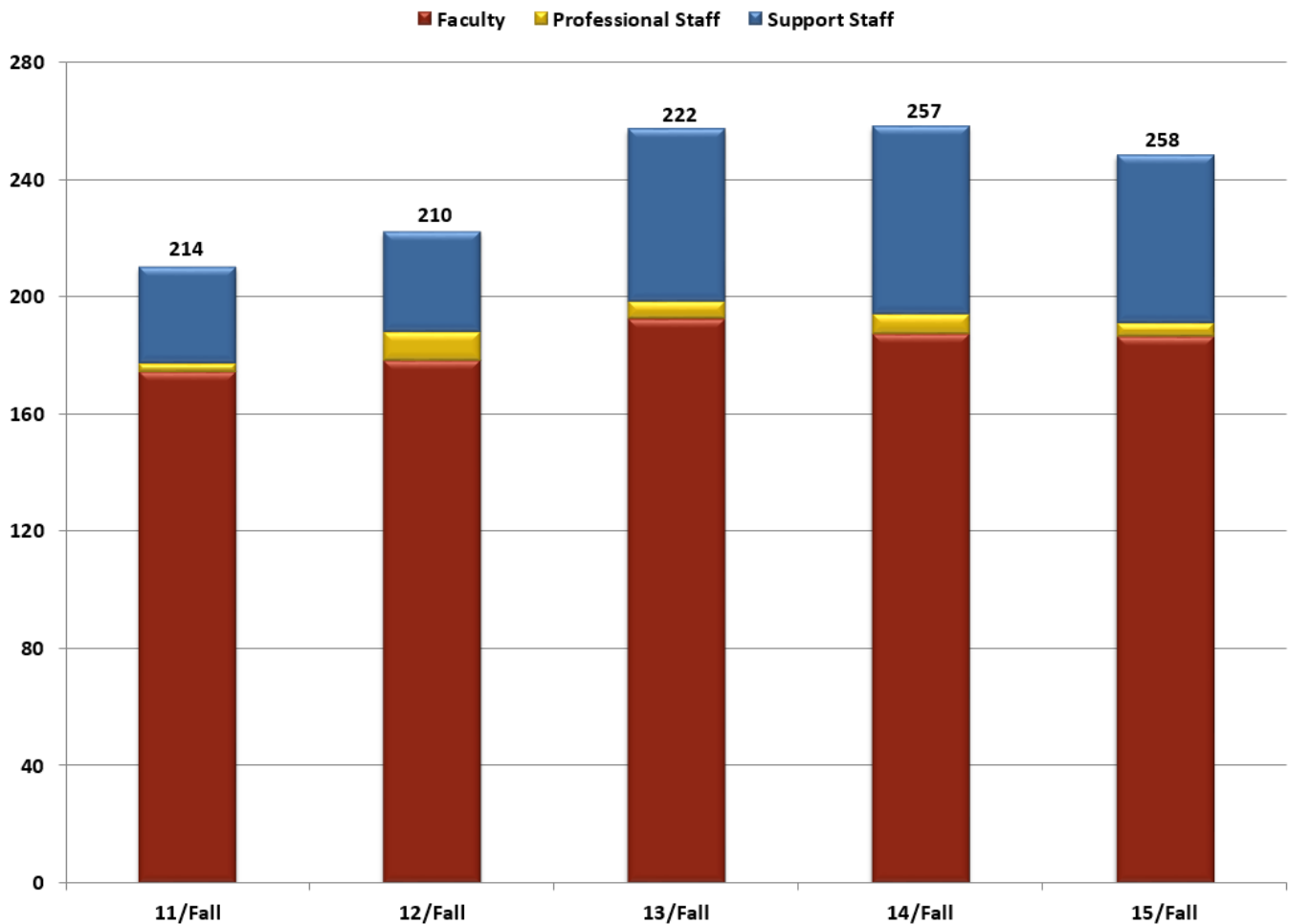

