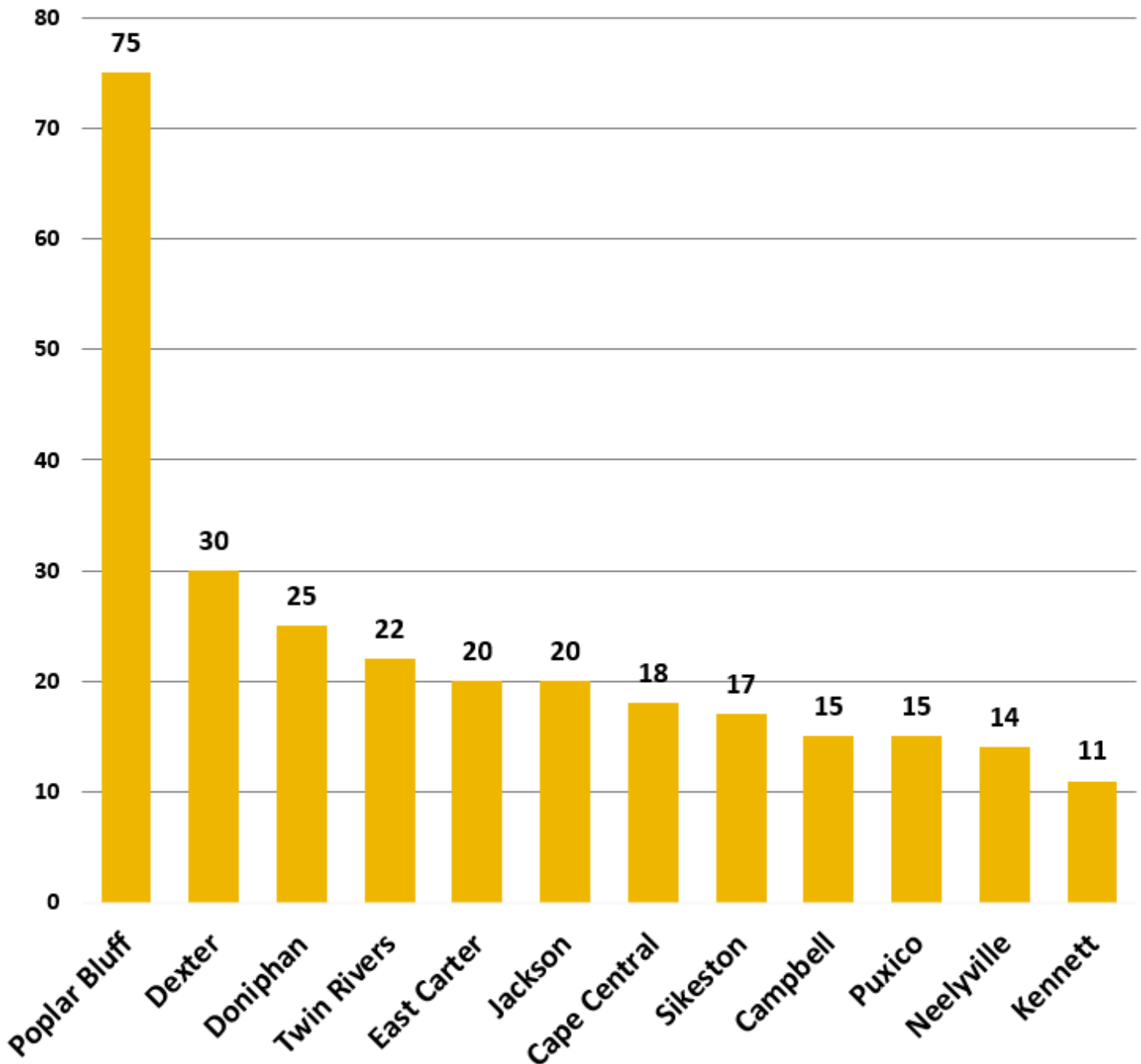

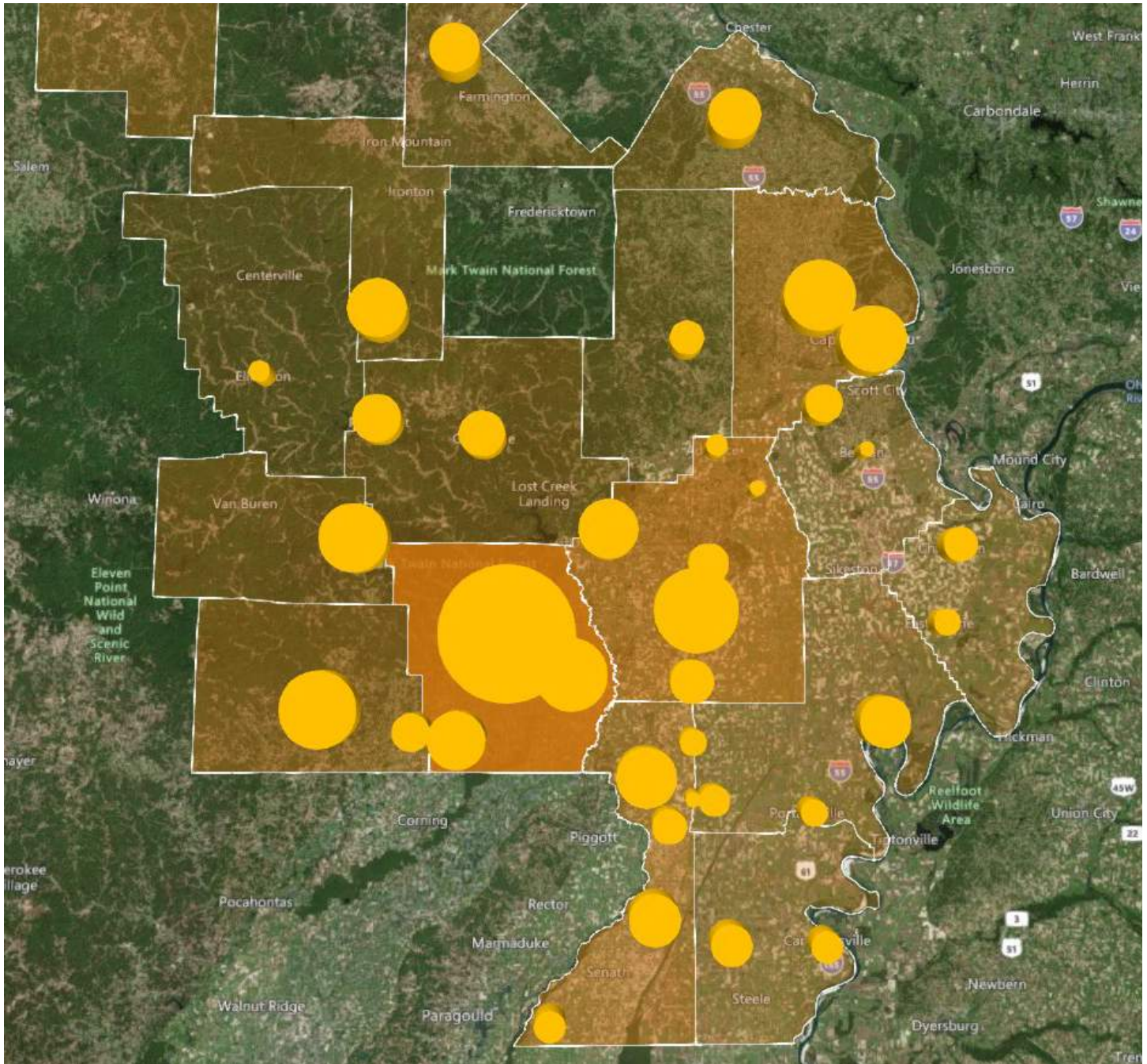

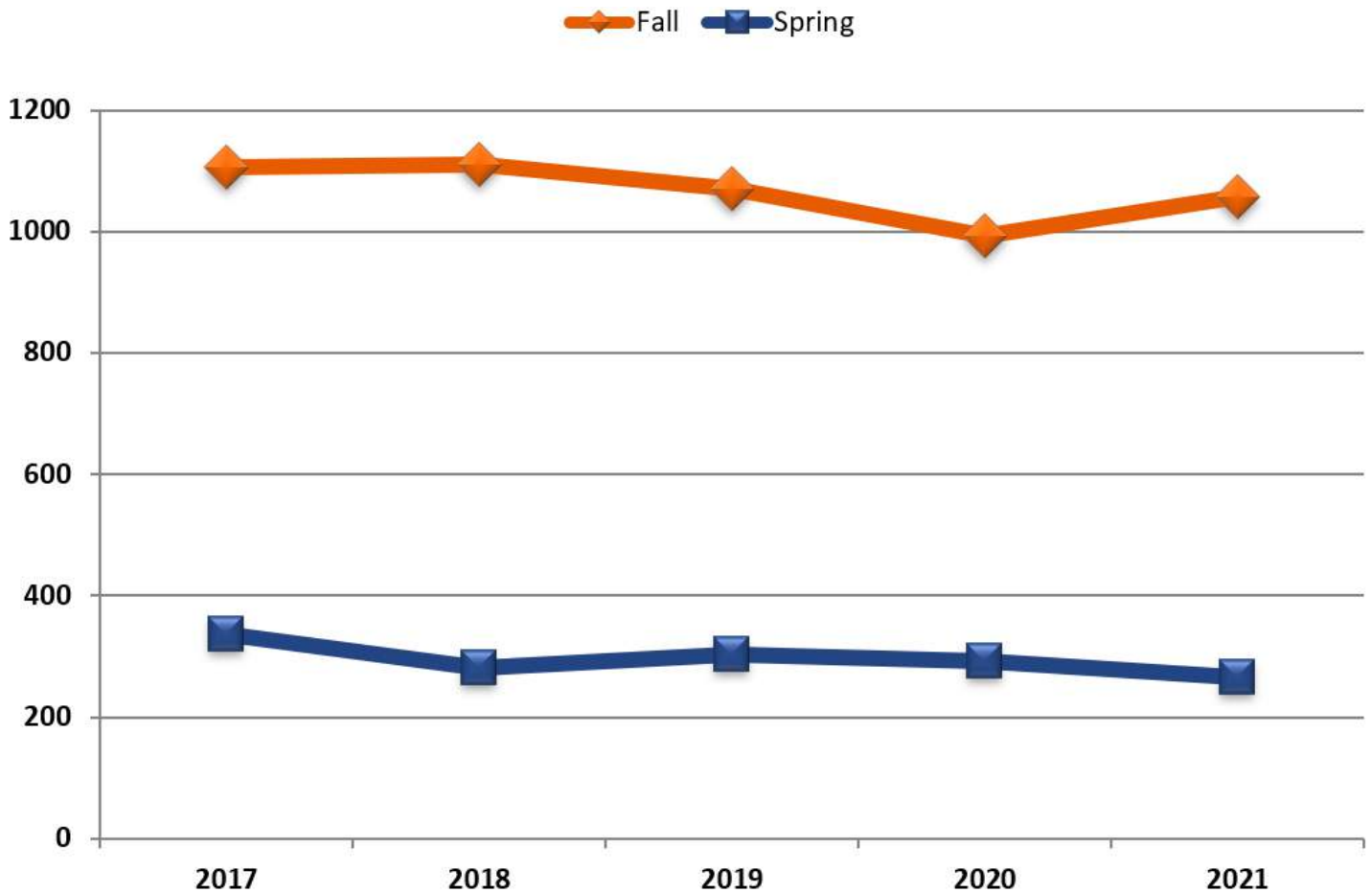
