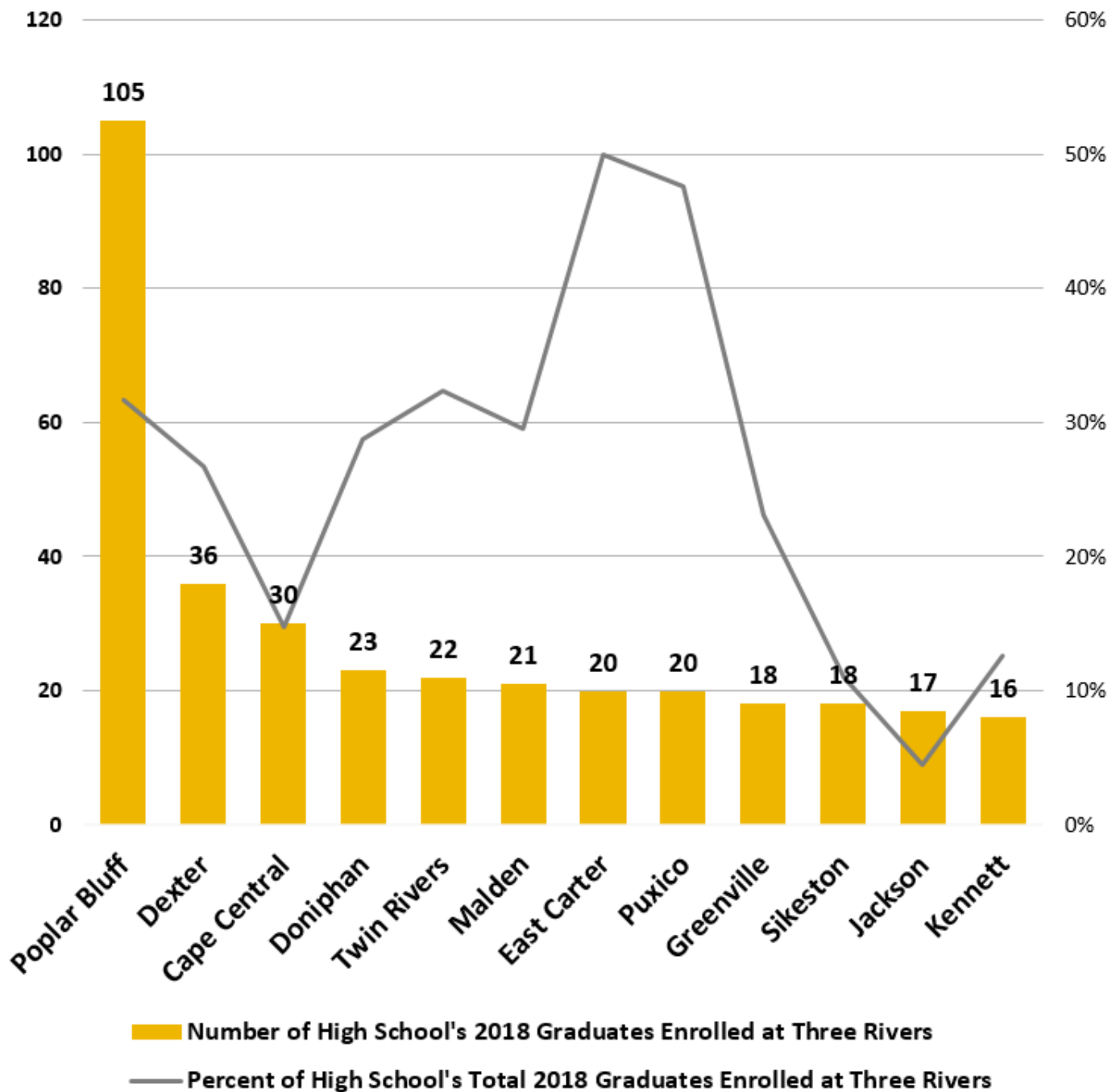

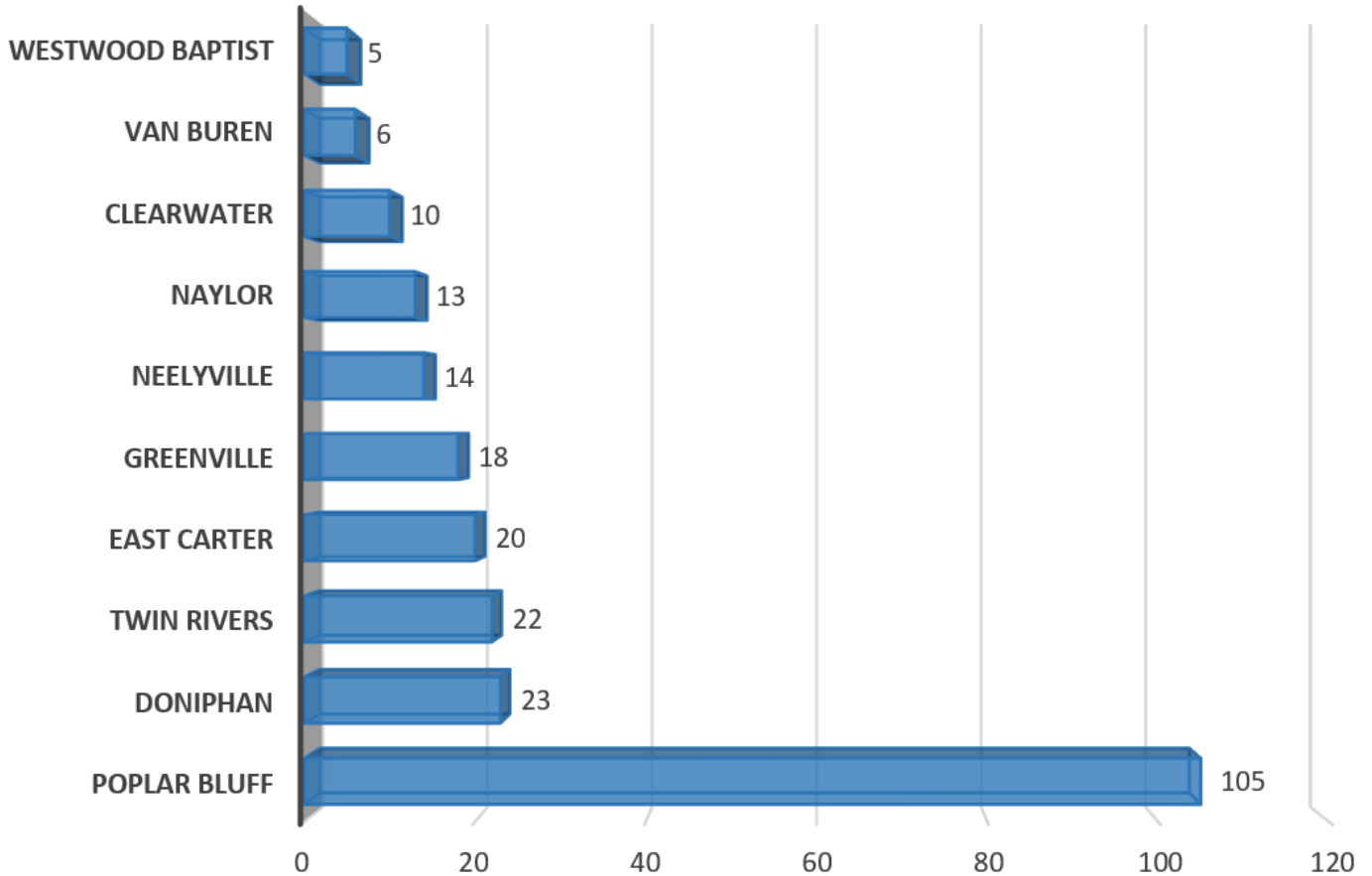
Enrollment by Headcount / Percentage