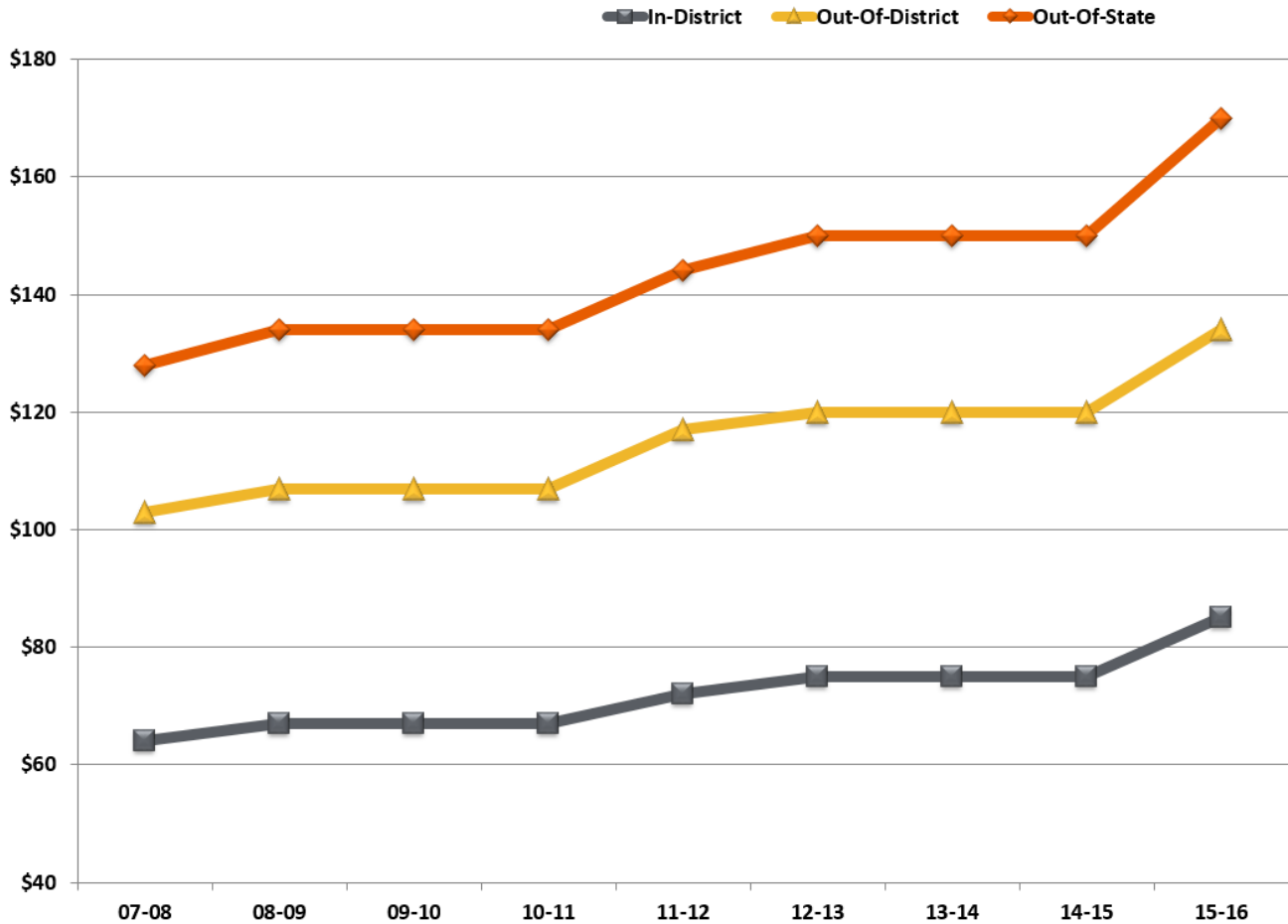