Enrollment by High School City & County

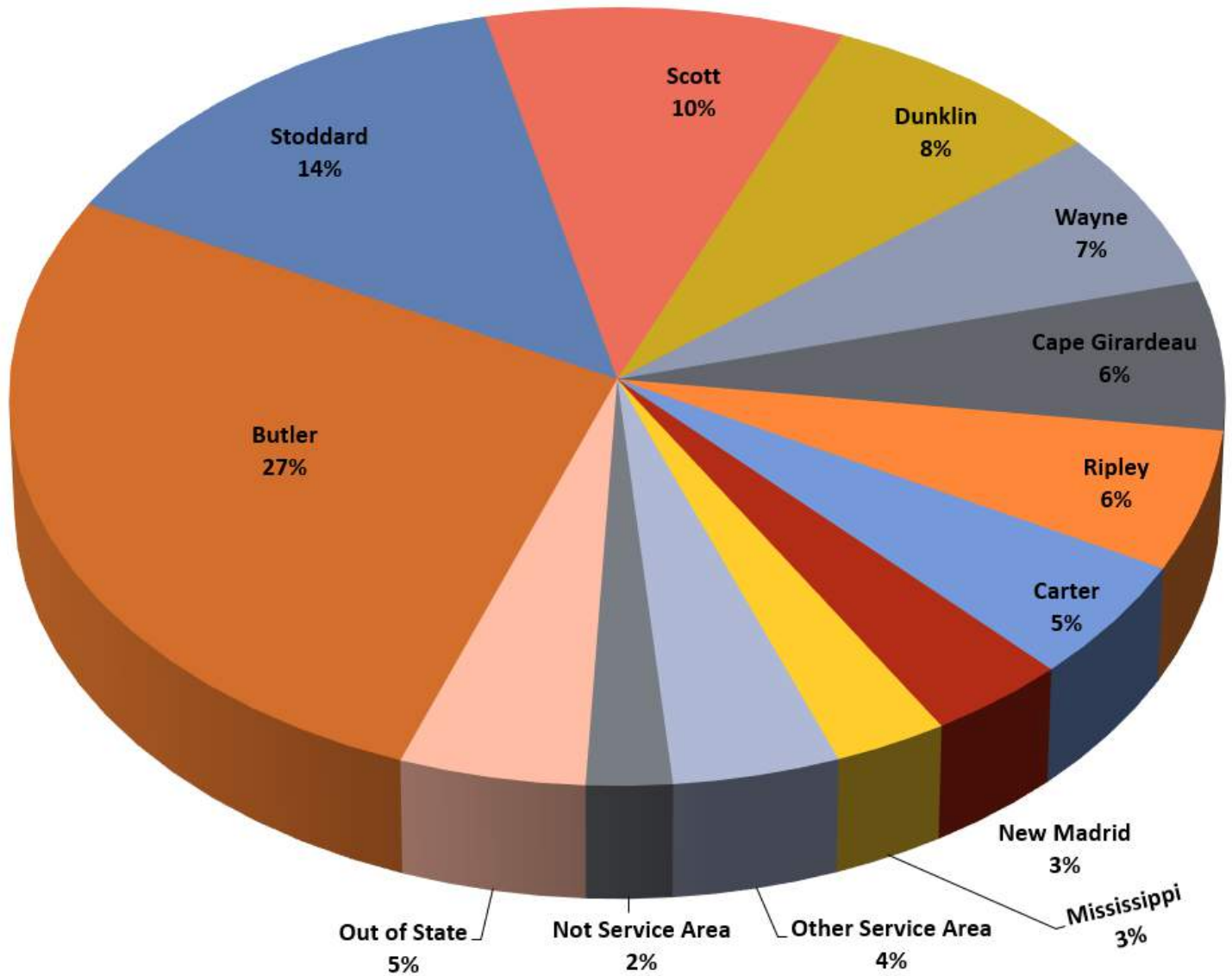