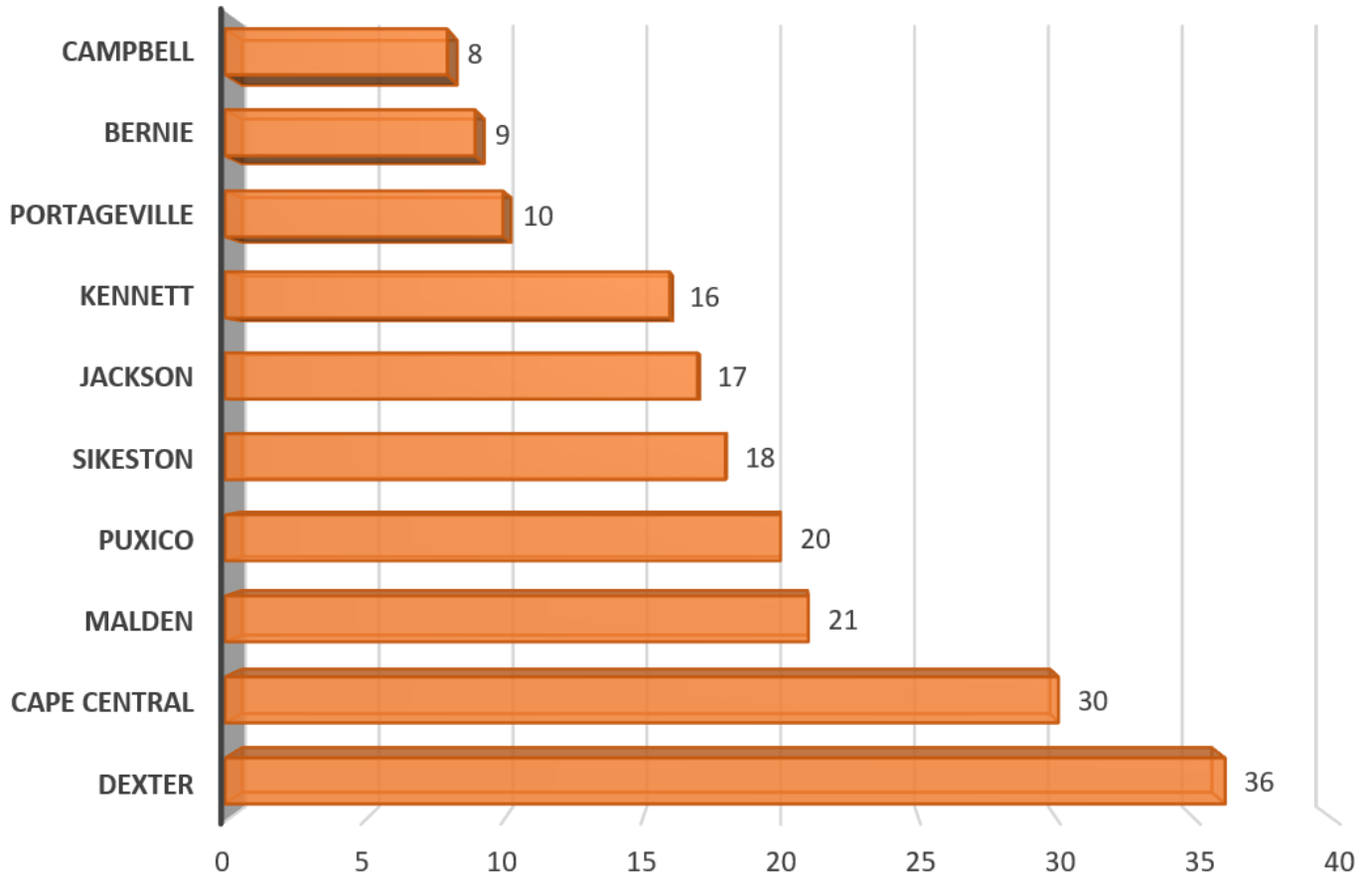
Enrollment by Headcount

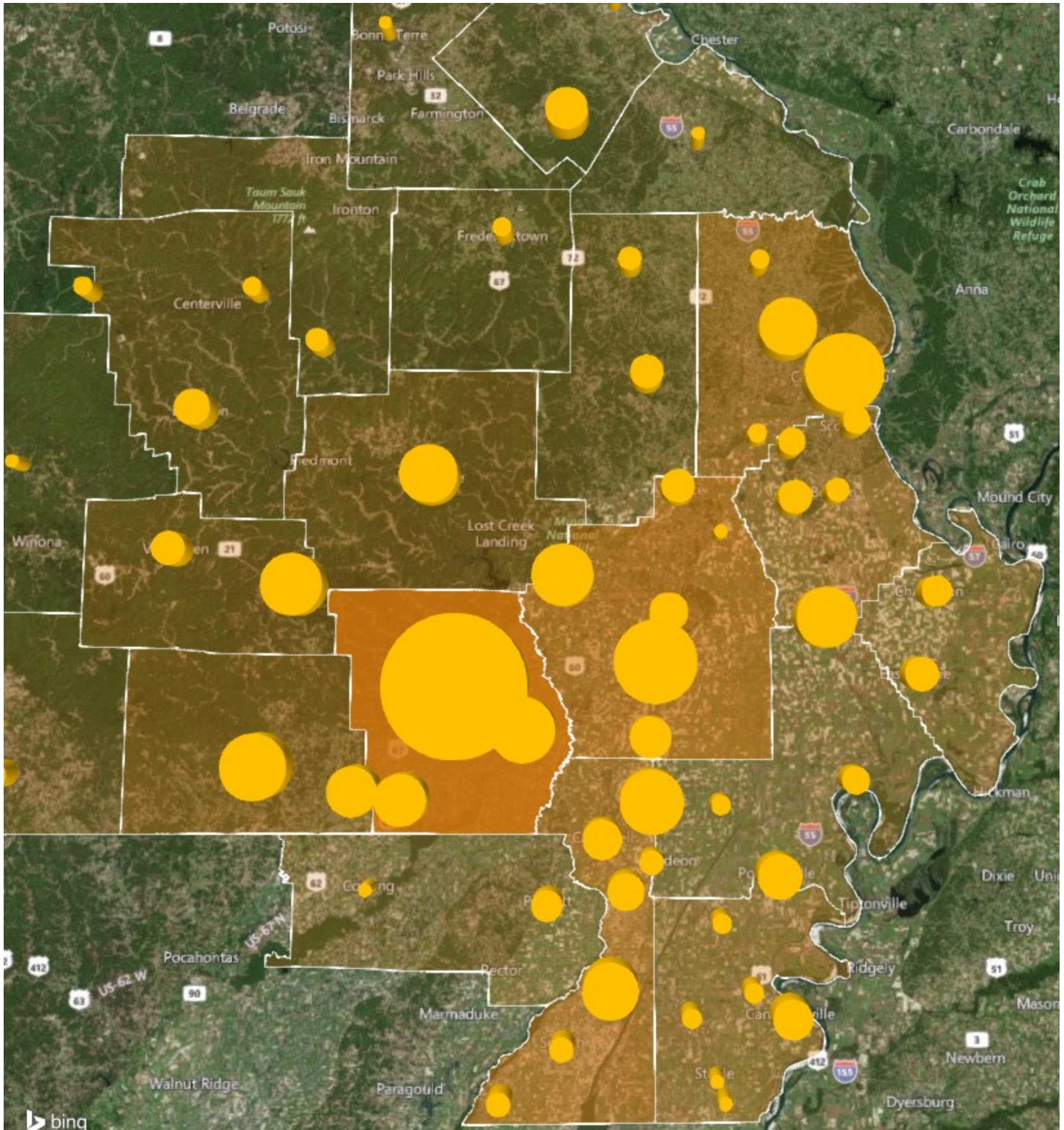

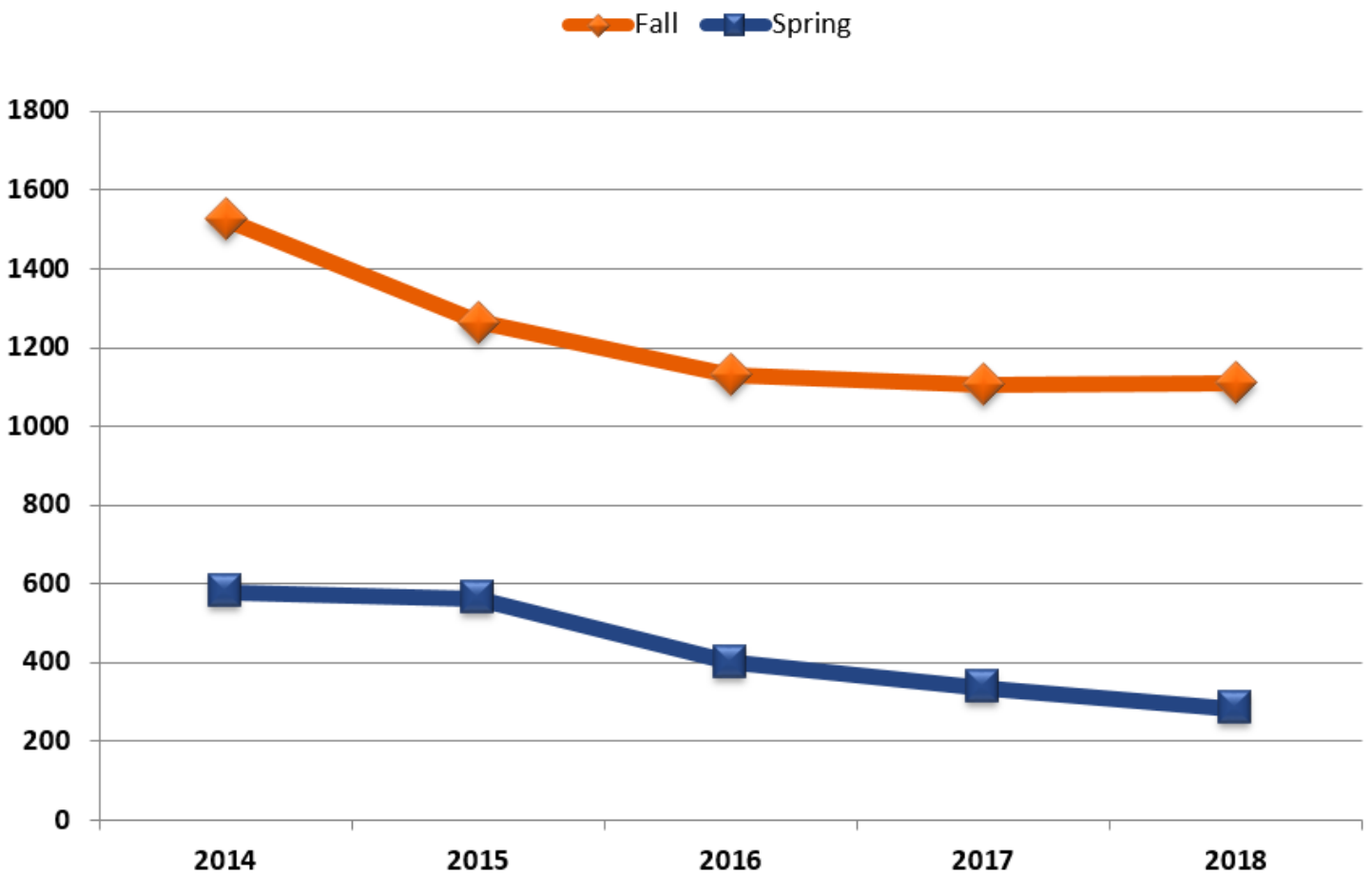