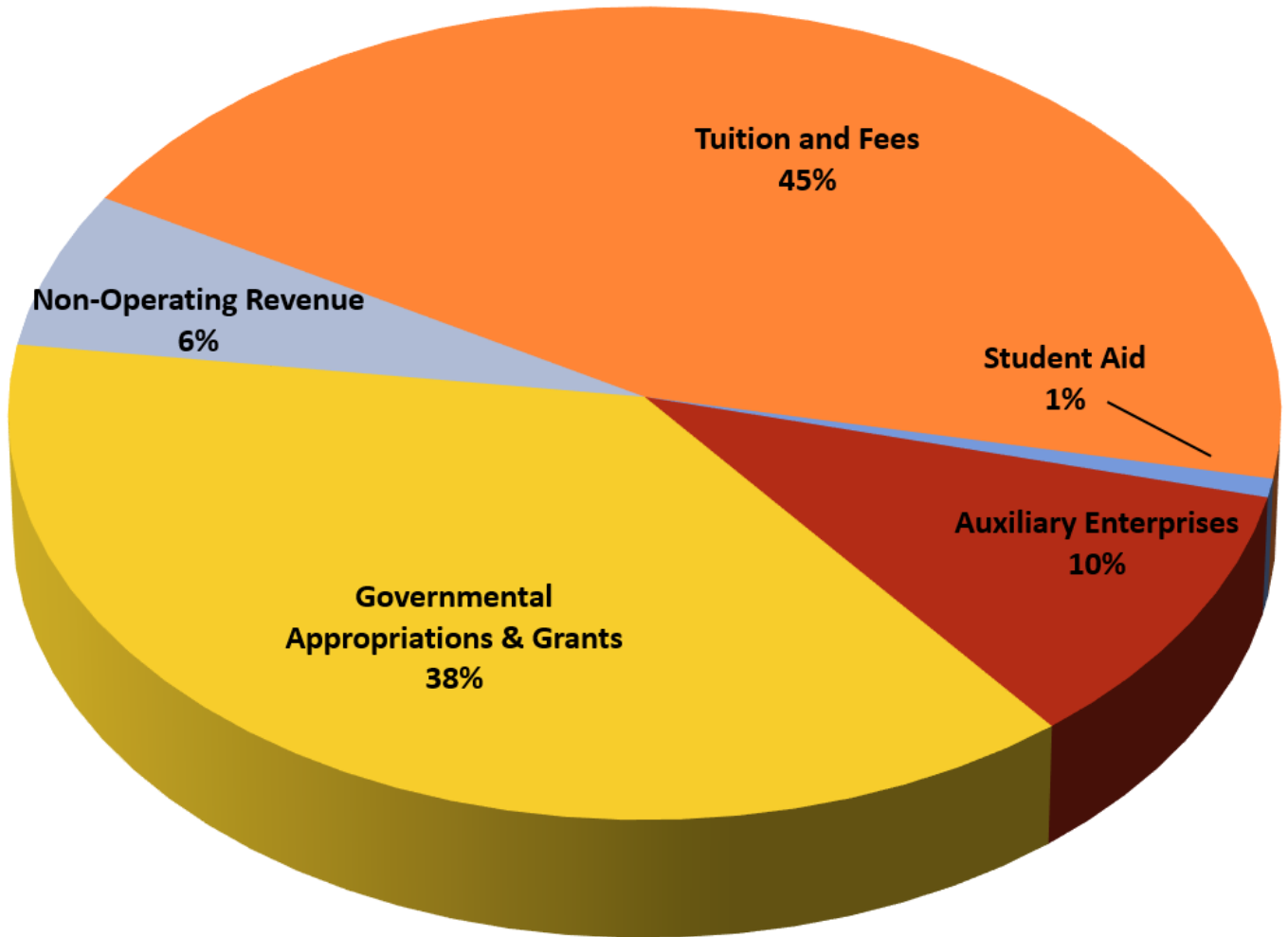