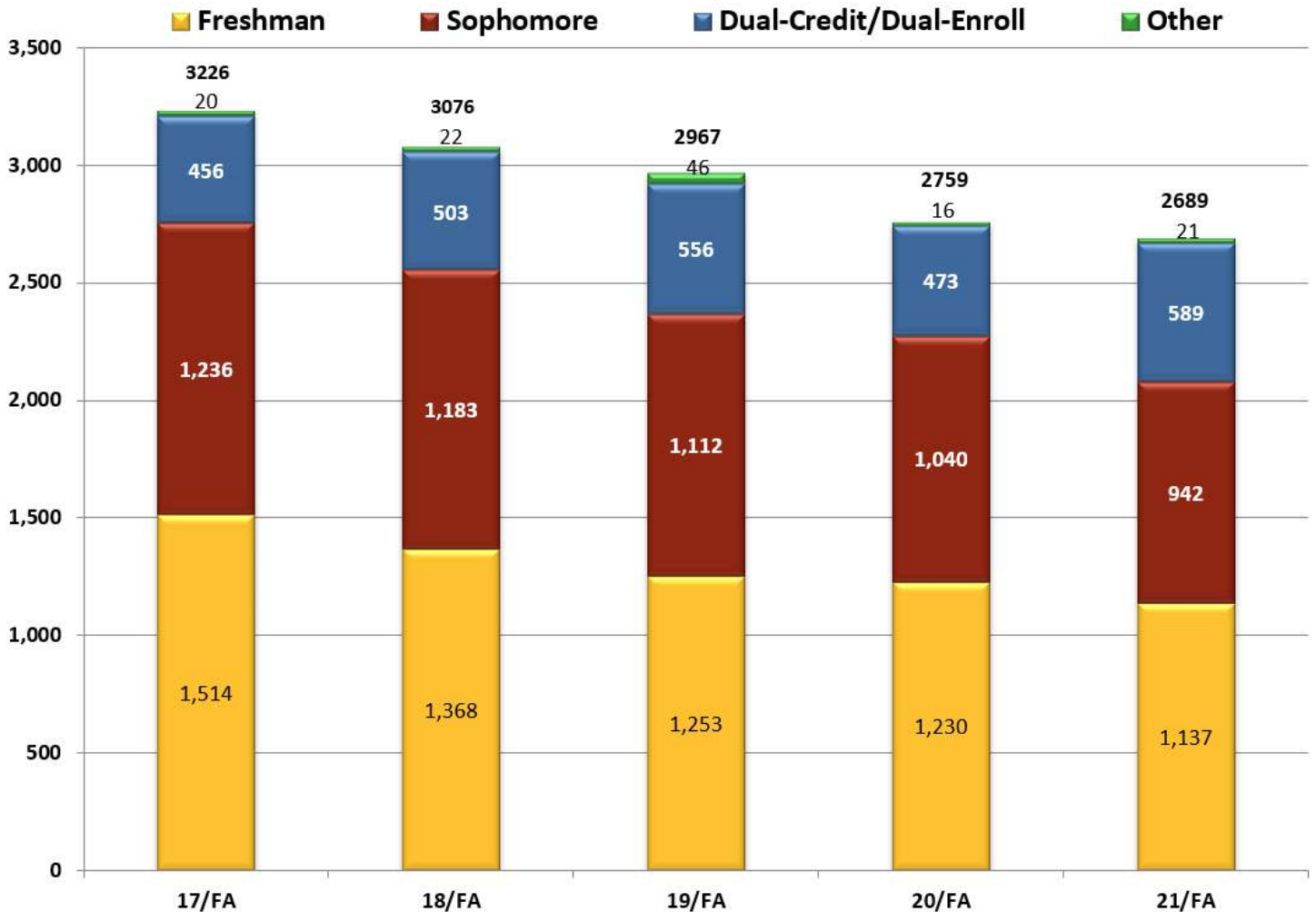

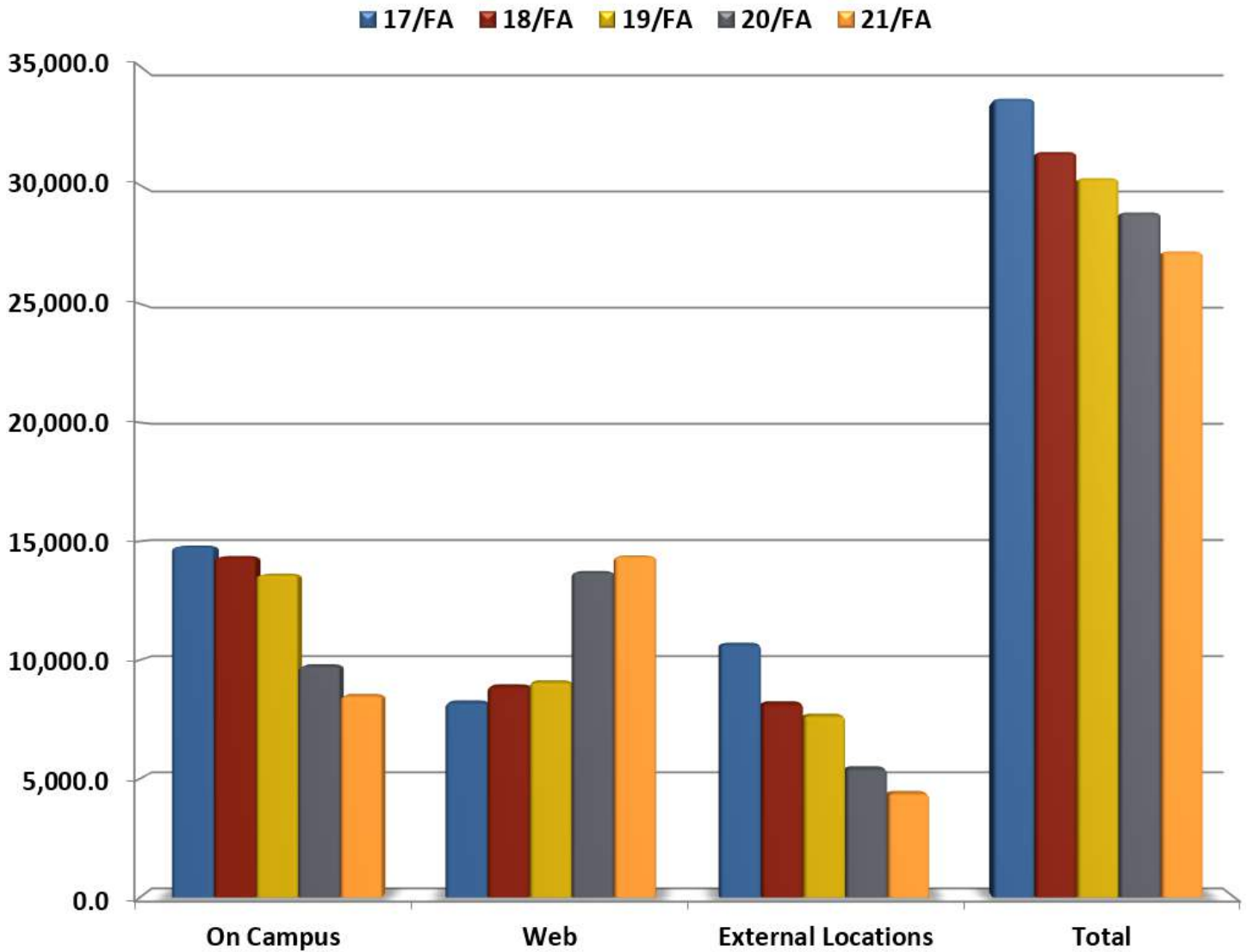

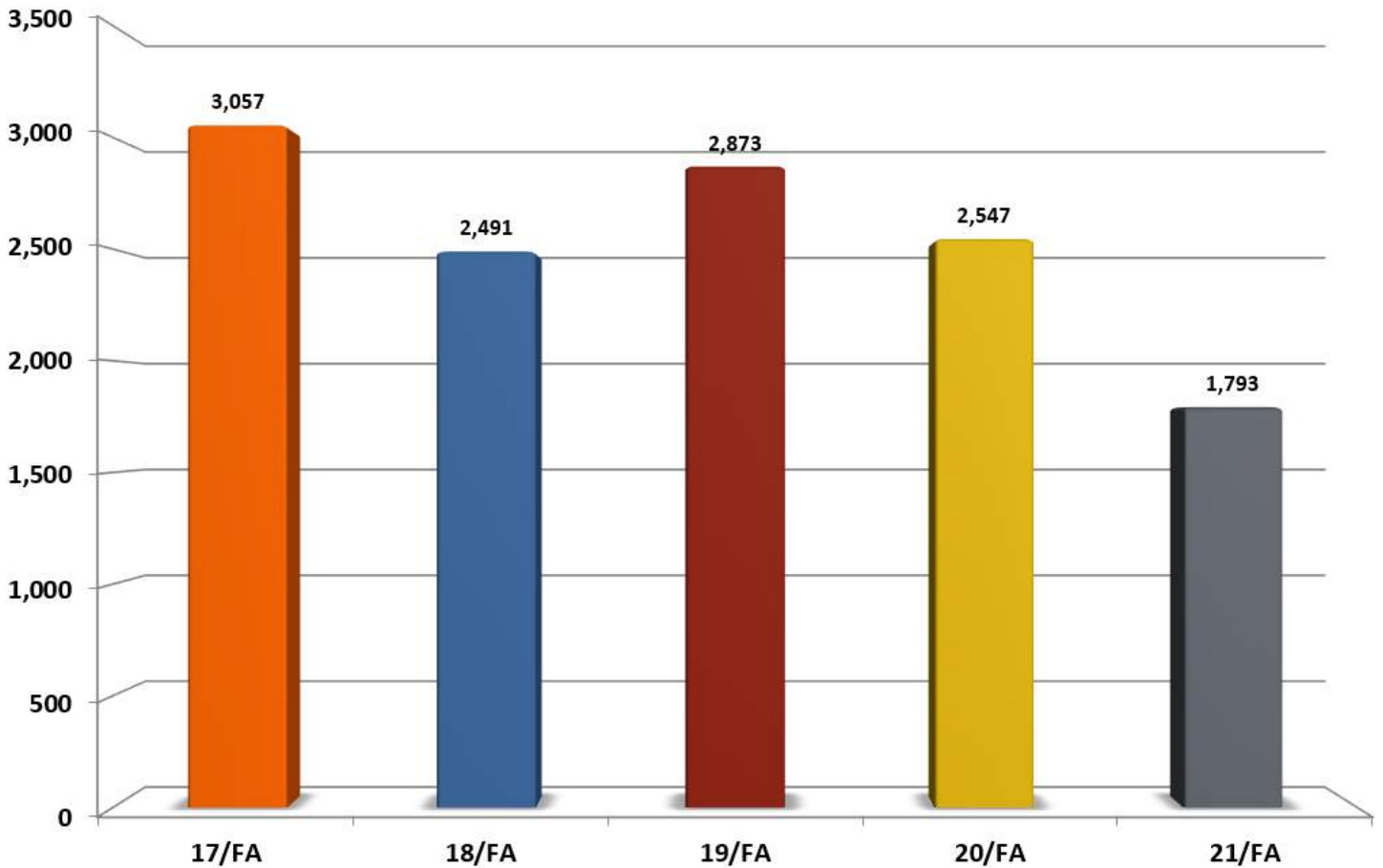