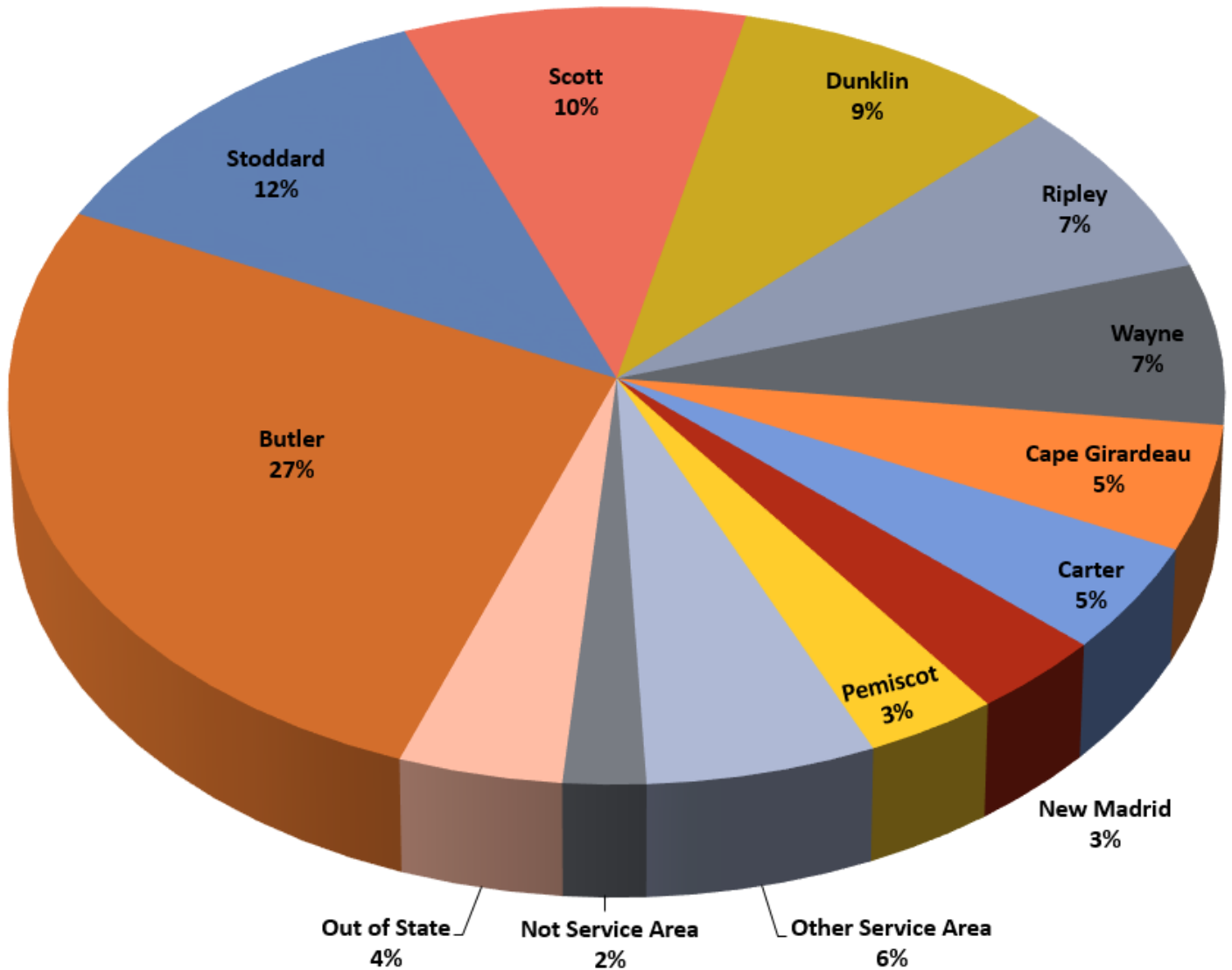

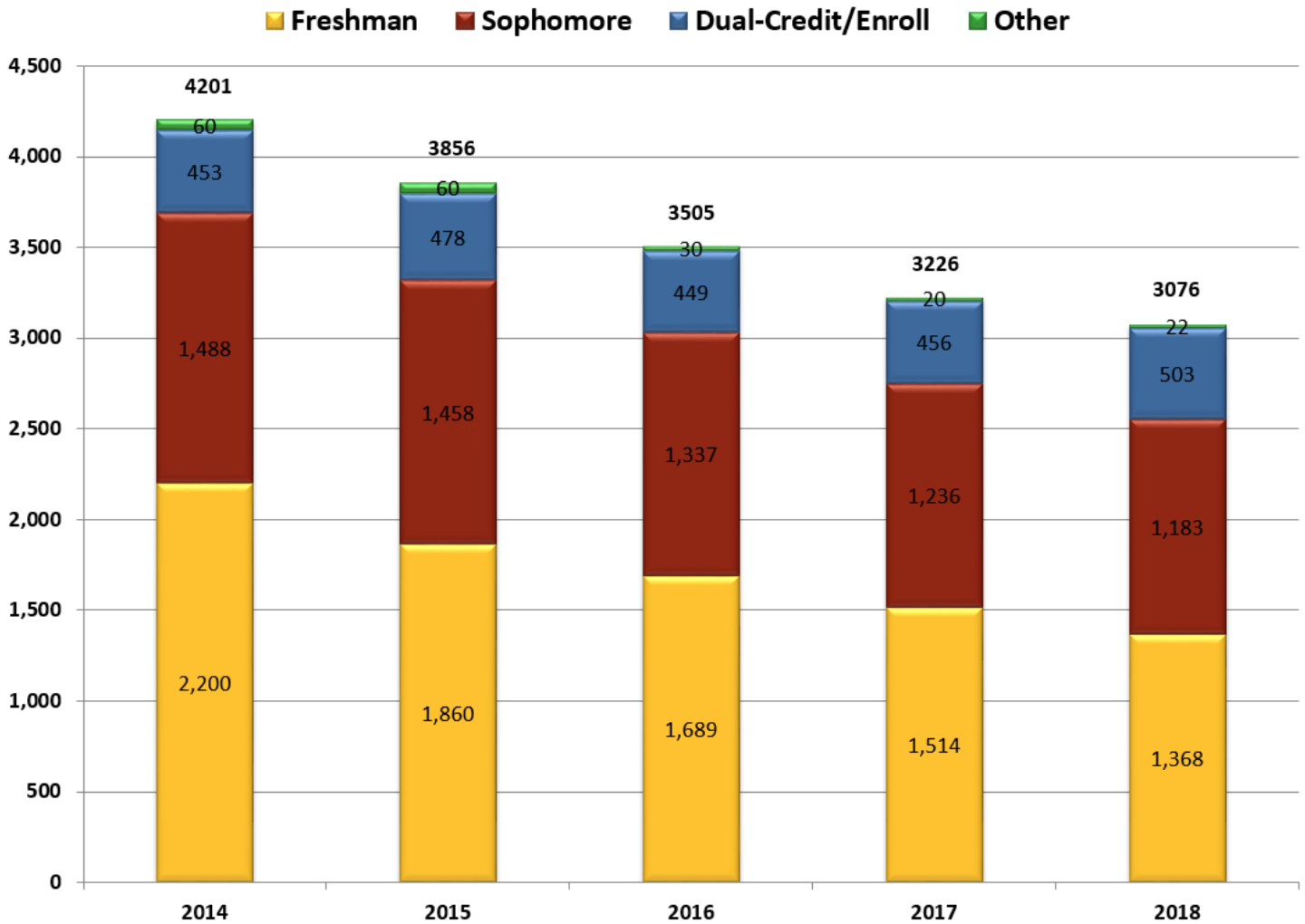

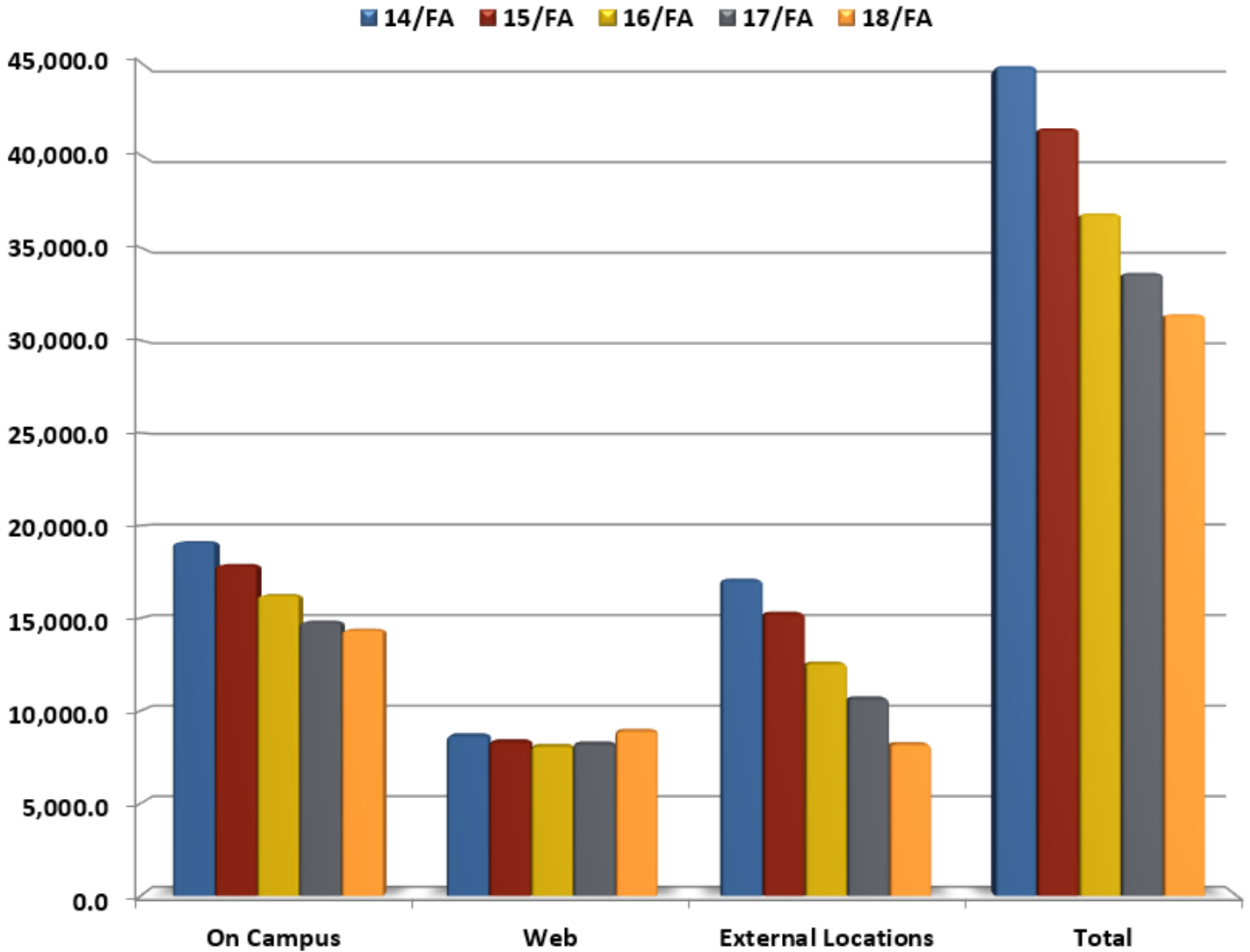