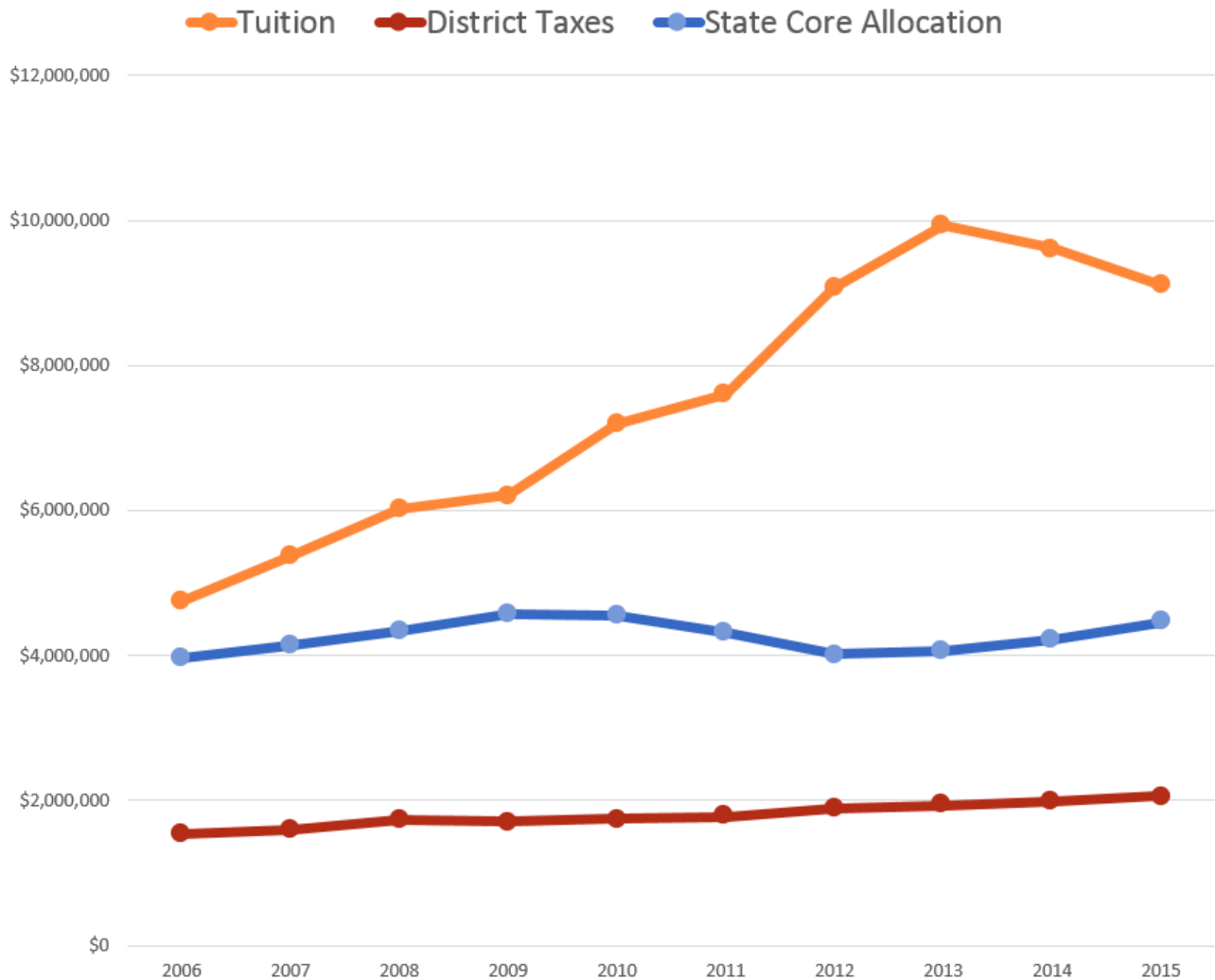