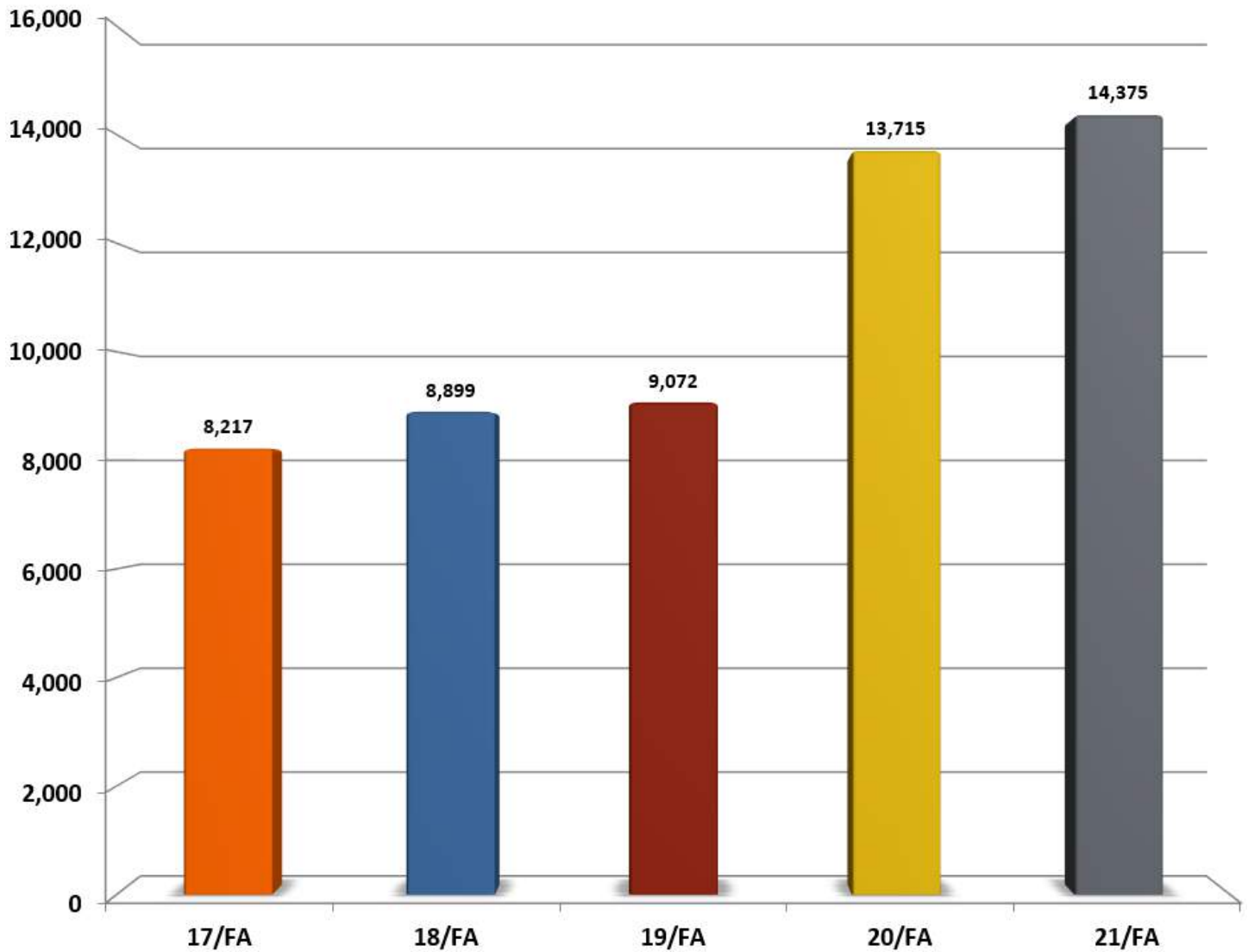

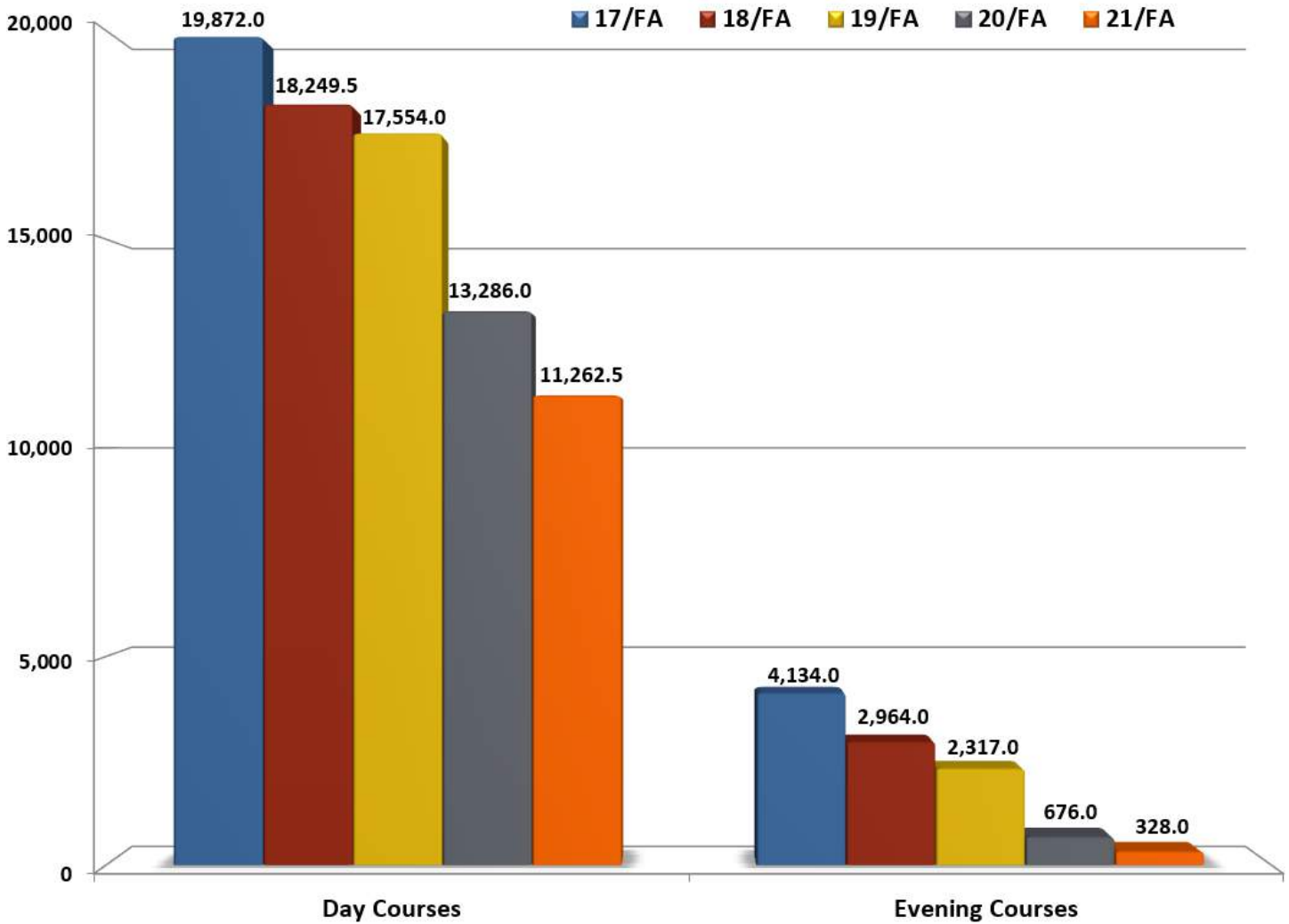

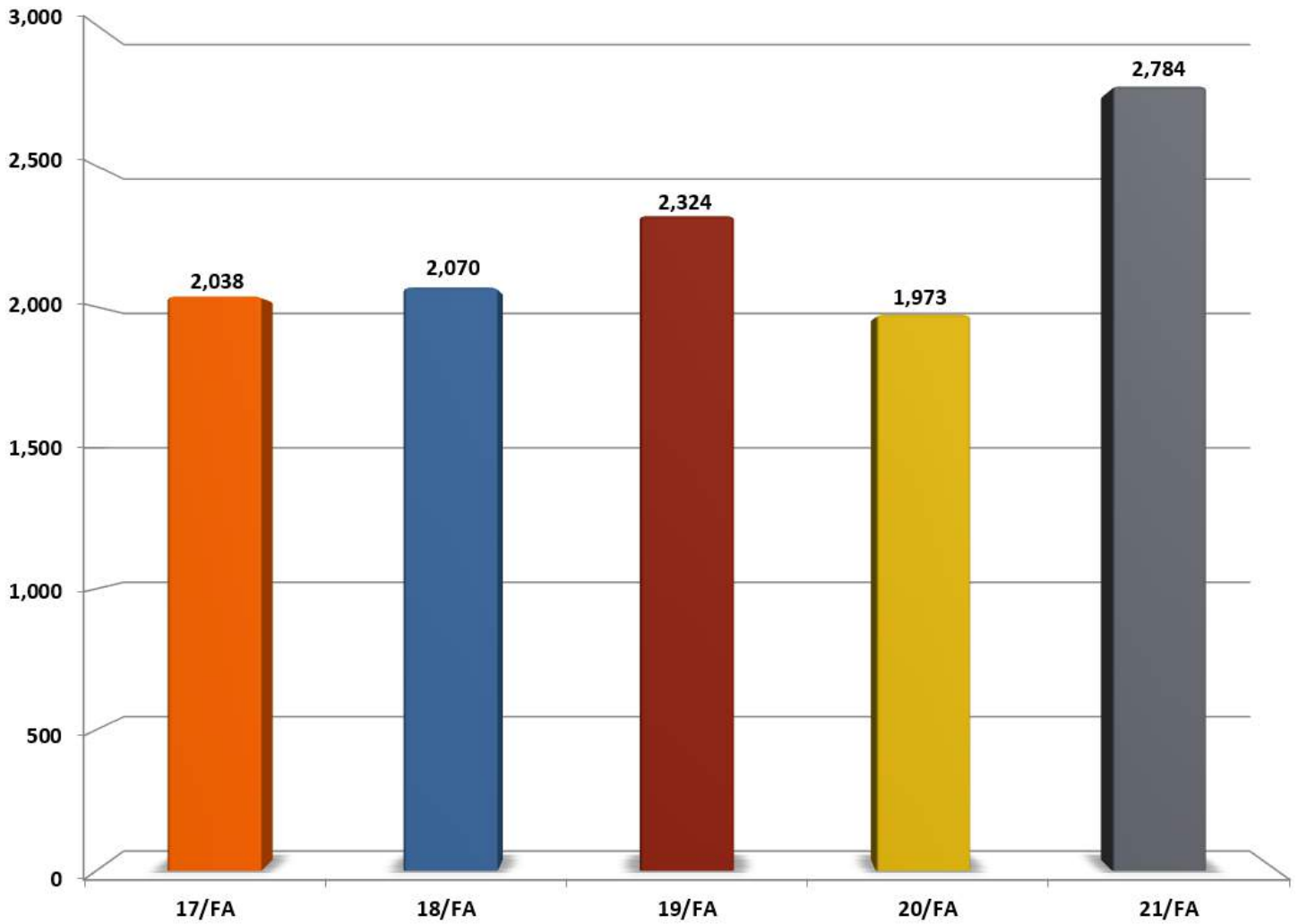