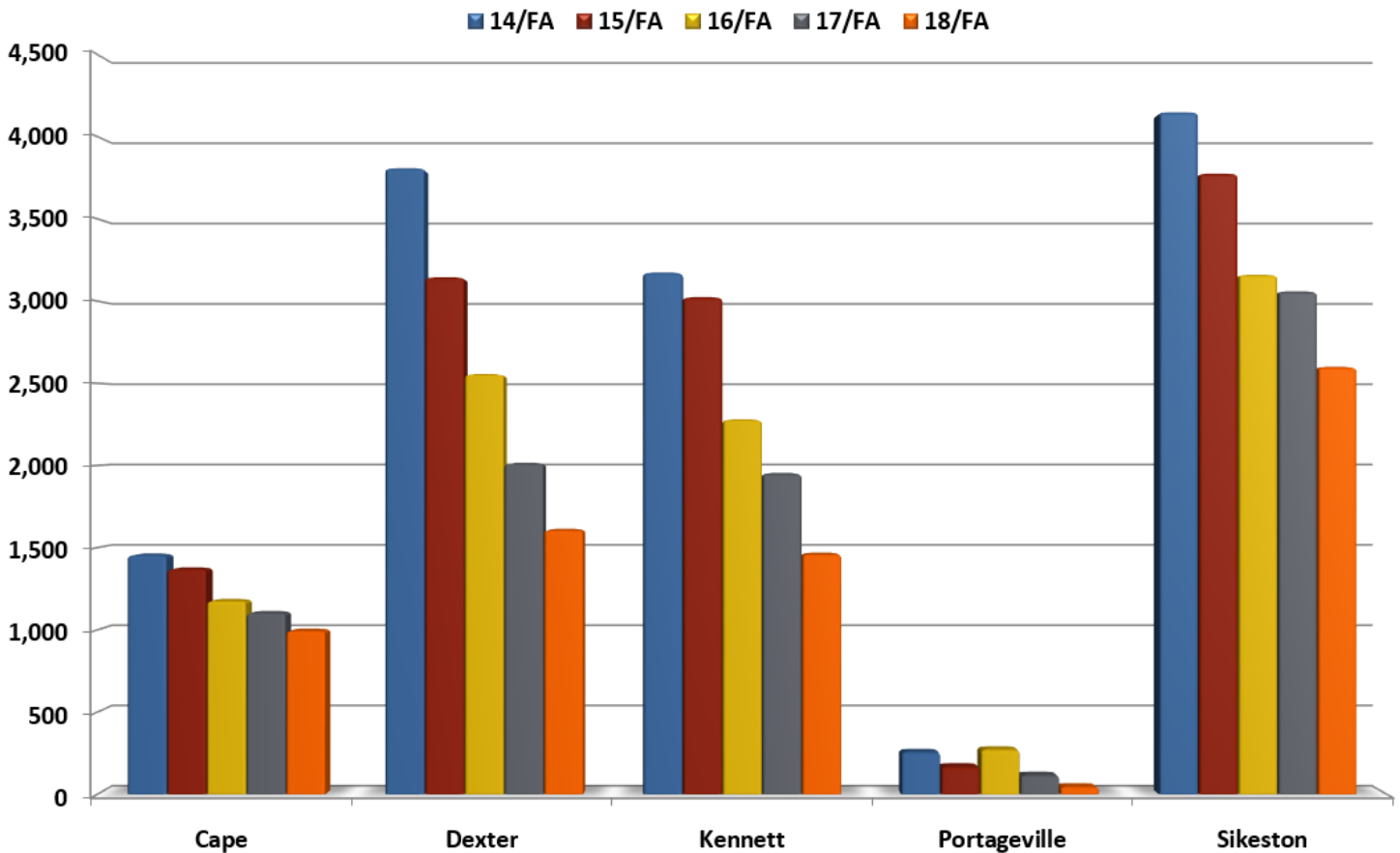

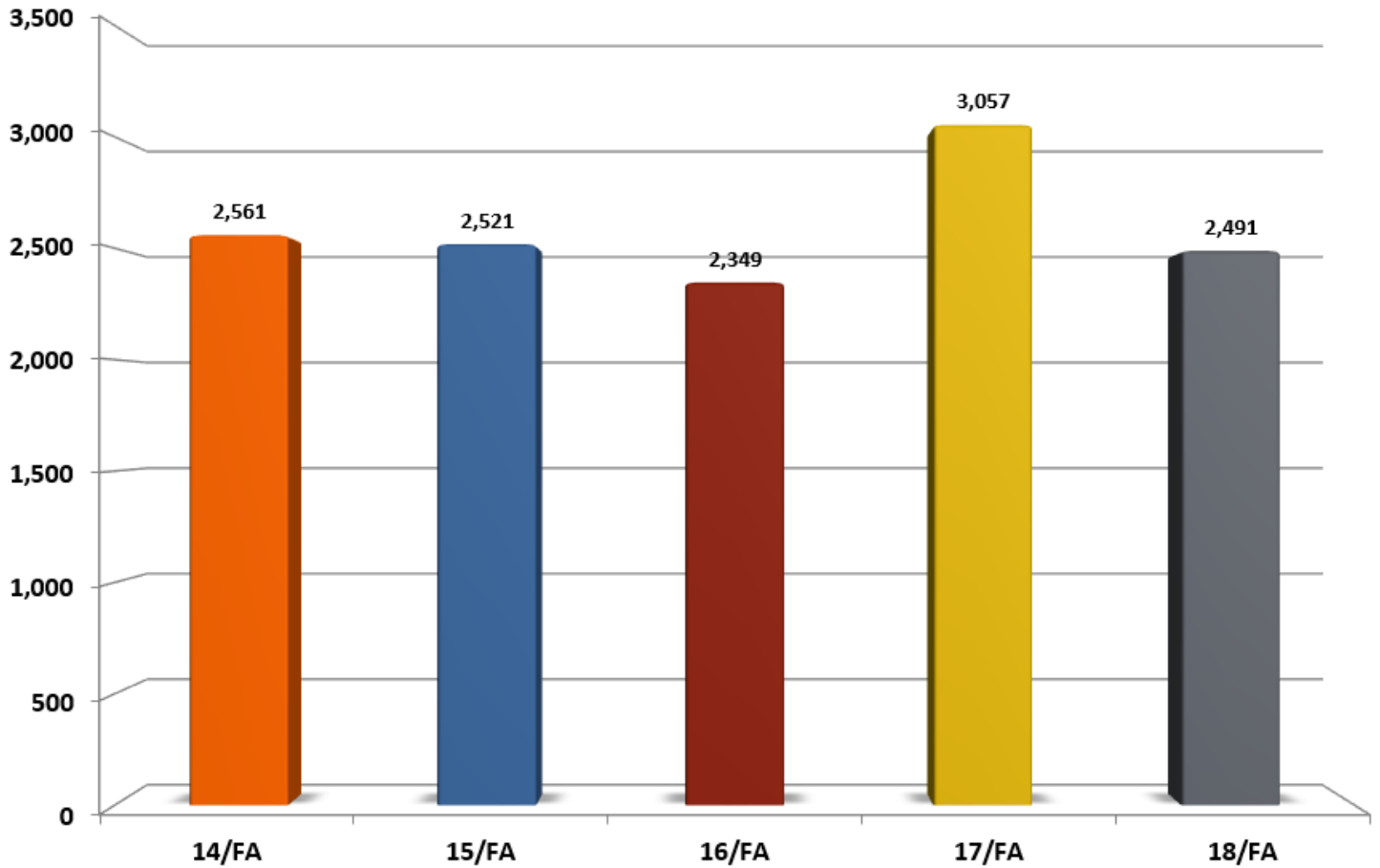

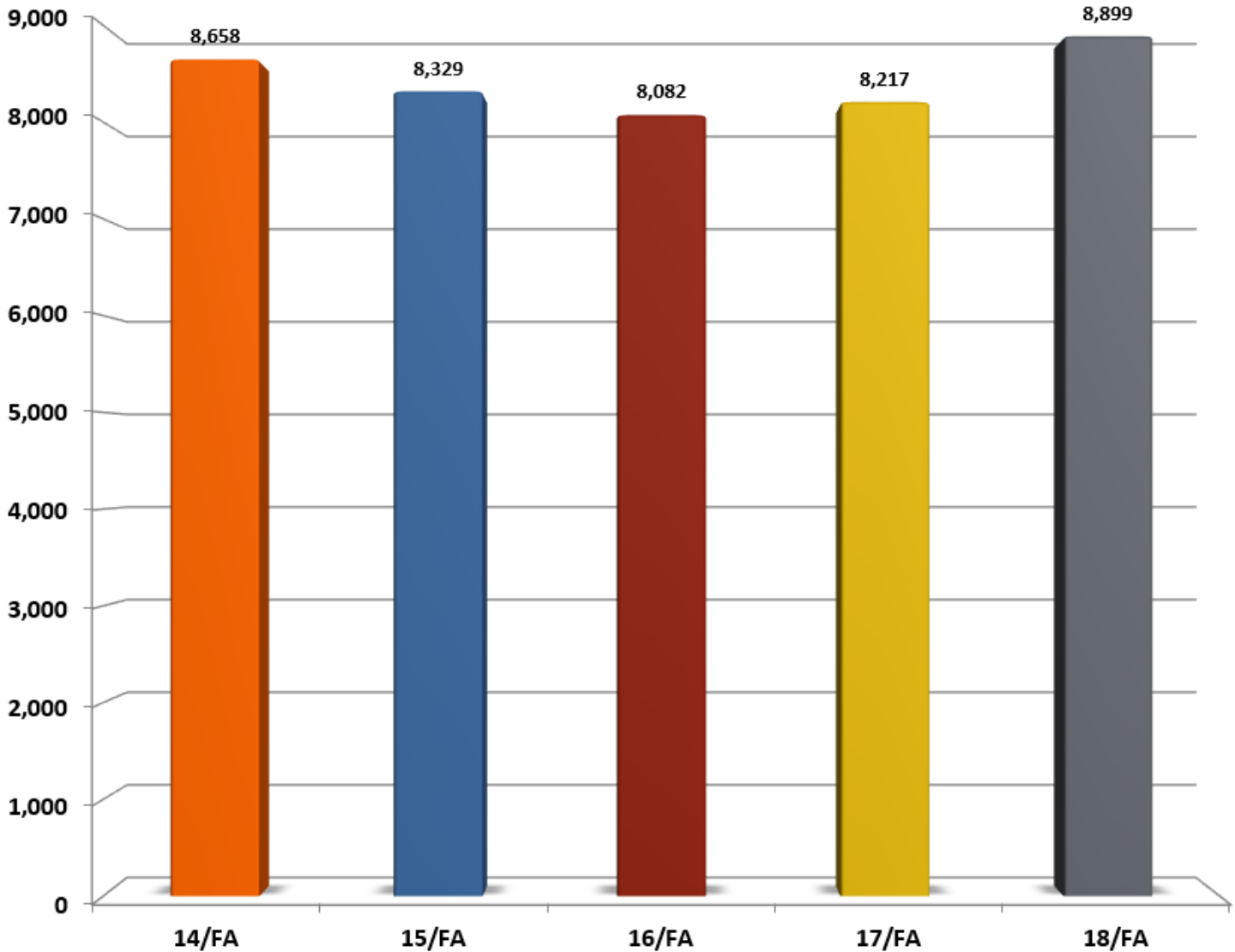

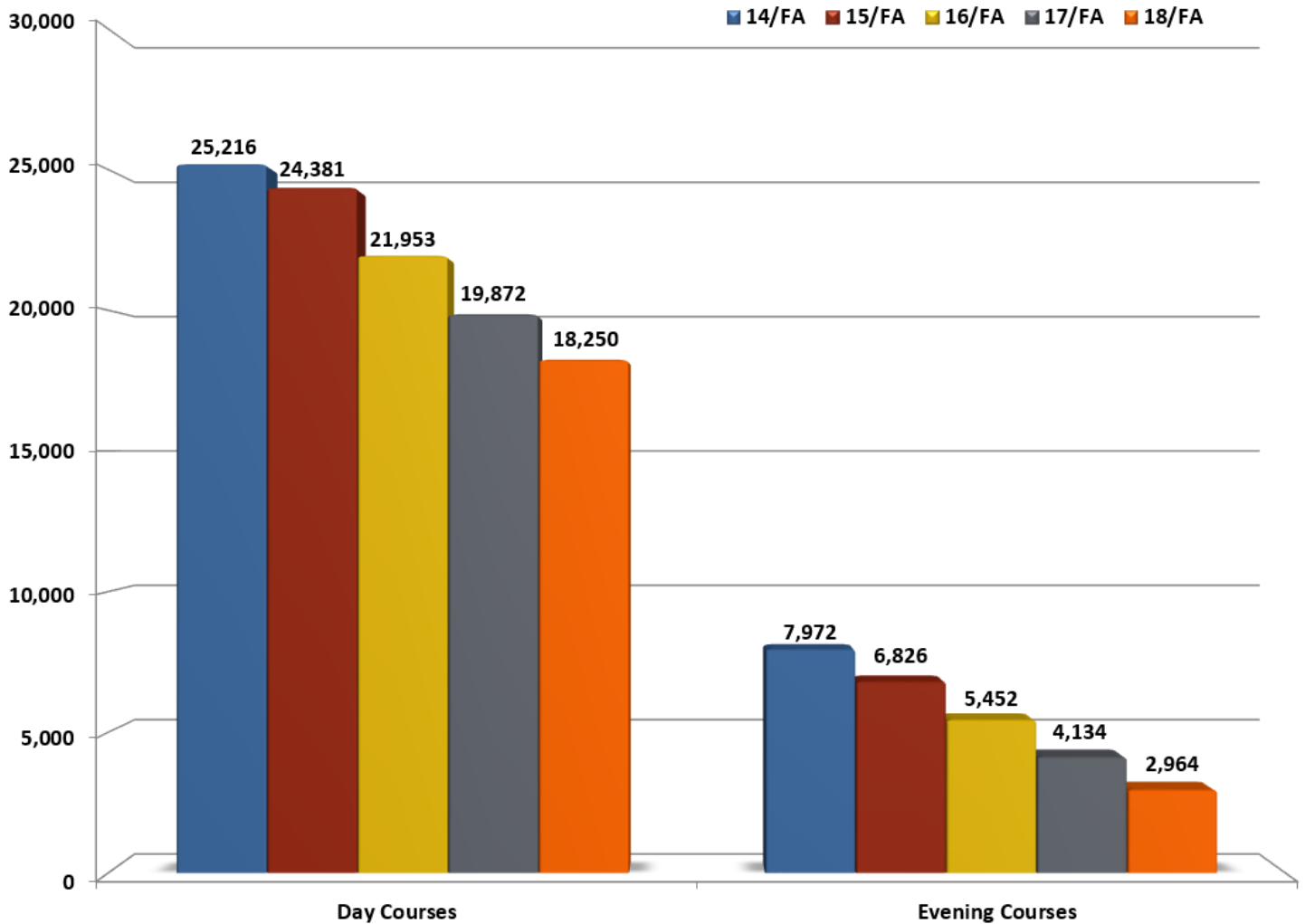