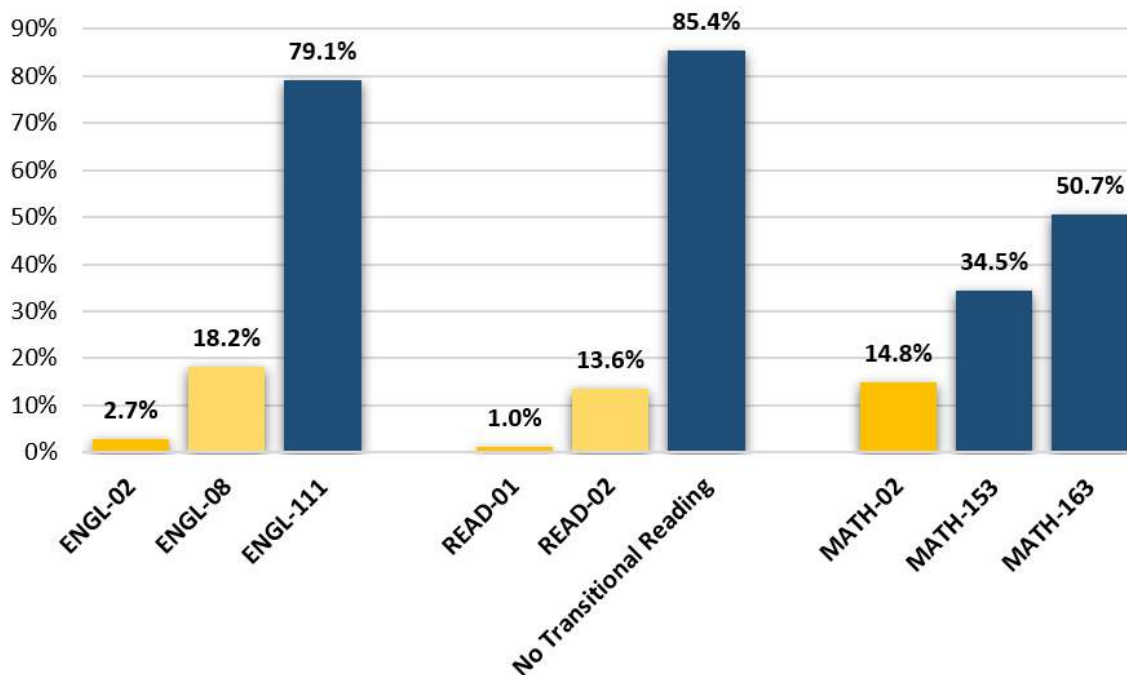

PERCENTAGE OF ALL STUDENTS RECEIVING AID



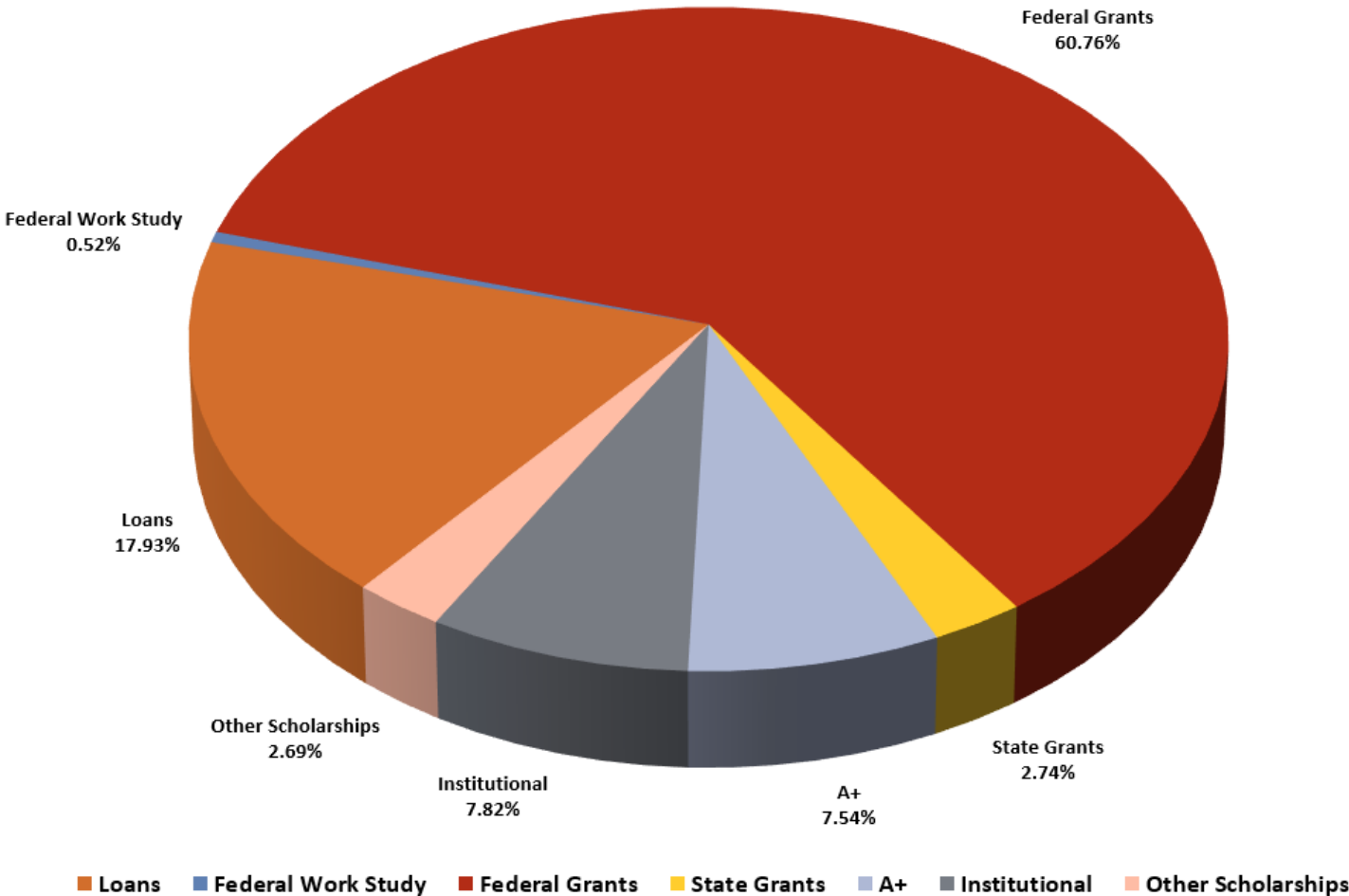

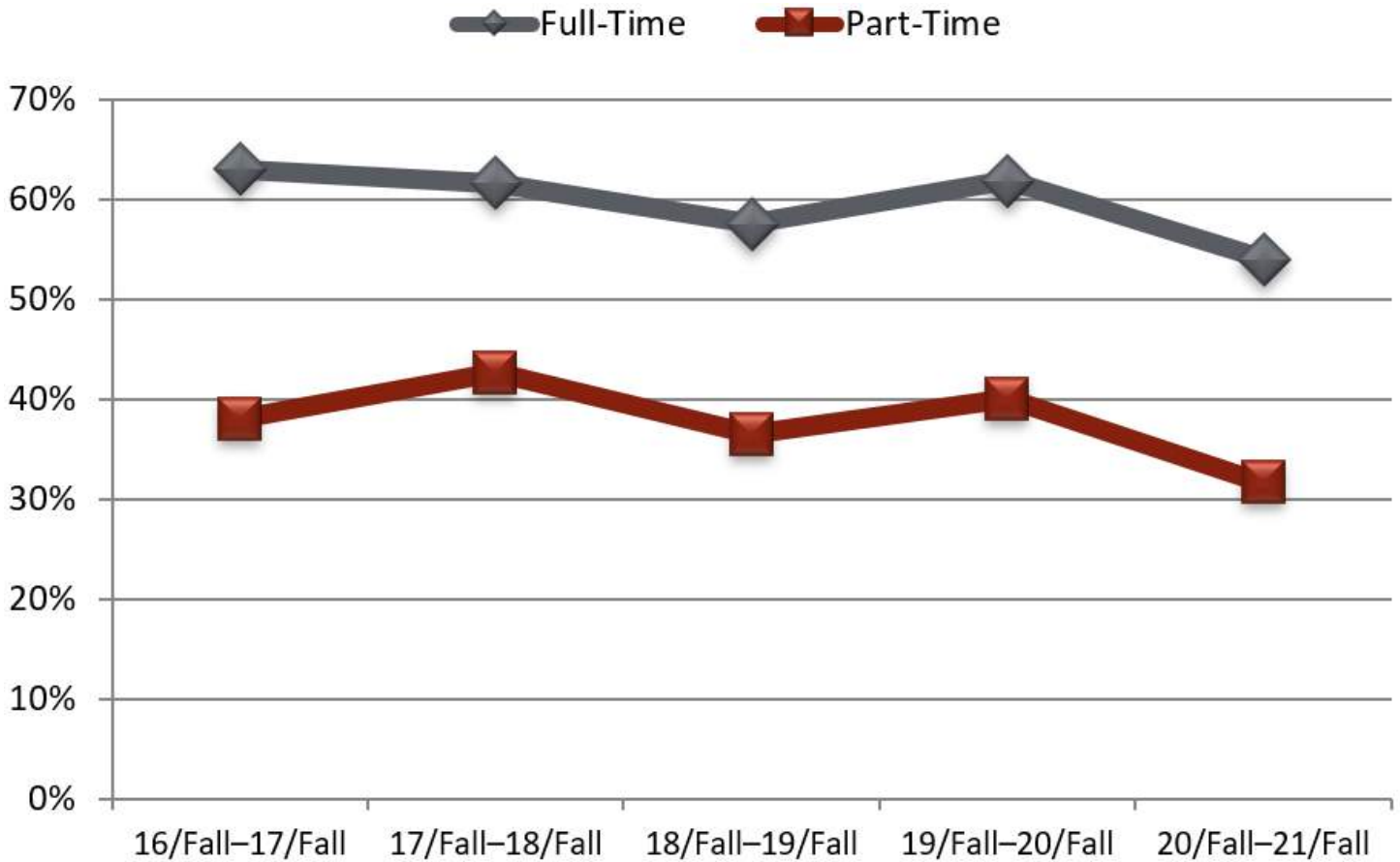
PERCENTAGE OF TOTAL DOLLARS AWARDED