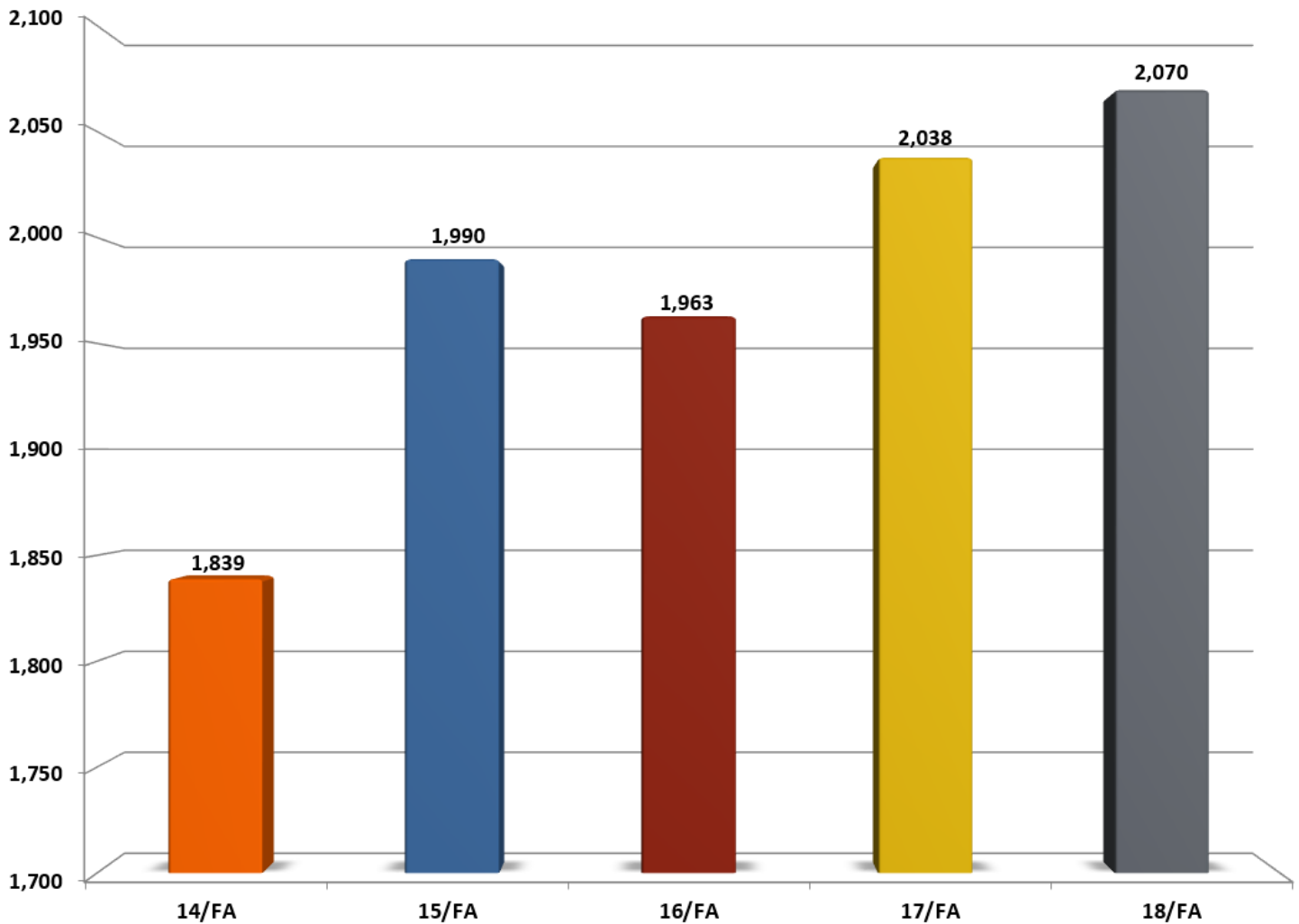

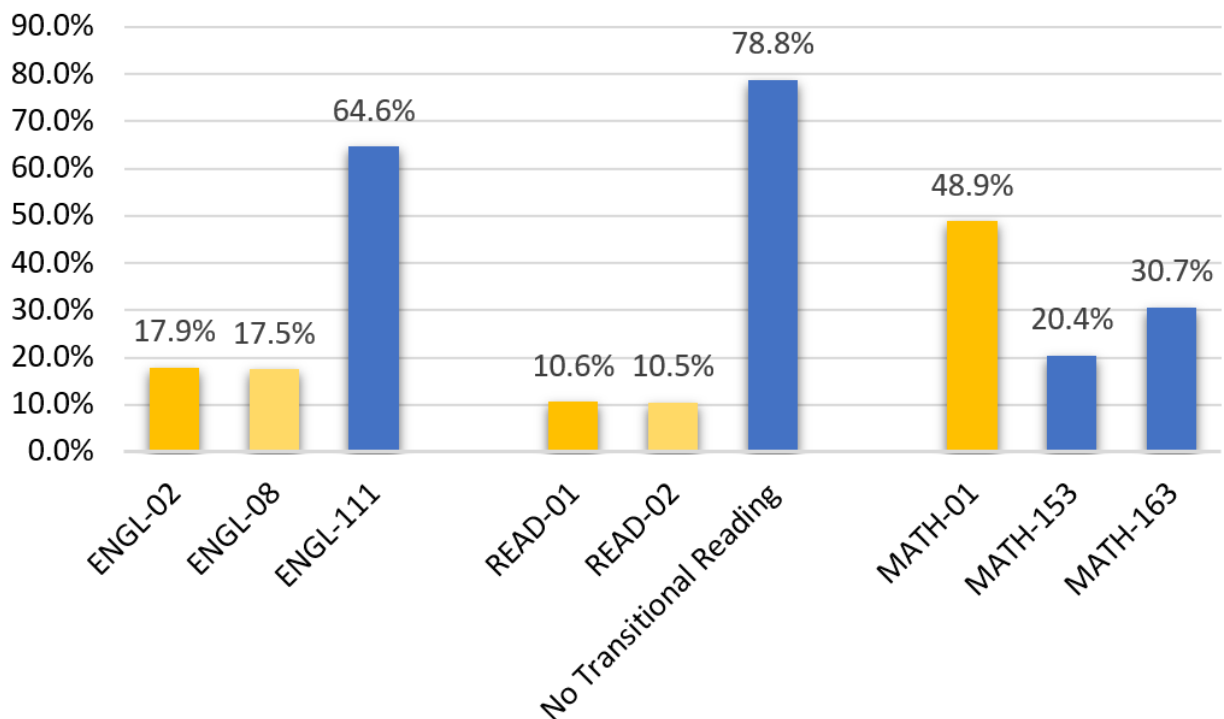

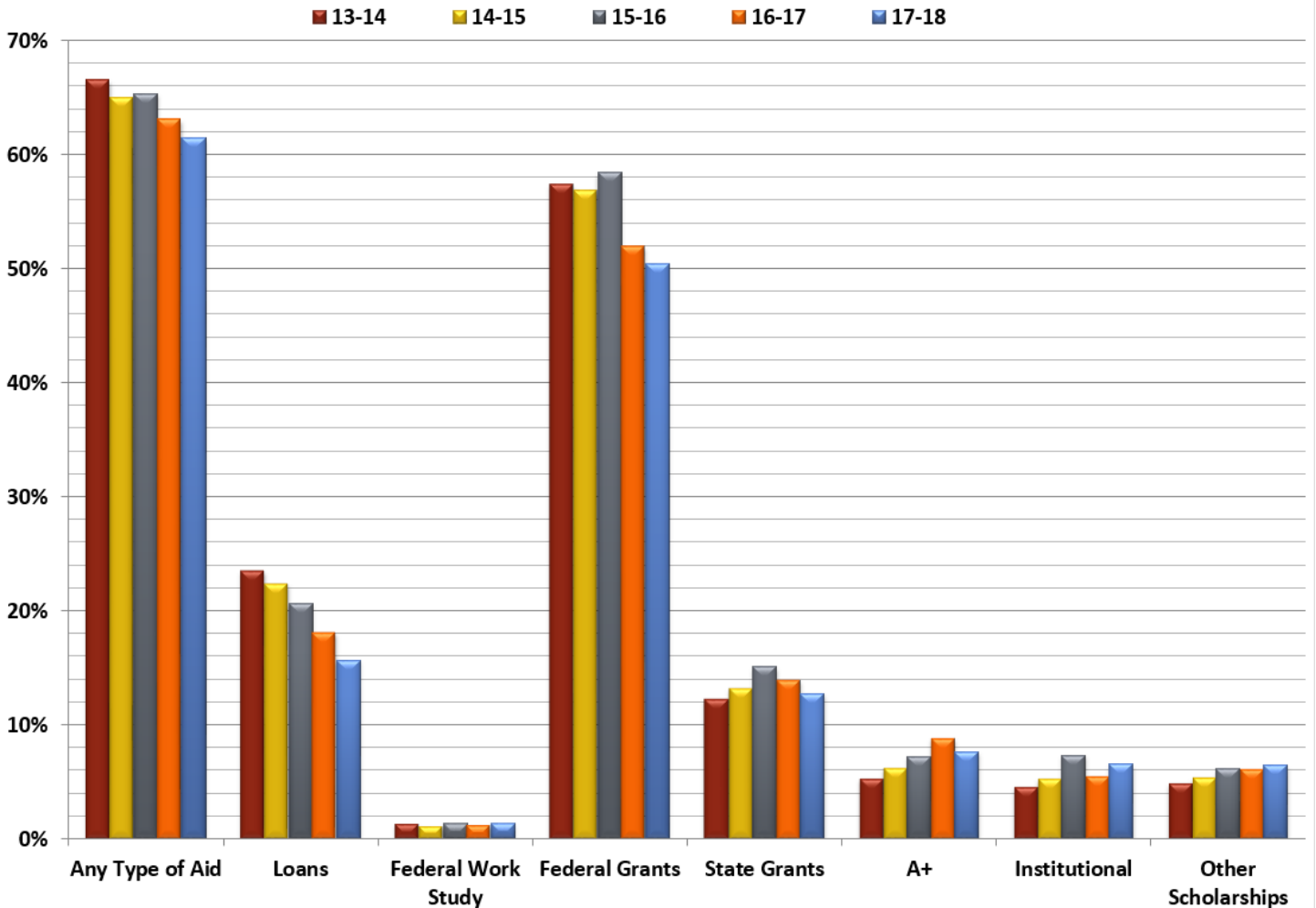