FIRST –TIME STUDENT COHORT*

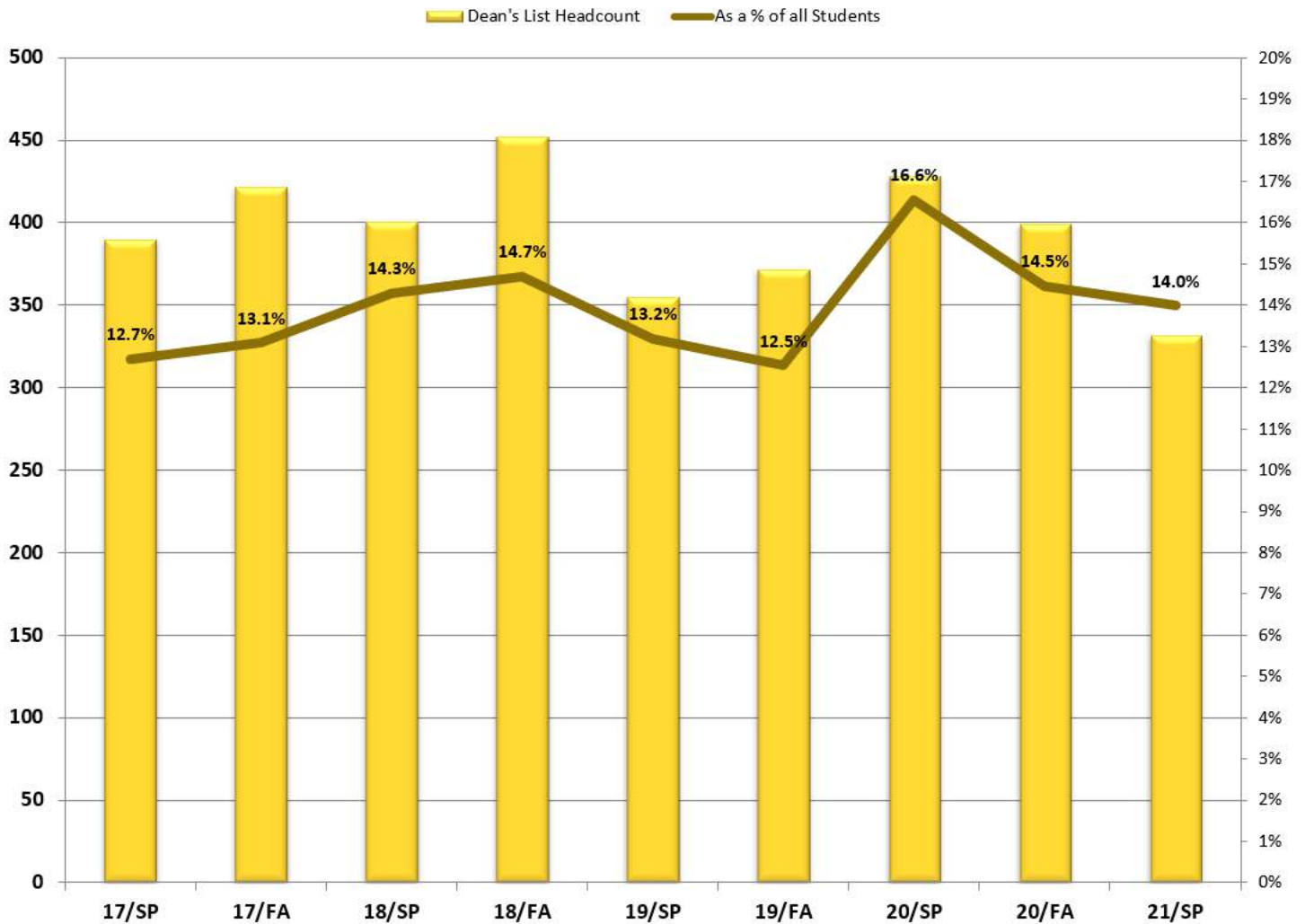

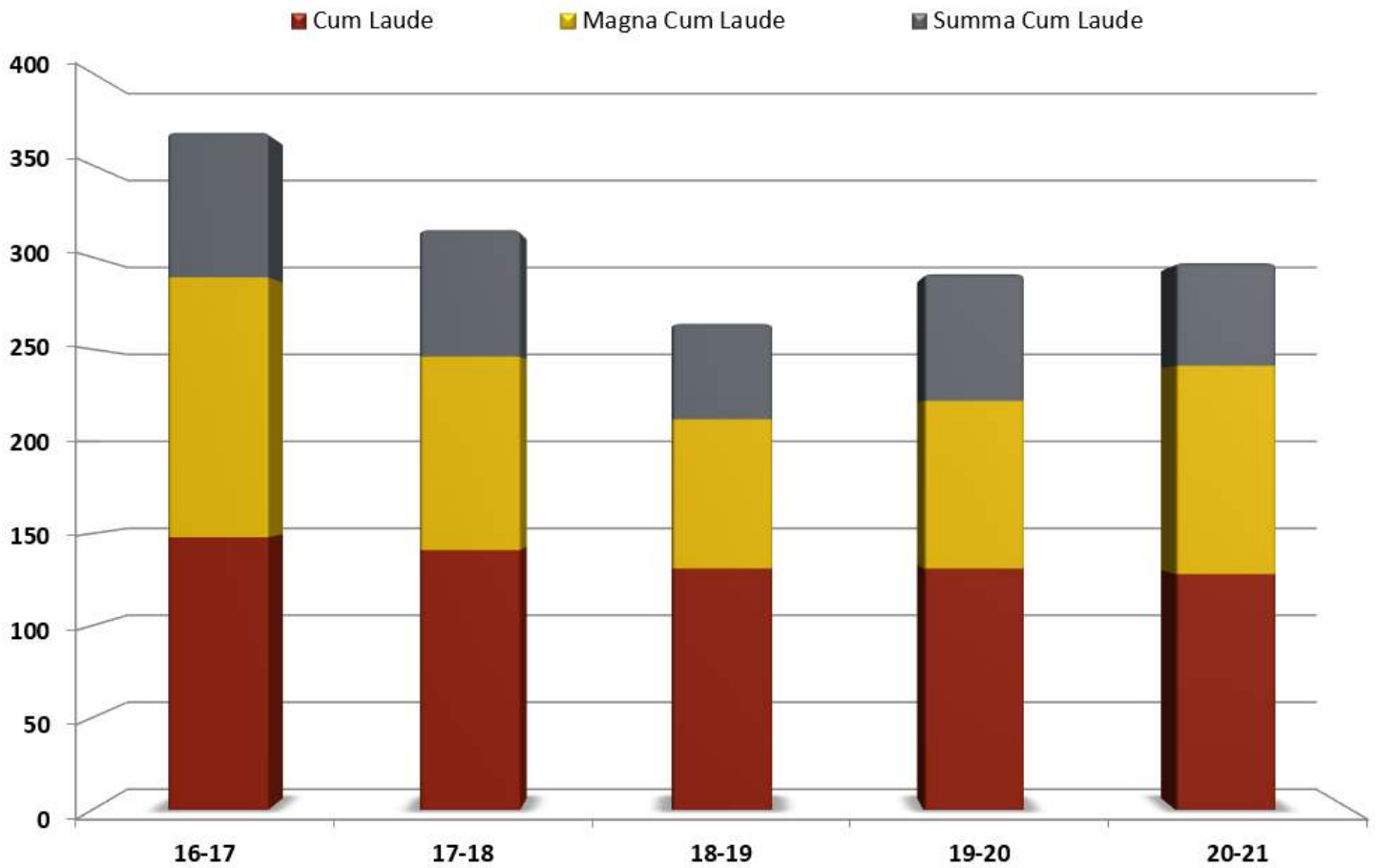

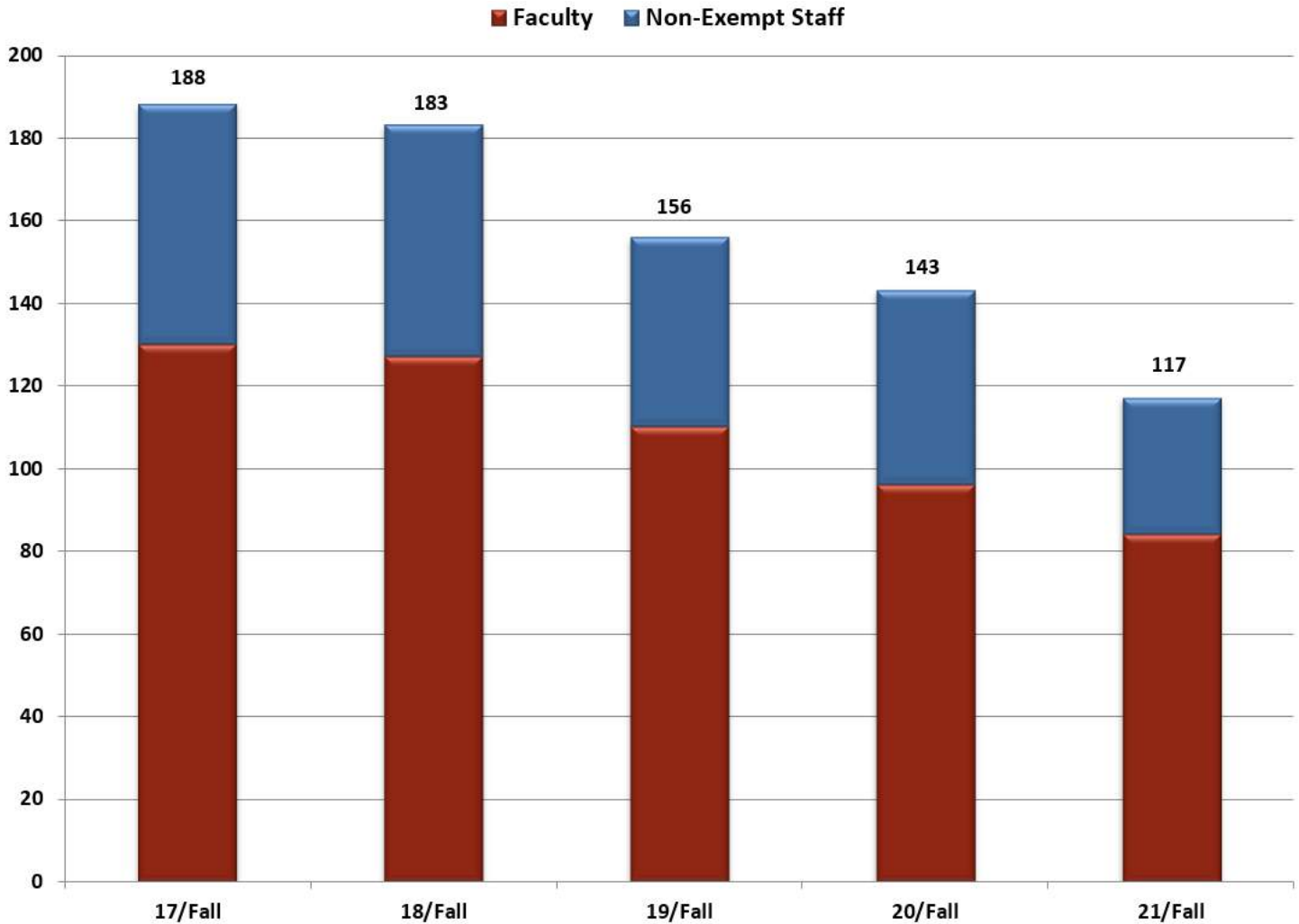

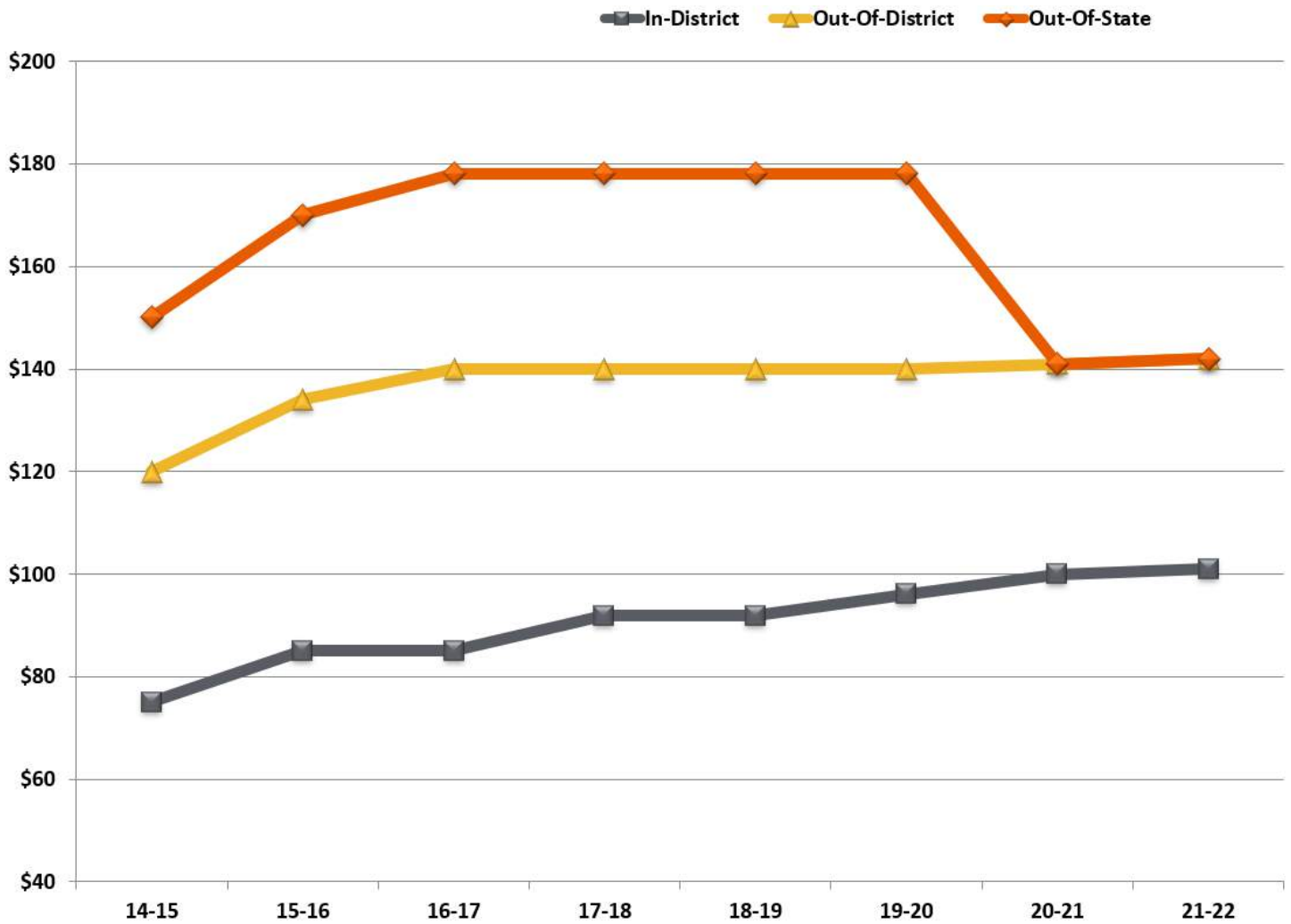

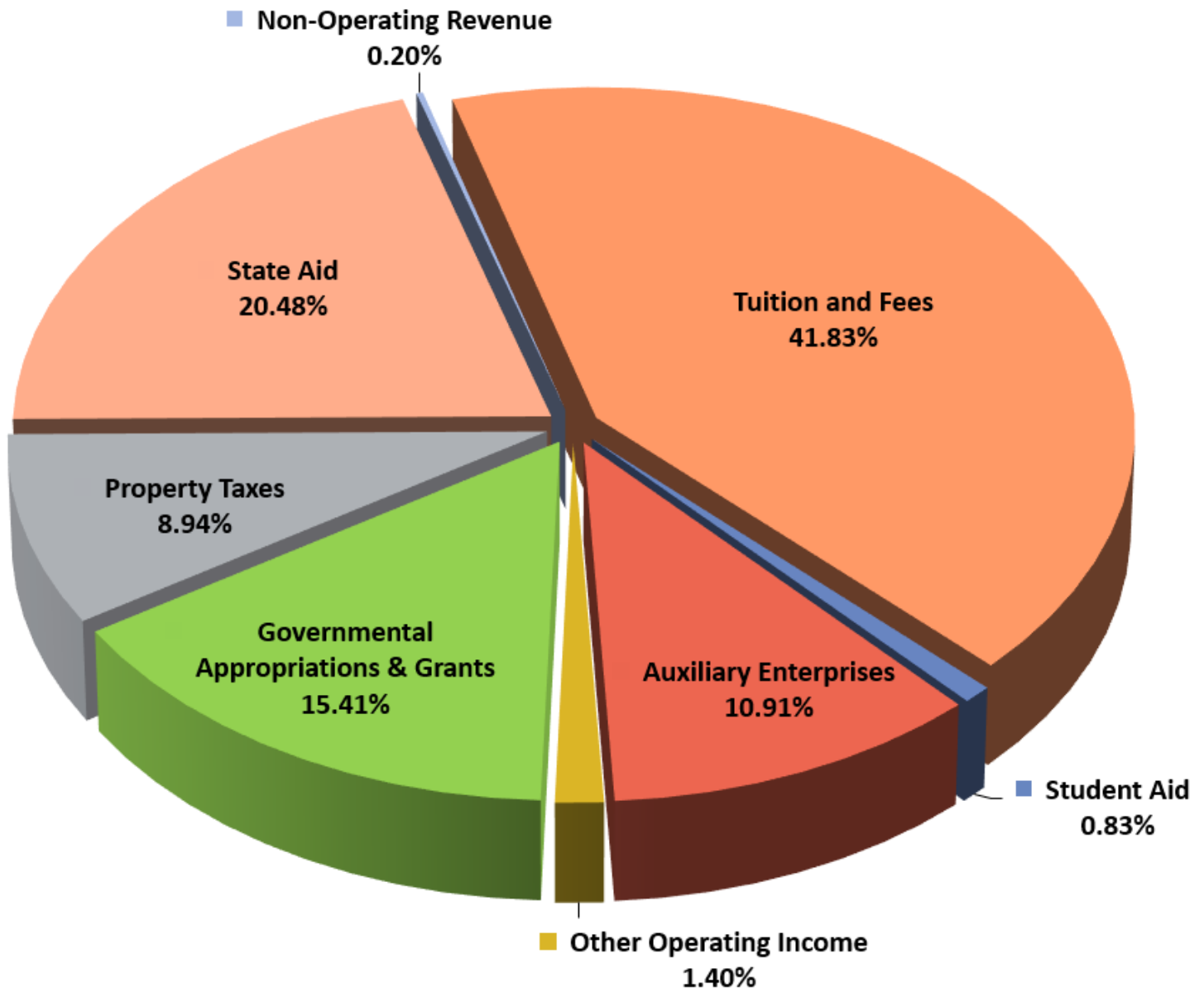