PERCENTAGE OF ALL STUDENTS RECEIVING AID



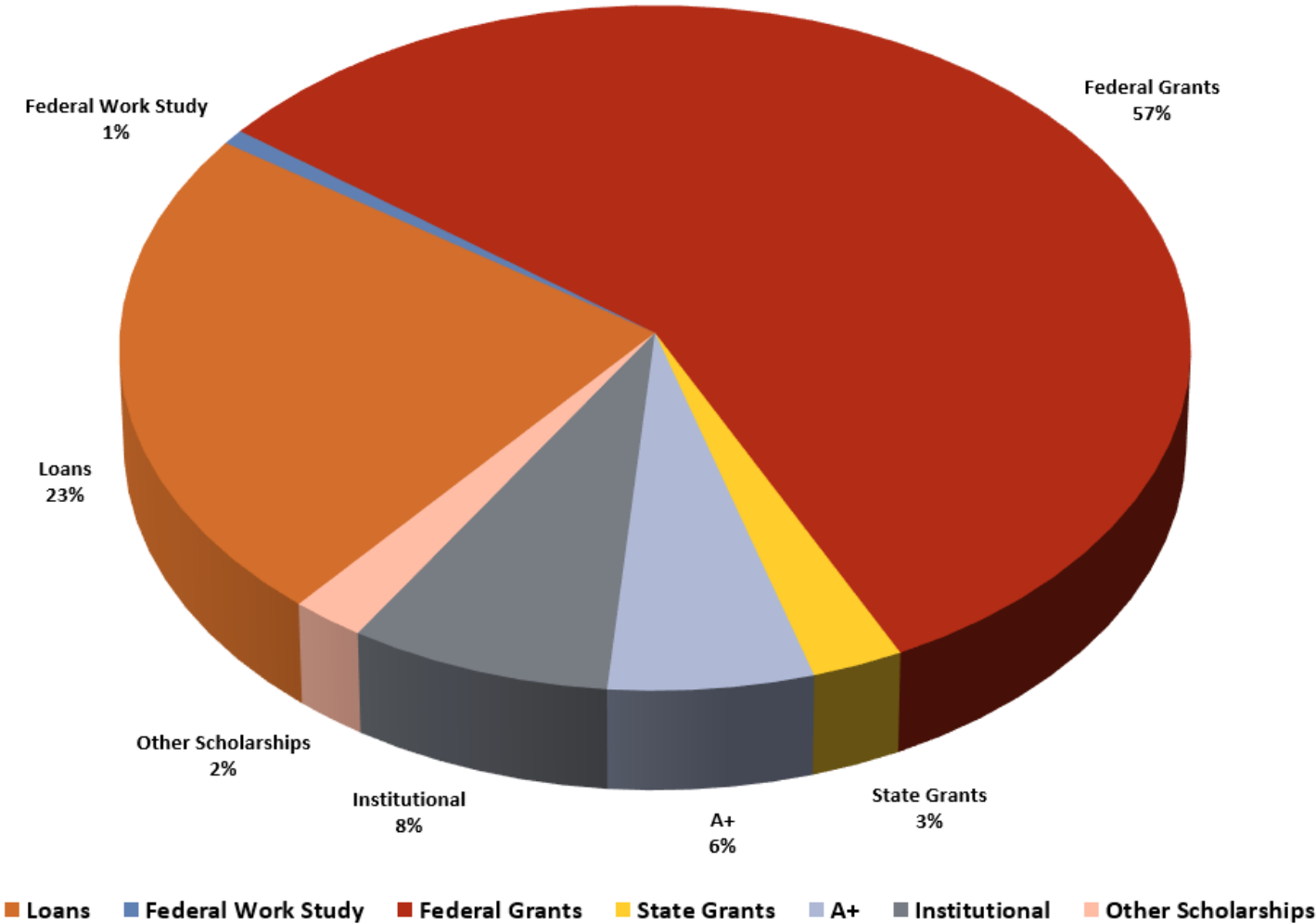

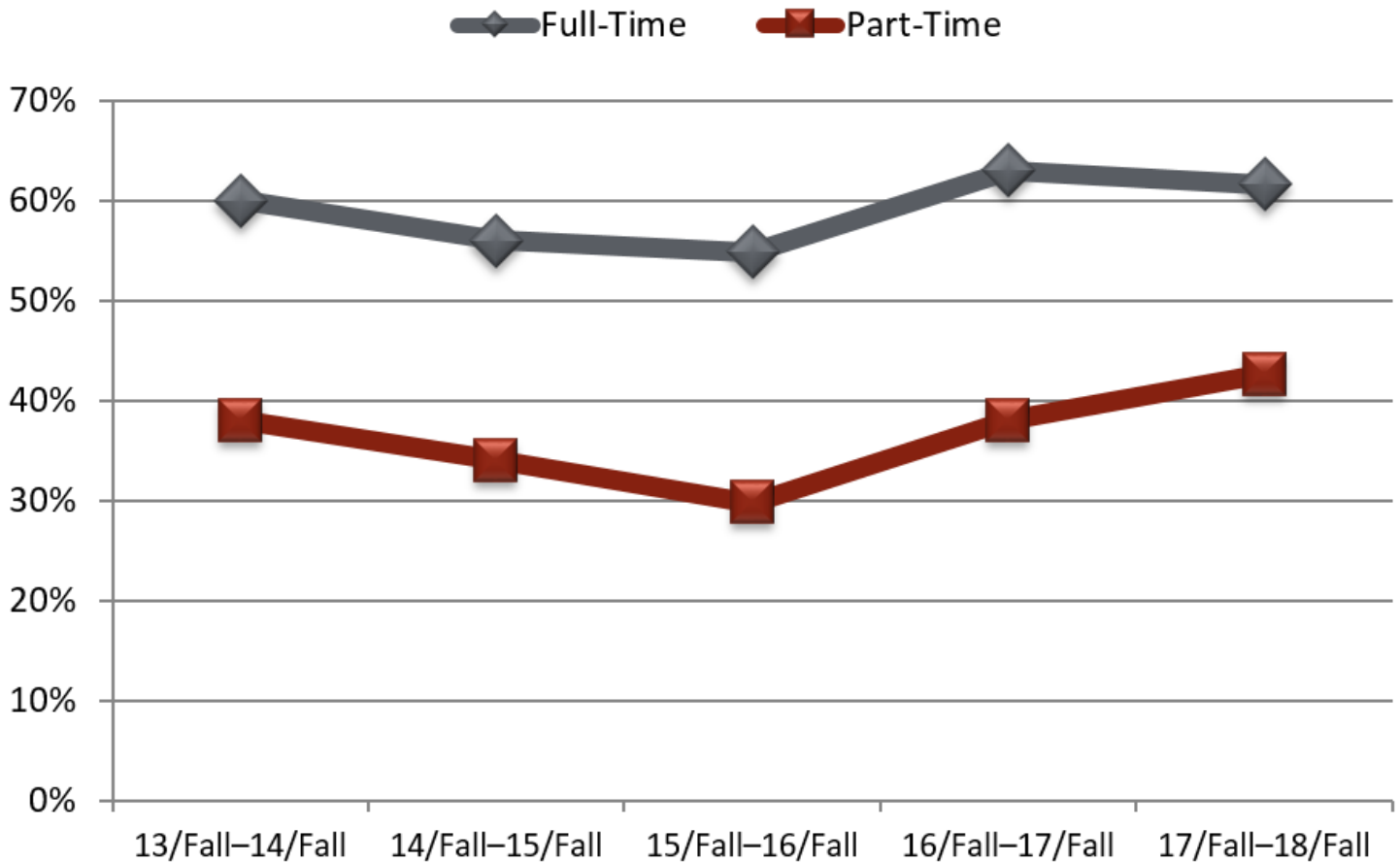
PERCENTAGE OF TOTAL DOLLARS AWARDED

FIRST-TIME STUDENT COHORT*

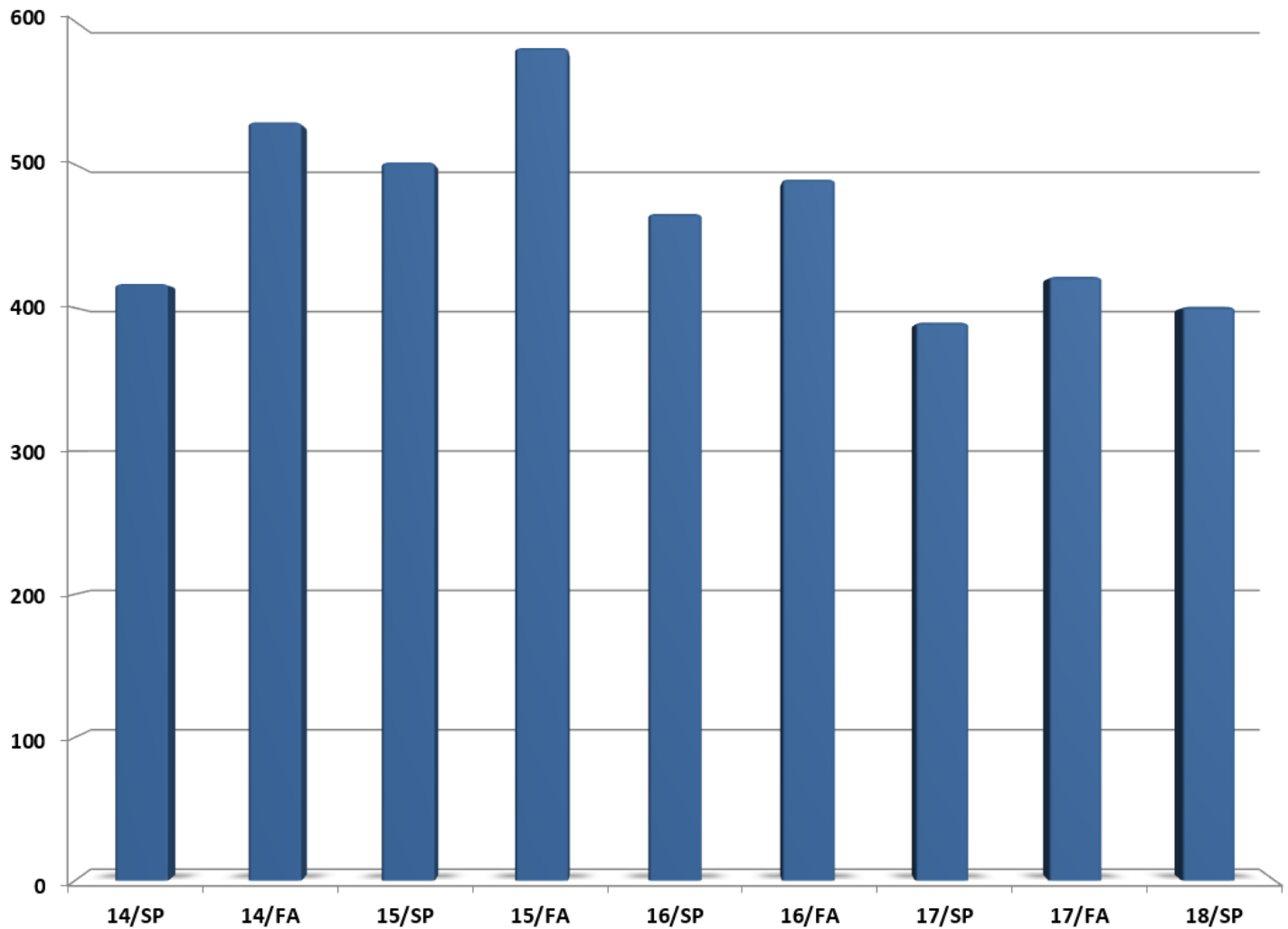

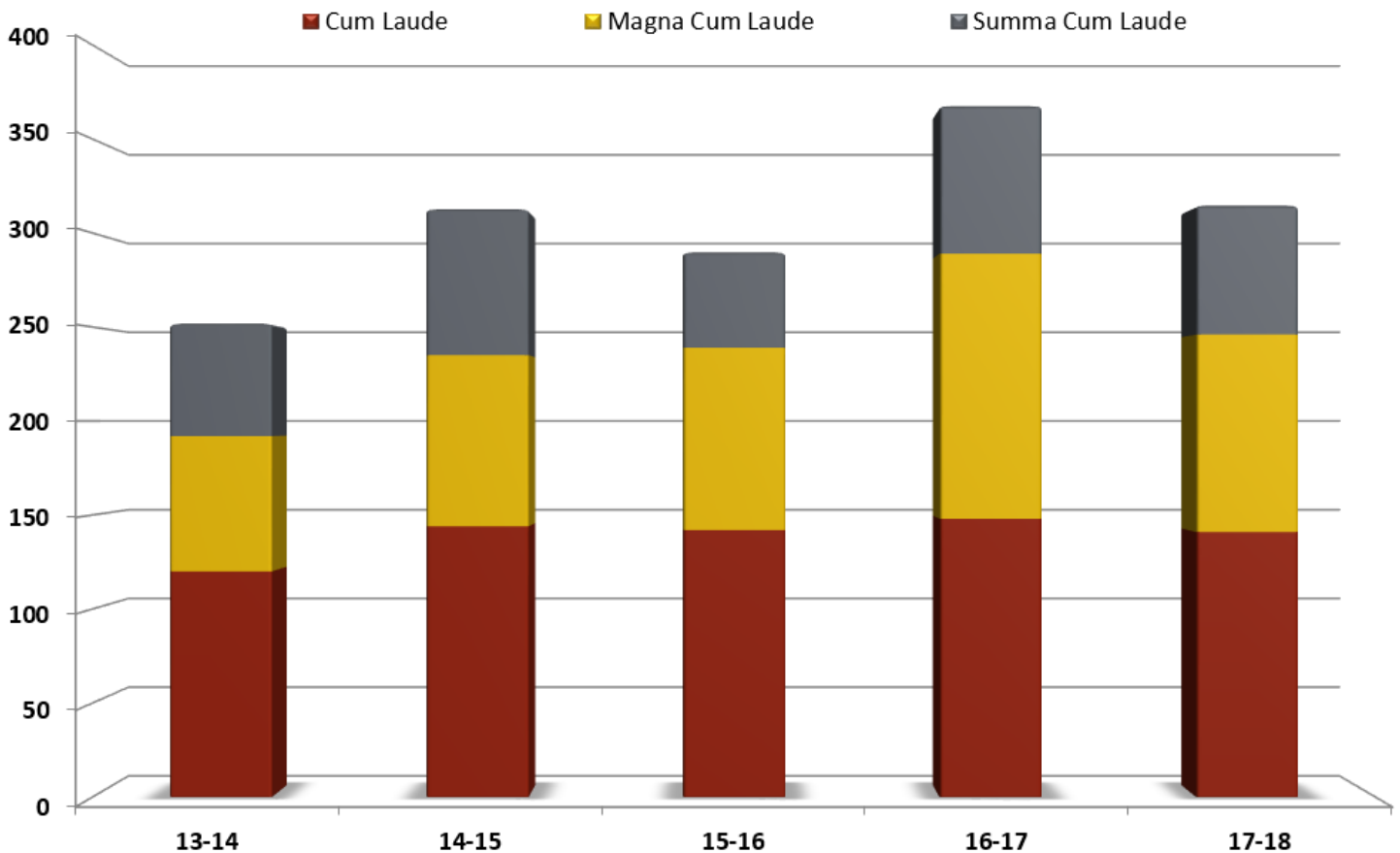

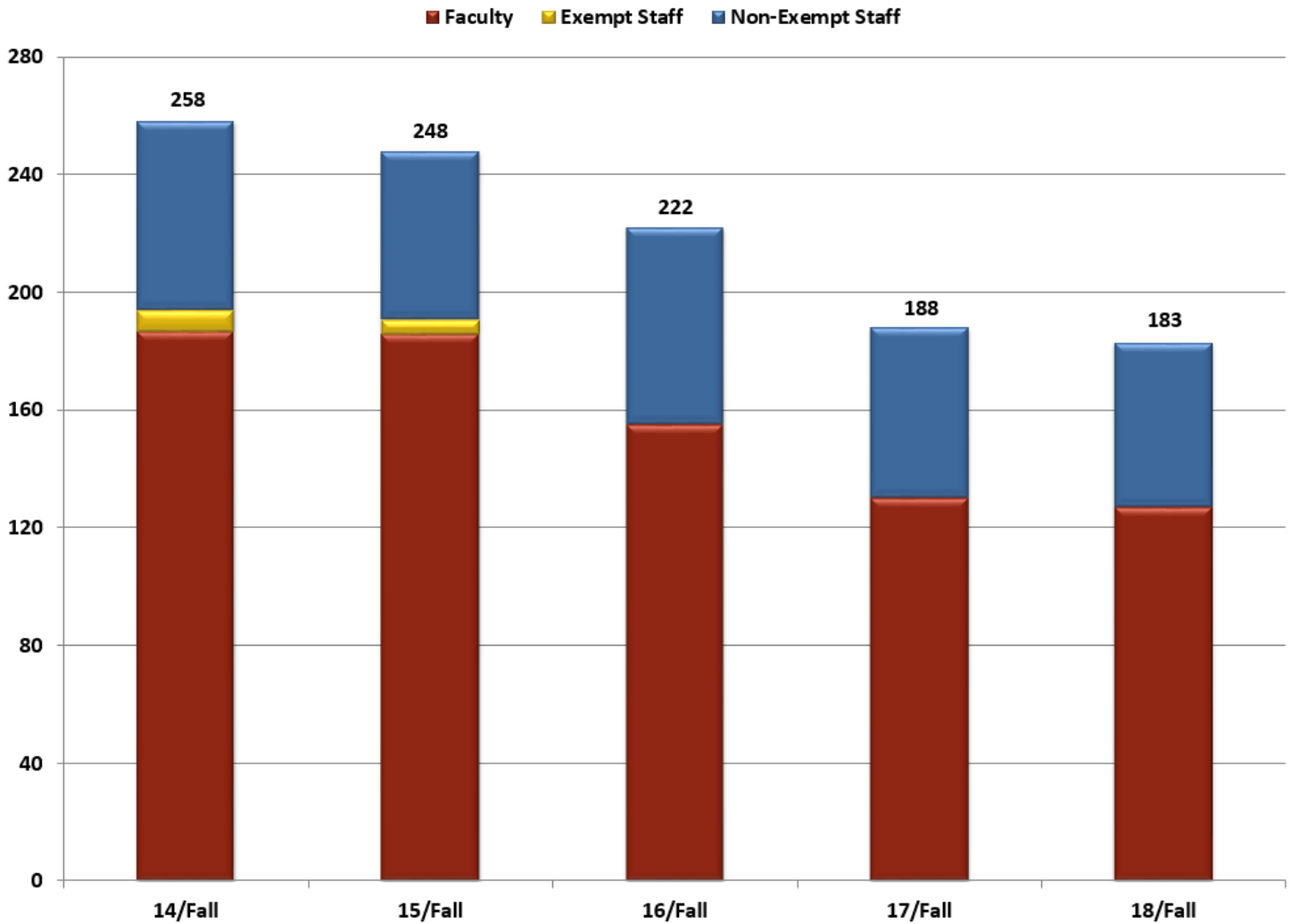

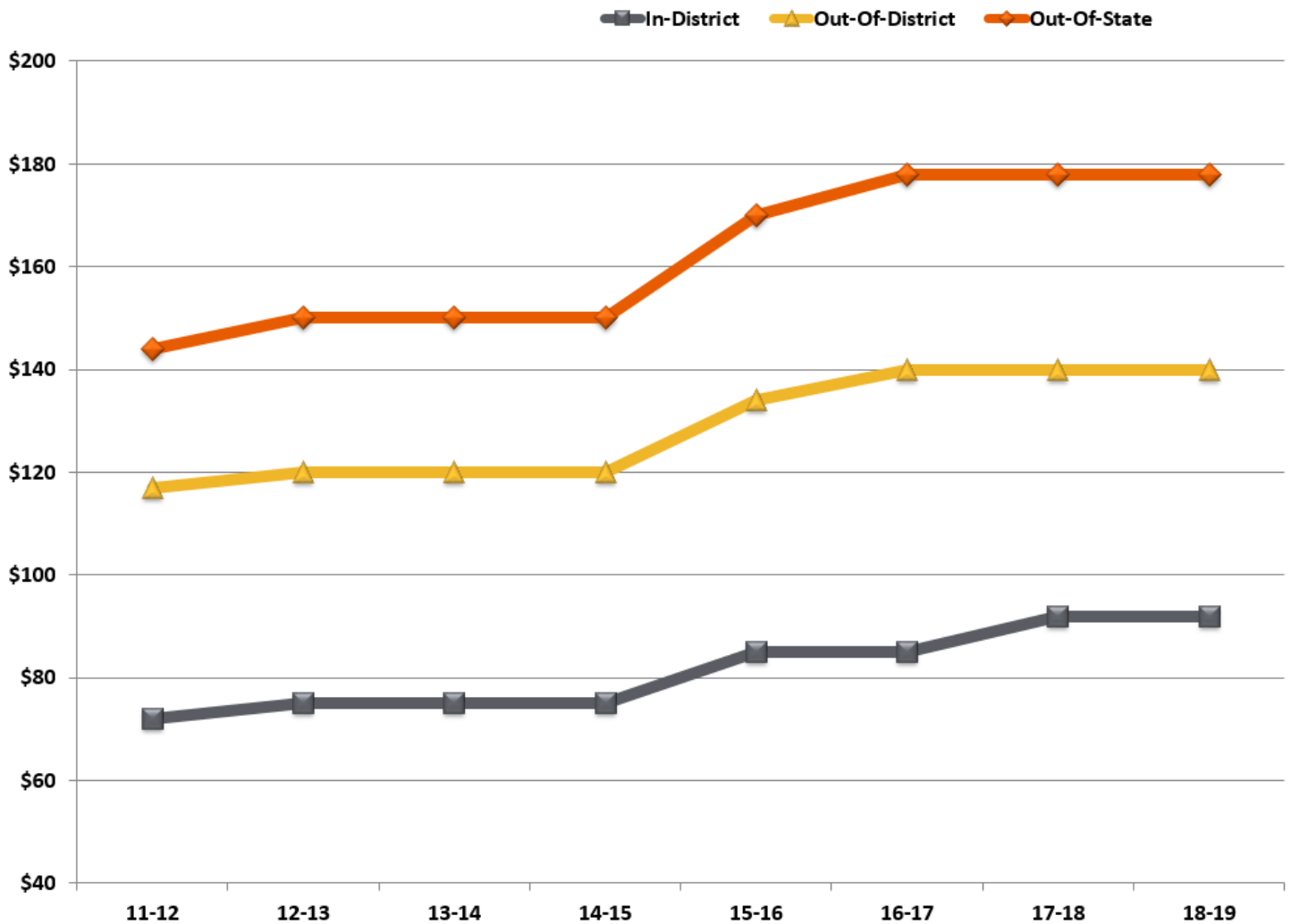

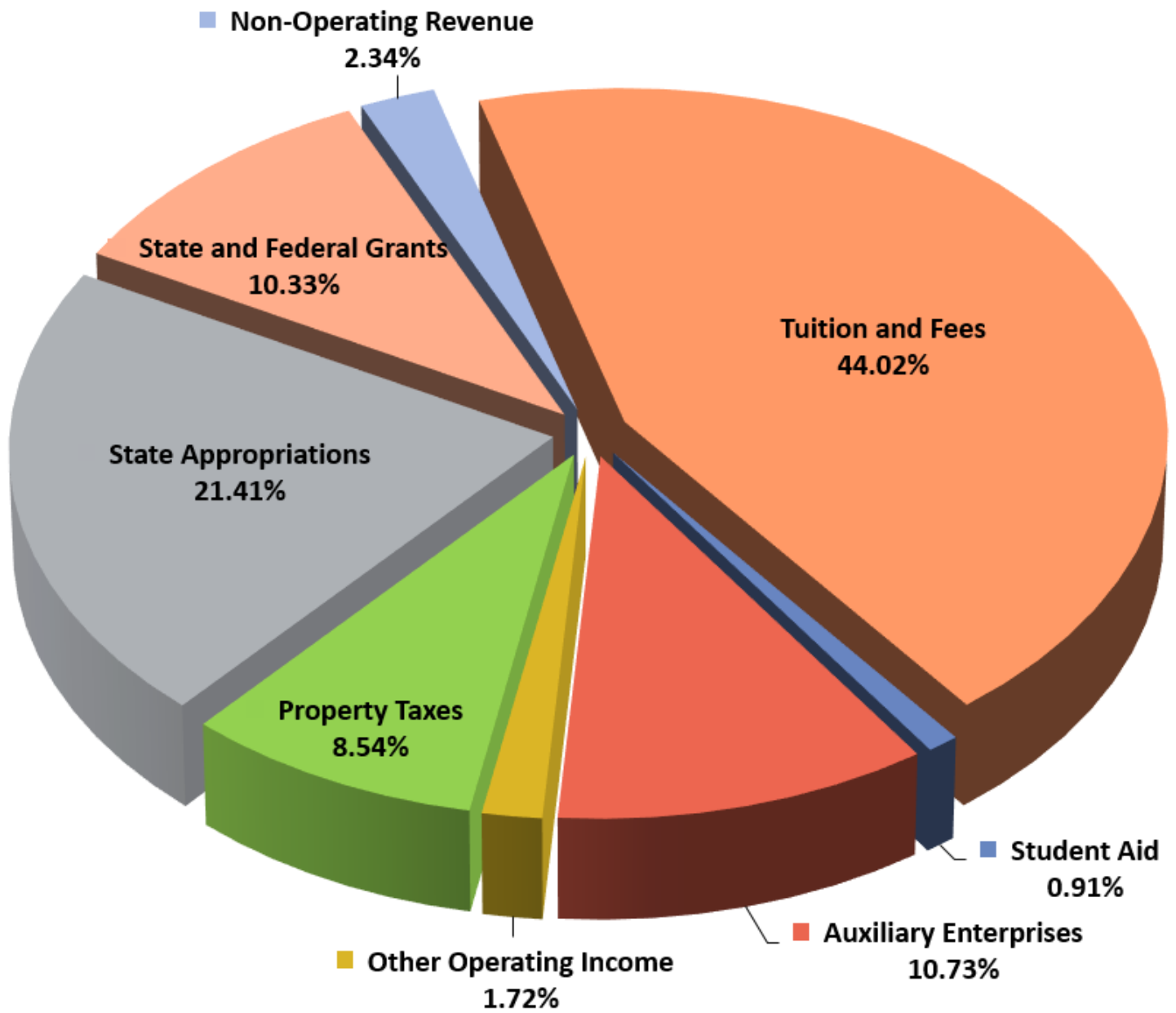
